be Tk 2156." "If a worker wants to consume 2,122 calorie food every day, he or she has to spend Tk 1016 per month only for food. But the workers have to bear other costs of the

family as well," she said. Emphasising the need for a compromise between the workers and the owners to come to an agreement on the minimum wage, Mahbubur Rahman, president of International Chamber of Commerce - Bangladesh (ICCB) said if the garment owners have the ability to pay the workers as per the newly declared minimum wage, they must pay it, but it would not be viable for an industrial unit that does not have the ability

information about Osama's death." Saudi-born Bin Laden was based in Afghanistan until the Taliban government there was overthrown by US-backed forces in late 2001. Since then, US and Pakistani officials have regularly said they believe he is hiding somewhere on the rugged border between Afghanistan and Pakistan.
