## Steps taken to evacuate Bangladeshis from Lebanon

Foreign Secretary Hemayetuddin yesterday said that the government has made all arrangements including chartering aircraft if necessary to evacuate the willing Bangladeshi nationals from war-torn Lebanon.

Meanwhile, an International Organization for Migration (IOM) official in Dhaka yesterday said that a convoy of 250 Bangladeshis under IOM supervision would fly from Lebanon to Damascus sometime today.

According to an official estimate, around 10,000 Bangladeshis live in Lebanon, mostly in Beirut.

Hemayetuddin at a briefing said the government had requested IOM in Dhaka and Geneva to provide road transportation for the Bangladeshis up to Damascus as well.

# BNP, AL under allies' pressure

Both the ruling BNP and main opposition Awami League (AL) seem to be under pressure from their allies over sharing seats for the upcoming parliamentary election slated for early next year.

The two parties are now out to forge a grand alliance by including Jatiya Party (JP-Ershad). They are even ready to offer a maximum of 100 seats to their partners including 50 to JP-Ershad, said sources.

Components of ruling four-party and opposition 14-party alliances have already drawn up lists of constituencies they plan to contest

from. Now as they seek to strike a bargain with the partners, conflicts over the issue seem growing within the alliances, added the sources.

Talking to The Daily Star, AL Presidium Member Kazi Zafarullah said, "We are ready to discuss seat sharing with our alliance partners. But decisions on the issue will come when we will know who our partners are."

"As the biggest party in the alliance, Awami League will have to make the maximum sacrifice in sharing seats," Zafarullah, a close aide to AL President Sheikh Hasina, said adding that AL President Sheikh Hasina has already commis-

sioned a team to lay the groundwork for the next election.

Observers say the prospects seem bright for Bikalpa Dhara Bangladesh (BDB) and Jatiya Party (JP-Manju) joining the 14 party alliance. But for that to happen, BDB leaders want confirmation of the constituencies to be assigned to its leaders including all seats in Munshiganj district.

Zaker Party leader Mostafa Amir Faisal will also seek nomination from the prospective grand coalition led by Sheikh Hasina.

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## JUDICIARY SEPARATION SC asks for details on govt anomalies

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday asked the intervener of the judiciary separation case to submit on Thursday the comparative chart of the anomalies that the government committed in implementing the 12-point directives of the court.

Attorney General (AG) AJ Mohammad Ali submitted a progress report before the court regarding the implementation of the judiciary separation.

The AG also submitted Bangladesh Judicial Service (Constitution, Recruitment in the Entry Point, Temporary Suspension, Dismissal and Removal) Rules 2006 and the Bangladesh Judicial Service (Posting, Promotion, Leave Grant, Control, Discipline and other Service Conditions) Rules 2006 that the government published on June 12 through a gazette notification as part of the judiciary separation.

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# EC sounds tough on reluctant field staff

## Secretary meets finance secy who says 'many things' to verify before fund release

With many assistant officials still remaining absent from the task for updating the voter list, the secretary of the Election Commission (EC) Secretariat yesterday warned of actions against those who are 'intentionally' trying to get relief from the task.

While the assistant officials are unwilling to work for updating the voter list mainly due to uncertainty about the remuneration, the EC Secretariat did not get allocation of funds for the purpose from the finance ministry as of yesterday.

EC Secretary Abdur Rashid

Sarkar, who discussed the matter of funds allocation with the finance secretary yesterday, said the ministry will allocate funds in a day or two.

Finance Secretary Siddiqur Rahman Chowdhury, however, told reporters that it will need a week to settle the issue of allocation of funds required by the EC Secretariat as there are 'many things' to verify.

Abdur Rashid said the finance ministry is satisfied with the clarification that the EC Secretariat sent on Sunday about its previous expenditure of Tk 43 crore for preparing the 'controversial' fresh voter list.

He said the assistant officials will be provided with remuneration upon

allocation of fund by the finance ministry.

The EC secretary, who had earlier denied media reports about idling of many assistant officials, yesterday said, "We will be compelled to take action against those who will refrain from work."

Although the secretary said he did not receive any such report, information gathered from the field contradicts his claim.

About crisis of forms, he said it will be solved soon.

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# Rice in Lebanon as fierce fighting rages through

## Two Israeli soldiers killed, helicopter 'downed', UN appeals for \$150m

US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice was in Beirut yesterday at the start of a high-stakes mission to try to end the devastating conflict in Lebanon, even as Israeli troops were locked in deadly combat with Hezbollah guerrillas.

Confrontations again took place inside Marun al-Ras, a strategic village at an altitude of 900 metres (3,000 feet) that provides an excellent observation point for the area, security sources said.

Hezbollah guerrillas came from behind a convoy of Israeli forces in the northern sector of the hilltop village, striking a tank, which caught fire, they said.

Two soldiers were reported killed in pitched battles with Shiite Muslim militiamen on the 13th day of cross-border warfare as Israel troops in tanks, bulldozers and armoured personnel carriers pushed even deeper into Lebanon.

A combat helicopter also crashed in northern Israel near the border with Lebanon, causing victims, the army said. Hezbollah claimed it had shot it down.

The Israeli military said an army helicopter crashed in an accident on the Israeli side of the border, causing casualties. But Hezbollah claimed it had downed the aircraft.

In the fighting on the road to Bint Jbeil, four Israeli tanks were hit and "totally burnt while their crews were killed or wounded," Hezbollah said.

"The Mujahideen (fighters) are confronting the enemy army, which is backed by airborne commandos and is trying to advance north of the village of Marun Al-Ras toward Bint Jbeil," the Shiite militant group said.

"They are engaged in fierce confrontations," it added.

## Finance finds it unusual to spend twice for same purpose

The finance ministry is scrutinising the legal aspects of spending twice for preparing the voter list as the Election Commission (EC) received Tk 45 crore from it last fiscal year and is now demanding another Tk 40 crore.

Earlier, the prime minister visited Kuwait in April and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) in May this year.

Asked if the Saudi king will pay an official visit to Bangladesh, the foreign secretary said Bangladesh would be very happy to receive him.

"Our bilateral relations are not only profound but brotherly and spiritual," the foreign secretary said.

# Open fire on attackers

## Commerce minister tells garment factory owners

Commerce Minister Hafizuddin Ahmed yesterday asked the garment owners to open fire in case of attacks on their factories in future.

"Sometimes you have to be tough. You can wait for one or two incidents and then straight fire on the attackers to save your factories," he said referring to the recent labour unrest in the readymade garment sector.

The minister was speaking as the chief guest at a meeting with the garment owners at Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and

Exporters Association (BGMEA) office in Dhaka.

Hafizuddin, however, urged the owners to try their best to raise the salary of the garment workers and implement the memorandum of understanding (MoU) signed at a tripartite meeting in June.

"The owners should increase the workers' salary so that they can lead a decent life. At the same time, there should not be any unrealistic demand from the workers' side as well," the minister observed.

Speaking at the meeting, former BGMEA president Annisul Huq said the workers are demanding a salary

hike of an astronomical 525 per cent and they are demanding Tk 24,425 a month for a grade-I worker. The industry cannot afford to meet such demands, he added.

There are several hundred sick garment factories and this is one of the three major problems the apparel sector is faced with, he said adding that a large number of factories are barely surviving on marginal profit.

Annisul represents BGMEA in the six-member board formed by the government to recommend a pay scale for the workers.

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
