Regulatory policy key obstacle to growth of media: Study

A study on the media's role in development underscored the need to diversify terrestrial television and radio broadcasting in order to improve access to information for the economically and socially disadvantaged people.

The study, conducted by a media advocacy group facilitated by civil society think-tank Bangladesh Enterprise Institute (BEI), identified the regulatory policy for the electronic media as the key constraints to the growth of media landscape in Bangladesh.

With the vision to create a policy environment conducive to the growth of diverse terrestrial broadcast industry, the study titled 'Media in Development: Linkages afford to watch those channels, between Socio-Economic Development and Diversified rural areas, he said.

Media in Bangladesh' offered detailed insights into the current state of the media from socioeconomic perspectives and defines the role of the media in achieving the country's development goals.

INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES Constitutional recognition a must to ensure rights

Constitutional recognition of indigenous communities is the first step towards ensuring their rights observed the speakers at a seminar vesterdav

They underscored the need for collective action to elevate their living standard as well as to uphold their distinct identity on equal footing with others.

They also opined that the launching of special development programmes for indigenous people and inclusion of their rights in the election manifestos of political parties would greatly contribute to their development.

The seminar titled 'Celebrating 109th Anniversary of Munda Uprising' was organised by Bangladesh Adibasi Odhikar Andolon (BAOA) at the National Press Club in the city.

Speaking at the programme BAOA Convenor Dr Mesbah Kamal said during colonial rule Munda community fought against the British rulers to establish their customary rights to land and forest which ultimately led to their movement for political power. "The struggle for establishing

their rights is not over. Still they are fighting to achieve their rights," he said.

Munda was an inspiration who led Munda uprising against the British colonial power in 1897," said Dr Kamal

Saying that the country's indigenous communities have distinct socio-cultural settings and are more vulnerable compared to mainstream population, Justice KM Sobhan stressed the need for special legislation to protect their riahts

"And there is no legal bar in such legislation as our constitutake special arrangement for the development of marginalised sections of the society," he said. Country Representative of Oxfam GB Bangladesh Anil Prabhakar Tambay said, "Only through a collective action the indigenous communities can improve their overall condition." He suggested people of indige-

tion permits the government to nous communities to celebrate their self-identity with special reference to their own history and culture so that the good aspects of their life do not die out.

Prof Muntassir Mamoon of Dhaka University said a propeople government is a precondition to uplift the status and condition of the indigenous people. Woman activist Prof Maleka

Begum chaired the programme which was also addressed by BAOA General Secretary Sanjib Drong, Ashraf ul Alam Tutu, Merina Juthi, Budu Munda, Harikrishna Munda and other leaders of indigenous communities.
