North Korea fires volley of missiles

North Korea test-fired seven missiles yesterday, including a longrange Taepodong-2 capable of reaching US soil, sparking condemnation from Washington and neighboring Japan and South Korea.

US officials said Pyongyang launched five short- or mediumrange missiles, which splashed down in the Sea of Japan (Fast Sea), as well as a Taepodong-2 that apparently failed less than a minute after liftoff.

The missile launches by the Stalinist state triggered a flurry of diplomatic initiatives, headlined by a meeting of the United Nations Security Council to be convened later Wednesday.

Washington described the tests as "provocative behaviour" and said it was dispatching a senior official to the region shortly after the firings,

which coincided with the US Independence Day holiday and a US space shuttle launch.

South Korea, which has a policy of engagement with its reclusive neighbour, condemned the missile launches, saying they had threatened regional stability, and urged Pyongyang to return to six-party nuclear disarmament talks.

"North Korea should be held responsible for all the conseguences." said Suh Choo-Suk. South Korean President Roh Moo-Hyun's security policy advisor.

"We express our strong regret at their ill-conceived act," he said, adding South Korea would consult with its allies on how to handle the situation

Japan denounced the launches as a "grave problem", put its troops on a higher state of alert and said it was considering economic sanctions against North Korea.

Japanese vessels were dispatched to the Sea of Japan (East Sea) to try to retrieve the fallen missiles for analysis, Defense Agency head Fukushiro Nukaga

Japan is particularly sensitive to missile tests by North Korea, which in 1998 fired a Taepodong-1 missile over Japan into the Pacific, prompting Tokyo and Washington to step up cooperation to build missile defenses.

Chief Cabinet Secretary Shinzo Abe said Pyongyang had defied the international community with the launch of the missiles, which landed several hundred kilometers (miles) from the coast of Japan.

'Today's launches were done despite advance warning by the relevant countries," said Abe, the government's top spokesman.

TIB corruption database reveals

The government suffered a loss of Tk 526.27 crore in 2,128 corruption incidents that were reported in the newspapers in 2005, corruption database 2005 published by Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) says. Due to corruption in the local

government and rural development sector alone. Tk 208.9 crore went down the drain, says the TIB database presented at a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club yesterday. Unbounded and unchallenged

power, lack of transparency and weak administrations were the main reasons for spreading corruption in the society, the report observea.

Among 47 sectors that came under the TIB's scrutiny, education, police, health and family planning, local government and rural development and private sector were the

top five corrupt sectors while the secondary education department has the highest incidence of brib-

Police forcibly take money through abuse of power at the police stations and traffic department, the report says, adding that medical college hospitals and health complexes are the most corrupt in the health department.

"We have been observing that the trend of corruption in the country is going up," Chairman of TIB Trustee Board Prof Mozaffar Ahmed said, disclosing the database prepared on the basis of reports published in 26 leading dailies of the country during the year.

He, however, said the grand corruption in the society is yet to be identified, which is one of the weaknesses of the TIB report.

He said if the corruption reduces in the society, it would increase the self-reliance.

"The government invariably seems to be adamant in not fulfilling its obligations and letting (the ceasefire) rot, and then going to a military solution," Thamilselvan said in an interview with AFP here earlier this week
