8 killed in road accidents

Eight people were killed and 25 others injured in separate road accidents across the country

Two people, including an elderly man, were killed in separate road accidents in the capital.

Police said Arifa Akhtar, 30, a garment worker was killed this afternoon as a speedy passenger bus hit her at Darus Salam when she was crossing the road.

In another accident, Abul Basher, 70, was killed when a microbus hit him at Nayapaltan this evening. Police seized the

In Feni, two people were killed and 14 others injured when a Dhaka-bound passenger bus hit an autorickshaw at Mollaghata Bazar on the Feni-Maijdee road.

Driver of the autorickshaw Abdul Karim, 38, and its passenger others sustained injuries, police and witnesses said.

In Faridpur, a woman was killed and seven others were injured in a road accident at Tambulkhana Bazar on the Faridpur-Saltha road. The dead was identified as

Police said Abu Raihan Sabuj, 25, son of Shafiqul Islam of village Fakirpara under Islampur upazila was killed when his motorbike rammed into a roadside tree with full speed as he lost his control over steering. His nephew Akash sustained serious injuries in the accident

58 dogs killed on JU campus

Fifty-eight dogs were killed on the campus of Jahangirnagar University (JU) yesterday in a drive to kill stray dogs sparking huge resentment among the students on

Most of the dogs killed in the drive were pet and not ill, said a

Though the drive was aimed at a aogs ic prevent spreading of diseases, employees of estate and security offices assisted by Dhaka City Corporation killed the dogs including the pets that came on their way.

'The dogs were killed indiscrimi nately without conducting any test to detect whether the dogs were ill or not, and their bodies were put on the roadside throughout the day,

he added. Earlier on Thursday, a notice was circulated at every dormitory and departmental offices asking everyone to keep their pet tied inside for yesterday or put a belt round its neck to differentiate it from

The students whose pet dogs were killed in the drive, have however alleged that the university authorities did not give them enough time and most of them were not know aware of the drive.

The employees were also blamed for killing a pet dog snatching from its owner.

'Though I told them that it was my pet, they snatched 'Tike', a oneyear-old pet, away from me and injected it to death," said Probir who was having fun with the pet at university transport area at around 10:00am before it was killed. "No student can keep any dog or

tame it in any dormitory. How a student can keep a pet in a dormitory?" asked Abu Bakar Siddik deputy registrar of the university brushing aside the allegation of killing any pet of any student.

"If anyone informs us that stray dogs are still roaming on the campus, the drive will be launched again," he added.

G-8 leaders condemn Mumbai blasts

The leaders of G-8 and other countries have condemned the recent serial bomb blasts in Mumbai and expressed solidarity with the Indian government.

"We are united with India in our resolve to intensify efforts to fight terrorism, which constitutes a threat to each of our countries, as well as to international peace and security," they said in a joint state-

The leaders of G-8, Brazil, China, India, Mexico, South Africa, Chairman of the Council of the Heads of State of the CIS, Chairman of the African Union, and the Heads of the International Organisations issued the statement in St. Petersburg on July 17, said a press release of High Commission of India in Dhaka.

Expressing deepest condolences to the victims and their families, the leaders said, "We are outraged by the barbaric terrorist acts, carried out on 11 July 2006 in Mumbai and other parts of India."

"We are determined to continue the fight against terrorism by all legitimate means. We express our readiness to undertake all necessarv measures to bring to justice perpetrators, organisers, sponsors of these and other terrorist acts, and those who incited the perpetrators to commit them.

"We shall do it in accordance with our obligations under international law, in particular international human rights law, refugee law and numanitarian law."

Children need more exercise to cut heart risk: Study

Children need to do more exercise than recommended in international guidelines to reduce their risk of developing cardiovascular disease. a team of researchers said vester-

Instead of one hour a day of moderate physical activity, young people may need to do 90 minutes to stave off high blood pressure, raised cholesterol levels and other risk factors that can lead to heart problems.

"Physical activity levels need to be higher than the current international guidelines of at least one hour per day," said Lars Bo Andersen of the Norwegian School of Sports Science in Oslo.

Andersen and his team assessed the impact of exercise on 1,732 children from Denmark, Estonia and Portugal, aged either nine or 15. They compared the amount of

exercise they did every day and measured their risks of developing heart disease. They found that the more the children exercised, the more their

combined risks factor score decreased Nine-year-olds who did 116 minutes of moderate to vigorous

exercise a day and the teens who exercised for 88 minutes daily had the lowest risk factor scores. according to the research published in The Lancet medical jour-

Tiger habitat shrinks by 40 pc in 10 years

Tigers have 40 percent less habitat than they did a decade ago, due to intense poaching and the rise of an Asian middle class that puts pressure on the big cats and their environment, wildlife experts said on Thursday

"Wild tigers and their habitats are in danger because they're suffering from international crime, economic exploitation and environmental depredation," said John Seidensticker, a scientist at the US National Zoo and chair of the Save The Tiger Fund Council, a conservation group.

"We must make live tigers worth more than dead tigers, and landscapes with tigers worth more than landscapes that are missing this most beautiful cat," Seidensticker said at a news conference held next to a zoo enclosure. where a Sumatran tiger breakfasted under a tree.

Tigers live in just 7 percent of their historic range, which once included large areas from the shores of the Black Sea to the

Korean peninsula. The biggest tiger landscapes now are in the Russian Far East and northeastern China and along

the Nepal-India border, according

Wildlife Fund, the Save the Tiger Fund and the Wildlife Conservation Society. The report was billed as the most comprehensive scientific study of tiger habitat. Poaching of tigers for their parts,

swaths of forest that tigers need to thrive have been fragmented, and parts that remain are too isolated to support the big cats. Dinerstein said. Other parts of the tigers' range have been converted to plantations of oil palms, acacia or other crops, he said.

Estimating the number of wild tigers is difficult, Dinerstein said, but he noted that if there were an estimated 5,000 to 7,000 tigers a decade ago, there are almost certainly fewer than 5,000 now.

"There are probably more tigers alive in private hands in the state of Texas than in the wild worldwide,"
