Charges framed against 5 JMB men in Dhaka

A Dhaka court yesterday framed charges against five Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) leaders and activists in two cases filed in January this year.

The cases -- one under the Arms Act and the other under the Explosive Substances Act -- were filed with Uttara Police Station on

The accused in the cases are Wahidul Islam, 20, Shafiqul Islam, 30, Hafez Ibrahim, 30, Abdullah Al Faruq, 21, and Hanif, 22.

The five pleaded not guilty and demanded justice after Judge Mohammad Rabiul Hassan of the Second Additional Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court framed charges against them.

The Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) on March 30 pressed charges against the five JMB members, showing 36 people as prosecution witnesses

The investigation officer dropped the name of Shakil alias Mollah Omar from the charge sheet as he was killed in a fight with the law enforcers in Comilla on March 12. **SEE PAGE 15 COL 4**

BARAPUKURIA POWER PLANT

Technical glitches cut output by half

The power generation of 250 megawatt (MW) Barapukuria Coal-Powered Plant has come down 50 per cent as it developed technical

The crippled plant is producing power around half its actual capacity for the last 15 days, Power Development Board (PDB) sources

The plant sources claimed a number of technical problems developed in the fan installed in the boiler of the two power generation units, causing the production capacity to come down. The first unit is constantly producing 80 to 100MW

The first unit was earlier scheduled to start trial runs back in October last year but it started in November.

Then it had to be shut down due to technical problems. It again went into operation on January 14 this year and contributed 50 to 60MW of power to the national grid. The authorities detected hundreds of technical faults and shut down the plant again.

On February 8, former state minister for power Iqbal Hassan Mahmood visited the plant and asked the plant's Chinese builder CMC to start commercial operation of both the units by April.

Following the directives, the first unit started production in April. The 250MW power plant's second unit started on February 14. In April, the plant was producing in full capacity around 225 to 245MW power daily.

The plant developed hundreds of faults last month and tripped again shutting down production for sev-

But the plant authorities continued power production during the Fifa World Cup football matches with half its production capabilities.

Sources said since the plant was not equipped with the spare parts for repairing the faults in the boiler, it could not go into full production immediately. However, sources confirmed that a number of spare parts are about to arrive within the next few months.

Power plant sources speculated the fans installed in the boilers might be having trouble for the excessive humidity in the area. Sources said the plant requires 13.5 per cent moisture but they are having 18 to 20 per cent moisture.

The troubled fans of both units need to be replaced but unavailability of the fans is causing the SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

Earlier on Saturday, police charged batons on a teachers' procession at Muktangon in the city, eaving six teachers injured.

The agitating teachers and employees yesterday tried to lay siege to the Technical Education Board demanding reduction of different types of fees for technical students and 100 per cent basic salary from the government exchequer for the teachers and employees of the technical colleges.

BDR, BSF trade gunshots on Shibgani border

Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and Indian Border Security Force (BSF) traded gunshots for about two hours on Kironganj border in Shibganj upazila of the district early

However, there was no report of any casualty.

Inhabitants of two frontier villages -- Jaminpur and Marantola -- got panicky as tension prevailed in the area following the gunfire that broke out after Saturday midnight.

BDR sources said the Indian BSF from Churi Anantapur outpost started "unprovoked" firing towards Bangladesh territory, forcing the BDR jawans to return the fire.

The BSF used nearly 300 rounds of bullets against 117 fired by BDR during the exchange of fire that continued till about 2:00am.

on North Korea Pyongyang not bound by resolution

The UN Security Council voted unanimously on Saturday for a resolution requiring nations to prevent North Korea from obtaining dangerous weapons and demanding Pyongyang halt its ballistic missile programme.

North Korea said on Sunday it was not bound by a UN Security Council resolution, which has created "an extremely dangerous situation" and the country would "bolster its war deterrent" in every

The Security Council had acted with "irresponsibility," by voting unanimously for a resolution requiring nations to prevent North Korea from obtaining dangerous weapons, an unnamed North Korean

foreign ministry spokesman was quoted as saying by the official KCNA news agency.

North Korea immediately "totally rejected" the resolution. Its UN Ambassador Pak Gil Yon told the council that Pyongyang's missile development preserved a balance of forces in Northeast Asia and test launches would continue.

"It is clear to everyone that there is no need for the DPRK to unilaterally put on hold the missile launches under such a situation," Pak told the council following the vote, using the acronym for his country's formal name, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea
