Saifur critical of donors over no help in tackling oil price fallout

Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday criticised the role of the World Bank (WB) and the International Monetary Fund (IMF) for not assisting the poor countries to overcome the impact of soaring oil prices

"I would say it's unfortunate that the big institutions like them (World Bank and IMF) could not feel the burden (of poor countries)," he told reporters at Zia International Airport on return from the USA, ending a 10-day visit.

ACC, NBR lock horns over jurisdiction

The Anti-corruption Commission (ACC) finds itself in the centre of a controversy again as it has engaged in a tug of war with the National Board of Revenue (NBR) over detection of tax evasion incidents.

The ACC wrote a letter on Sunday to the NBR and Dhaka Customs House informing the agencies that a large amount of goods had been imported to the inland container depot (ICD) through under-invoicing and false declarations.

The commission also requested Dhaka Customs to launch a massive search to detect such tax evasions and to open suspicious containers for inspection in the presence of ACC officials.

The NBR reacted to the ACC move saving the move is in complete violation of the Customs Act and detection of tax evasions in such ways is beyond the ACC's jurisdiction

NBR chairman Abdul Karim said he has yet to receive the letter. "I have yet to get the letter. If the ACC issued such a letter it is beyond their jurisdiction," the chairman said.

Sources said the NBR will inform Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman about the matter and seek his intervention in the tussle between the two government agencies.

62 killed as car bombs, rockets rock Baghdad

Car bombs and a rocket barrage struck a predominantly Shia neighbourhood in Baghdad on Sunday, killing at least 62 people, a municipal official said

The rockets apparently were fired from a mostly Sunni district targeted by US troops in a crackdown against the sectarian violence roiling the capital.

About 140 were injured in the attack on the Zafraniyah neighbourhood in southern Baghdad, which began about 7:15 p.m. with two car bombs and a barrage of an estimated nine rockets, Defence Ministry spokesman Col. Saddoun

Abu al-Ula said. He said the barrage heavily damaged three buildings, including a multi-story apartment house that collapsed. Al-Ula said the rockets appeared to have been fired from the neighbourhood of Dora, which has been the focus of thousands of US troops sent to try to restore peace in Baghdad.

The head of a municipal council, Mohammed al-Rubaie, told Iraqi government television Monday that the death toll had risen to 62. He gave no precise number of injured but officials late Sunday put the figure at more than 140.

As rescuers dragged more bloodied corpses from rubble left in the Al-Qubyasi market by Sunday night's blasts, more car bombs killed three people in downtown Baghdad and a missile crashed into the fortified "Green Zone".

Several large explosions were heard in central Baghdad at sunrise Monday, but it was unclear where they came from

The complex style of the assault was similar to a July 27 attack of mortars, rockets and car bombs on another mostly Shia district. Karradah, which killed 31 people. Police said the rockets and mortars that struck Karradah also were fired from Dora.
