### 65pc watch television

Survey reveals

Sixty-five percent of people aged 15 and above watch television at least once a week, according to a recent survey by ACNielsen, a market research and information com-

pany.

The reach of the media was studied through Bangladesh Media and Demographic Survey on about 15,000 people in both urban and

rural areas, says a press release.
"Overall, the television viewership has increased by 34 percentage point in the last ten years due to various satellite chan-nels. The radio listenership has also increased to 24 percent in 2006 from 22 percent in the last year," Dr Khalid Hasan, managing director of ACNielsen Bangladesh, quoted from the survey results.

The survey also found that the ownership of television has changed tremendously, which has reflected in the lifestyle of mass people. At present, 41 percent of the households have television, whereas only 8 percent owned television in 1995

The report of the Bangladesh Media and Demographic Survey 2006 was launched at Brac Centre Inn in Dhaka recently.

Dr Khalid Hasan, managing director, and SA Taha, client service director of ACNielsen Bangladesh, explained the various changes of the media exposure while Satish D Belani, director, operations, ACNielsen India, demonstrated the software used in the survey.

Representatives from the media encies and national and multinational companies were present at the programme.
