Opposition asked | not to confuse people over EC, presidency

Dispelling the opposition lawmakers' apprehension about a 'conspiracy' against parliamentary democracy, senior ministers yesterday told parliament the main opposition is creating 'unnecessary issues' targeting the president and the Election Commission (EC) to confuse people.

The opposition lawmakers during the budget discussion alleged that parliament is being made ineffective deliberately under a "deep-rooted conspiracy" aimed at a reversal of the system. They also questioned the "existence" of two presidents in the

TIB report reveals most parliamentary bodies ignore Rules of Procedures; quorum crisis cost Tk 3 crore last year

Most parliamentary bodies of the current parliament have ignored the Rules of Procedures in holding meetings and hardly discussed the corruption and irregularities in the ministries, said a Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) report yesterday.

Surveying the activities of all 37 parliamentary standing committees tasked with ensuring the government's accountability to the Jatiya Sangsad, the report found that 27 of them failed to hold one meeting every month as per the

The ministers and members concerned also did not turn up in the meetings regularly: "Ministers or state ministers were present at only 42 per cent of total meetings, the TIB survey styled

"ParliamentWatch 2005" revealed. Maintaining that a parliament's effectiveness and success largely depend on efficient and strong performance of its committee system, the research found that the standing committees also set "less important issues" on agenda for

From an analysis of last year's

five parliamentary sessions, the TIB report revealed that like the previous sittings, the current parliament has been suffering from acute quorum crisis, absence of the

opposition's boycott. The quorum crisis incurred a loss of nearly Tk 3 crore last year, the report said, pointing out that over 70 per cent of the absentee lawmakers are businessmen.

Govt makes import of sugar, pulse easy

UNB, Dhaka

The government yesterday relaxed rules for import of sugar and pulse through Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) in a bid to cool down the market prices of the two essential commodities.

With the revision to the import rules, an importer now will be able to import sugar and pulse via TCB by depositing only two per cent of earnest money against the total import value, which was 10 per cent earlier.

The decision to relax the import rules was taken at a cabinet committee meeting on economic affairs held at the secretariat with Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman in the chair. Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan, among others, was present.

At the meeting, Saifur strongly criticised the Indian government's decision not to export wheat, sugar SEE PAGE 15 COL 3

France set Brazil clash

An inspired France marshalled by Zinedine Zidane swept to a 3-1 win over Spain here on yesterday to set up a dream World Cup quarterfinal date with Brazil.

Spain took the lead with a pen-alty from David Villa before Frank Ribery levelled, with Patrick Vieira and Zidane finishing off a memorable night for les Bleus.

France had promised to show her true face after making heavy weather of her opening group matches and she kept her word as Raymond Domenech's ageing side produced their prettiest football

since arriving in Germany and arguably the best since he took over after Euro 2004.

But it was Spain who went ahead in the 26th minute after defender Lilian Thuram tackled Pablo Ibanez from behind, step ping on the Atletico Madrid defender's ankle.

Italian referee Roberto Rossetti had no hesitation in pointing to the spot despite protests from Zidane with David Villa stepping up to slot the ball low and left past Fabien Barthez to leave the 1998 champions on the back foot.

Up to then France were matching Spain step by step for pace,

constructing some deft moves with Zidane at the heart of most and Ribery keeping the Spanish defence on their toes on the right. Ribery had France's best early

chance after Thierry Henry squared the ball from the right only for the young Marseille midfielder to fluff his lines from in front of Iker Casillas' goal.

But Ribery then showed why

they're calling him the next Zidane as he drew France back level in the 41st minute as he latched onto a through ball from Vieira, beat off two Spanish defenders, sidestepped the onrushing Casillas and

Teachers end strike, but crisis not over

Community primary teachers, who were observing hunger strike for ten consecutive days, suspended all agitation programmes yesterday while government primary teachers postponed theirs on late Monday night for one month following discussions with the government.

Community primary teachers also cancelled their self-immolation programme, where 15 of their colleagues were supposed to commit suicide, following request from the Awami League (AL) led 14-party alliance and representatives of different professional bodies and human rights organisations.

The police seized black cloths, kerosene, patrol and matchboxes around 11:00am when the community teachers were preparing to set

their bodies on fire at the Central Shaheed Minar.

Keeping their schools closed. community primary teachers, who draw only Tk 750 a month each from the government exchequer, started hunger strike until death at the Central Shaheed Minar from June 18 demanding nationalisation of their jobs.

On the other hand, two groups of government primary teachers started hunger strike until death from Saturday last at separate places in the capital demanding elimination of wage discrimination and introduction of schoolbased examination system. COMMUNITY PRIMARY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION
