## ICC rejects PCB request

Pakistan's demand that Australian umpire Darrell Hair should not be appointed at next month's Champions Trophy has been rejected by the International Cricket Council (ICC). "The ICC have said that respon-

sibility of appointing umpires was given to it by the executive board and no country should make such demands on it." a Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) official told Reuters on

In the next few days, the ICC is due to announce the umpires for the Champions Trophy being held from October 7 in India.

Following the ball-tampering row with Hair in the Oval test against England last month, the Pakistan board had written to the ICC insisting he should not be posted in the tournament due to his controversial

The Pakistan team refused to play on in the fourth test after Hair and fellow umpire Billy Doctrove changed the ball and penalised them five runs for alleged ball-

The umpires awarded the test to

England and the ICC later charged captain Inzamamul Haq with several violations of its Code of Conduct and he is due to attend a two-day hearing in London from September 27

"The letter had been sent to the ICC President, Percy Sonn, in which we had expressed our reservations if Hair was appointed," said the official, who declined to be named.

The official added that in the reply, the ICC said it could not accept member countries dictating the appointment of umpires and Hair, being on the elite panel, SEE PAGE 18 COL 5

## Four athletes tested positive at 10th SA Games

Four athletes from Sri Lanka, Nena and Pakistan tested positive for banned performance enhancing drugs at last month's South Asian Games.

The competitors involved were Pakistani boxers Nauman Karim and Mohamed Lassi, Sri Lankan 100m silver medalist Jani Chathurangani Silva and a Nepalese athlete whose name was not released, Sri Lanka's National Olympic Committee president Hemasiri Fernando said Friday.

They were all proven positive for using banned drugs at the conclusion of the eight-nation Games held from August 14-29, said Fernando, who was also South Asian Games chairman "We have informed the respec-

tive sports bodies of those countries about the investigation's results and are yet to receive their response," he Fernando said the athletes car

challenge the preliminary investigation results by requesting a second sample test. Meanwhile, local newspapers

# Lee storm blows India

A fiery Brett Lee bowled Australia into the DLF Cup one-day final on Friday, grabbing three late wickets to hand his side a tense 18-run victory over India at the Kinrara Oval in Kuala Lumpur yesterday.

It sets up a final showdown with the West Indies on Sunday.

Set 214 to win, India looked on the brink of winning at 185-6 before Lee returned to the attack and polished off the tail. He accounted for Sachin

Tendulkar and Virender Sehwag in his first spell and ended with 5-38 off

Dinesh Mongia was India's rock, remaining not out on 63.

Australia were skittled out for 213 but the target was never going to be easy with Glenn McGrath and Lee in action, and India got off to a bad start when Tendulkar fell for four.

McGrath thought he'd got the master batsman on his first ball when Tendulkar attempted a pull but missed. It hit his shoulder, rifling into

wicketkeeper Brad Haddin's gloves. He appealed for the catch and umpire Mark Benson gave him out before deciding he'd got it wrong and waved him back to the crease.

Ricky Ponting wasn't happy but cheered up five balls later when Tendulkar sliced a Lee rocket to Michael Hussey at point.

Lee was storming in and bowled Sehwag for 10 in his next over.

Stuart Clark, who was smacked for 87 off seven overs in his last match, took the chance to redeem himself, taking a reflex catch off his own bowling to dismiss Mohammad Kaif for 21.

He followed it three balls later by bagging the key wicket of Rahul Dravid, trapping him lbw for seven to leave the Indians in big trouble.

But Mongia and Suresh Raina knuckled down, putting on a 46-run stand for the fifth wicket before Raina fell for 26 to spinner Brad

MS Dhoni joined Mongia and they added 62 before Lee came back for his second spell and temped Dhoni (23) to hole out to Damien Martyn.

Hogg got Ajit Agarkar and Andrew Symonds snared Harbhajan Singh, before Lee ripped into the tail.

Earlier, a seventh wicket stand of 77 between Haddin and Hogg saved Australia's blushes after poor running between the wickets cost them dear.

The pair came together with Australia in trouble at 117 for six to steer them to a defendable score after Ponting won the toss and

Harbhajan Singh was again in top form, taking 1-24 from his 10 overs. Matthew Hayden top-scored with a gritty 54. Haddin (46) and Hogg (38) were the only others to

find their groove.

Agarkar made the early breakthrough, tempting Simon Katich to flav at a ball outside off stump and Raina took a spectacular diving

Then in marched Ponting, knowing that the last two Australian captains who failed to reach the finals of a tri-series -- Mark Taylor in 1997 and Steve Waugh in 2002 --

lost their jobs. He looked nervous and lasted just eight balls, caught at fine leg by Agarkar for four off Patel.

Hayden appeared set for a big innings before a disastrous mix-up with Martyn cost him his wicket, run

Mongia was brought into the

action and his left arm spin paid dividends when Martyn was also run out, for 19. Symonds went the next ball for two. Haddin and Hussey came together but didn't last long, with

Hussey edging Harbhajan to Dravid at slip on 13. It brought Hogg to the crease and with Haddin he steered

## Younis 'promises' clean ball

Pakistan's bowling coach Waqar Younis claimed in an interview Friday that the ball in the controversial tampering saga that led to Pakistan forfeiting a Test to England last month had showed no signs of illegal alteration.

The fourth Test between England and Pakistan at The Oval ended in bizarre fashion on the fourth day when the tourists refused to take the field after tea in protest at being penalised five runs for ball-tampering by umpires Darrell Hair and Billy Doctrove. It led to the first forfeit in 129

years of Test cricket and an England win which gave the hosts a 3-0 series victory.

Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq was subsequently charged with ball tampering and bringing the game into disrepute. The International Cricket Council will hold a hearing into the charges in London on September 27-28.

No television cameras at The Oval are understood to have captured Pakistani players engaging in illegal ball tampering and the condition of the ball will be central to the umpires' case against Inzamam.

But Wagar insisted Friday that

the ball, which had been used for 56 overs, showed no sign of having been tampered with

The former Pakistan Test paceman told The Sydney Morning Herald from his Sydney home he saw the ball immediately after it was taken from the field. "I went straight into the ref-

eree's room and asked to see the ball," Waqar told the paper. "There was nothing wrong with

it. I went and told the boys that I thought it was totally wrong -- I promise you, nothing was wrong "There were 30-odd cameras at the ground that didn't see anything,

so you would think there had to be something wrong with the ball for Darrell (Hair) to do what he did. "But I promise: I saw the ball and

there was nothing wrong with it." "It was bad for cricket, but if you ask me, it was good for our country

and our reputation," Wagar added. "It wasn't just about ball tampering. By doing what he did, (Hair) was calling the whole Pakistan team cheats, penalising us five runs with no evidence. That was totally wrong.'

If Inzamam is found guilty at the ICC hearing he could be suspended for a maximum of five Tests or 10 one-day internationals and may also be fined.
