# More taken out than pumped in thru' FDI

Foreign investors have taken out more money than they have pumped into Bangladesh in the last five years mainly through profit repatriation and repayment of loans with foreign banks.

Bangladesh Bank sources said out of several hundred foreign investors in the country, a few mobile phone companies dominate this outflow of money, followed by oil and gas companies and foreign banks.

Between 2001 and 2005, foreign investors repatriated \$2,744 million while the foreign direct investment (FDI) inflowwas \$2,185 million.

FDI records for 1996 to 2005 show the investors remitted \$3,626 million or 81 percent of their investment of \$4,457 million.

The data shows that between 1996 and 2000, the country enjoyed a higher rate of FDI inflow with a lower outflow of profit and loan

According to Board of Investment (BOI) data, investors in telecommunications sector claim 36 per cent of the total FDI, textiles 18 per cent and chemical industries 7 per cent, oil companies 18 per cent, banks 10 per cent and power companies 2 per cent.

Investments in telecom, energy and financial institutions have been categorised as service sector investments and the rest as manufacturing sector investments. The main outflow of money is taking place in the service sector that does not export any commodity or

The data shows that in 2001, the FDI was \$355 million while the investors repatriated \$175m in profit and \$188m in loan repayment. In 2002, the FDI was \$328m while investors repatriated \$195m in profit and \$243m in loan repayment. In 2003, the FDI was \$350m, profit repatriated \$355m and loan repayment \$229m. In 2004, the FDI was \$460 m, profit repatriated \$338m and loan repayment \$372m. In 2005, the FDI was \$692m while investors repatriated \$418m in profit and \$208m in loan repay-

Bangladesh Bank information shows that between January and May this year, investors repatriated \$180 million in profit.

#### 19 injured as Shibir attacks BCL rally

Islami Chhatra Shibir (ICS) yester-day attacked a Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) protest rally at Govt BL University College in Khulna that left 19 students injured.

The clash erupted around 11:30am when Shibir activists attacked BCL and Chhatra Union activists when they were holding a rally on campus protesting against the incident at Jagannath University on Monday.

Locals said a large number of non-student Shibir cadres led by ICS BL University College unit President Mian Mujahidul Islam attacked the BCL protest rally without any provocation.

They clubbed BCL and Chhatra Union activists with iron rods and pelted brickbats. Three critically injured were admitted to Khulna Medical College Hospital.

## Investigators trace Hundi operation

Investigators probing heroin smuggling to the UK has found that BD Foods Ltd had brought Tk 80-90 lakh since 1995 up to March 2005 into the country from various foreign countries including the UK through hundi.

Sources said while checking banking information of 12 business houses, including BD Foods Ltd and its nine sister concerns, the investigators unearthed the transaction of the huge amount of illegal

Detained BD Foods Chairman Badruddoza Chowdhury Momen also admitted to bringing the money through hundi when investigators asked him during remand about the inconsistencies between his earnings and capital.

start checking minutely the banking information of the 12 companies to find out if any other shoddy transaction was made by the busi-

ness houses," a source said. Apart from smuggling heroin, the BD Foods used to ship dried fish and beef--hiding them in the consignments of legitimate items like vegetables and frozen fish--to different foreign countries although it had no official permission for such exports.

Badruddoza would sell the exportable items at unusually lesser prices as he earned a huge amount of money from smuggling heroin and selling items for which he had no export permission. Kazi Zafar Reza, proprietor of

## SC Bar mulls going to president, CJ to raise its objection

The Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) is contemplating taking up with the president and the chief justice its opposition to confirmation of some of the 19 additional judges of the High Court appointed in August 2004 amid controversy.

Leaders of the SCBA also plan to move the High Court against the law ministry's inaction regarding the controversy over academic certificate and age of Justice Faisal Mahmud Faizee despite a directive from the president's office.

"We would urge the chief justice to have extensive consultations with the senior judges and advocates, and prepare an evaluation sheet about these judges (19 addi-Zafar, who confessed to been appointed on the basis of SEE PAGE 15 COL 3 | party allegiance only," SCBA

President Barrister Amir-Ul-Islam told The Daily Star last night.

The president confirms appointment of judges of the SC and the HC on the recommendation of the chief justice.

# Search on for tsunami survivors

## Death toll crosses 340 across Indonesian coast

Rescuers yesterday desperately sifted through wreckage for survivors of a tsunami that killed more than 340 people and left scores missing when it slammed into Indonesia's Java coast.

In a harrowing reminder of the 2004 disaster that left 220,000 dead across Asia, walls of water up to three metres (10 feet) high smashed ashore Monday, toppling buildings and sending thousands of terrified residents fleeing. The tsunami was triggered by a

7.7-magnitude undersea earthquake off the south coast of Java island, where no early warning system had yet been put in place and many residents had no inkling of the tragedy to come. Heff Martin, a 26-year-old Swiss

office worker, said he and his fiancee had only moments to "think with clear heads and use common sense" to save their lives.

Four children were injured in an explosion in a videogames store on Walter Road at Sutrapur in the capital yesterday morning.

The children -- Mithu, 12, Sumon, 9, Ronny, 10 and Israfil -were admitted to Mitford Hospital and released after treatment.

Police said the injured are street urchins and they live around the neighbourhood Witnesses said the bomb

exploded at around 10:30am with a loud bang while the children were busy playing video games in the games store. Jhantu, the owner of the store

said the bomb was inside a plastic bag left in the store by one of his regular young gamers only a few minutes before the explosion. Investigating Officer Sub

Inspector Aiyub at Sutrapur Police Station said the bomb was a lowcapacity 'cracker'.
