Ohio internet healthcare help for Bagerhat women

Rural women in Bangladesh now can get advanced medical counselling from the specialists in the US, thanks to the Internet service.

Amader Gram ICT for Development -- a non-government organisation (NGO) -- is going to launch an online service in detecting breast cancer in Bagerhat district from the second week of this month.

The International Breast Cancer Research Foundation (IBCRF) of Ohio State University, USA will provide the service through Internet

for the rural women of Bangladesh. "Initially the service for detecting breast cancer will be available at the Shaplaful Mother & Child Health Care Centre -- an associate organisation of Amader Gram -- in Bagerhat and later it will be extended to other areas of the country gradually," Reza Salim,

told The Daily Star. The advice of US specialists will be available within eight hours in diagnosis of breast cancer and they will also make necessary suggestions for treatment.

Amader Gram and IBCRF has recently signed a Memorandum of Agreement in Bagerhat to execute the project. Reza Salim and Heather Roberto, research specialist of IBCRF, signed the agreement on behalf of their organisations.

Initial screening will be done to those with the breast tumour or other symptoms at the Primary Screening Centre. The reports of all these tests will be sent to the IBCRF through Internet

the desert towards the Shia holy city Karbala and shot dead 11 Pakistani and three Indian men.

"They were coming in a big bus with children and women. The attackers freed the women and children and shot dead the men. execution-style." said interior ministry spokesman Brigadier General Abdul Karim Khalaf.

Kadhim confirmed the death toll, and said the bus had taken a route past Ramadi, a stronghold of Sunni Arab rebels, who are often blamed for murderous attacks against Iraq's

EU sets deadline for Iran over nukes row

Annan in Tehran for talks

The European Union agreed yesterday to try to clarify Iran's stance on halting uranium enrichment within two weeks as the UN secretary general arrived in Tehran to discuss the dispute.

Kofi Annan's visit to Iran takes place two days after the UN nuclear watchdog, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), reported Tehran had failed to meet the UN Security Council's August 31 deadline to suspend sensitive work.

The United States, which accuses Iran of seeking atomic sulting European governments about possible sanctions against the Islamic Republic, but the EU signaled it wanted to see more dialogue with Tehran which says its atomic activity is aimed at producing

EU foreign policy chief Javier Solana will meet Iran's chief nuclear negotiator, Ali Larijani, next week to try to clear up ambiguities in Tehran's 21-page reply to the major powers' offer of broad cooperation if
