

During Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia's visit to Pakistan in February 2006, our two Prime Ministers agreed to increase bilateral two-way trade to USS one billion by the year 2007. Several MOUs were signed including in the areas of agriculture, tourism and export, promotion. It was also agreed to work towards a bilateral Free Trade Agreement. Once finalised, it will give fresh impetus to bilateral trade and commerce.

Council met to identify measures o further strengthen mutually beneficial economic cooperation. A Joint Working Group has been formed to reinforce this process. Pakistan has extended the facility of duty free import of jute and has offered to enhance duty free import of tea to 15000 tons per annum. Exchanges between our business communities are on the rise. There is now greater private sector participation in our respective trade fairs. The first meeting of the Joint Business Council will be taking place later this month. As a result of these measures, bilateral trade has grown by 20% over last year to approximately US\$ 340 million in 2005-06.

More than 70% of Pakistani exports to Bangladesh are raw materials for Bangladesh's growing textile industry. Value addition takes place in Bangladesh from which the country continues to greatly benefit. Hence, the major share of Pakistani exports to Bangladesh are in the form of inputs for the country's largest




