JS passes labour bill amid AL walkout

The parliament yesterday passed Bangladesh Labour Bill 2006 amid strong protest from the main opposition Awami League (AL) followed by an AL walkout led by its leader Sheikh Hasina.

The main opposition walked out of the House yesterday protesting a parliamentary standing committee report on the bill which did not include a note of dissent of an AL lawmaker and failed to mention a subsequent walkout of the dissenting member of the commit-

Abdul Kader Siddiqui of Krishok Sramik Janata League also walked out of the House yesterday protesting the speaker's attitude. "The record of the note of dissent and the walkout of a member of the standing committee from the meeting must be included in the committee report and we will walk out of the House in protest if you don't include that before passing the bill," Kader Siddiqui told the speaker in the House.

JMB leaders may not be executed in govt tenure

Families now plan to appeal against 'worldly court' verdict

An uncertainty suddenly raised its head regarding the executions of seven condemned militants of Jamaatul Mujahideen Bangladesh, as the government yesterday said it has no intention of executing them before Eid-ul-Fitr even if they do not appeal within seven days of signing of the death warrants.

Law Minister Barrister Moudud Ahmed said yesterday that the government does not want to execute anyone during Ramadan.

Whether the executions can be carried out before the present government hands over power on October 28 has also become a topic of discussion as many are inquiring whether the government is going to shift from its previous position of favouring executions of the condemned Islamist militants before it hands over power to a caretaker

Asked whether the executions can be carried out before the pres-

ent government's tenure ends, Moudud did not reply directly but told reporters, "I'll discuss the

matter with the home ministry. Iftekhar Al Mamun, one of the condemned seven, already appealed against his death sentence, the inspector general of prisons told The Daily Star yesterday evening. Another one of them is on the run.

Family sources said two other condemned -- Khaled Saifullah and Abdul Awal are also preparing

Meantime, Rafiqul Islam, brother of condemned Bangla Bhai, told reporters last night that a relative of them will appeal against Bangla Bhai's death sentence maintaining legal process.

Talking on the reason for not executing the condemned militants during Ramadan, the law minister said the jail code does not allow executions during Ramadan.

But, Inspector General of Prisons Brigadier General Zakir

Hasan said there is no such prohibition in the jail code. "But there is a government circular of the early 80's which says executions cannot be carried out during Ramadan."

He however said who among the condemned militants will not appeal during the stipulated time can be executed before the present government hands over power.

According to the rules, the condemned militants, to whom the death warrants were read out on Friday and Saturday, will be able to appeal against the death penalties confirmed by the High Court on August 31, within seven days of receiving the death warrants. The deadlines for appeals will end on September 29 and 30.

If any of them do not appeal by the stipulated time, he can be executed only after 21 days following the deadlines for appeals. They can be executed not before three weeks and not after four weeks following the deadlines for

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) military commander Ataur Rahman Sunny and four others to 11 years' rigorous imprisonment and acquitted one in an August 17 bomb blast case.

The four other accused are Rezaul Haq Reza of Jamalpur, Habibur Rahman Habib and Abdullah Al Shohail of Gazipur and Mohammad Sagir Hossain of

Sunny, Reza and Shohail were present in the court during the delivery of the judgment while Habib and Sagir were tried in

Judge SM Mojibur Rahman of the First Additional Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court handed down the verdict at a packed court-

The court acquitted Mustafizur Rahman Musa of Naogaon as the charge brought against him was not proved.

British envoy sees ruling, opposition parties easing up

British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Anwar Choudhury yesterday expressed his hope that all political parties will reach a consensus on the reforms issue to ensure free and fair general elections.
"We see some signs that both

the ruling and the opposition parties are easing up... and it is not too late for coming to a consensus," he said while speaking as the chief guest at a dialogue on media and diaspora organised by Refugee and Migratory Movement Research Unity (RMMRU) and British Council at the latter's auditorium.

The UK, as a close friend of Bangladesh, will do everything it can so that they [political parties] come forward for consensus in a tion in a fair manner, he said.

He hoped that the people of the country would continue to work together so that they could enjoy a fair election and uphold democracy to prosper.

Niko rejects govt claim, asks for int'l arbitration

TENGRATILA BLOWOUT COMPENSATION

Rejecting the government's demand for compensation for losses from the Tengratila blowout, Canadian company Niko Resources last month formally asked the government to settle the issue through an international arbitration.

Sources said following the August 15 letter from Niko, the government is making preparation to take the matter to the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes.

The letter came at a time when the government is at the final stage of signing a Gas Purchase Sales Agreement (GPSA) for purchasing gas from the Feni marginal gas field, jointly developed by Niko and Bangladesh Petroleum Exploration Company (Bapex). The Petrobangla has been taking gas from the Feni field from late 2004, without fixing a price and illegally paid Niko \$4 million in April 2005.

According to Niko Bangladesh Chief Brian Adolph, the GPSA that was initialled two months ago may be finalised within two weeks. The Feni field is producing gas at the rate of 15 million cubic feet per day.

Back in early 2006, the energy adviser had suggested several times before the press that Niko would be made to compensate for the Tengratila gas loss from its Feni

gas production. However now it is clear that this is not happening. The GPSA will give Niko a gas

price tariff of \$1.75 per thousand According to Petrobangla data, Niko's outstanding gas bill for sale

of Feni gas between November 2004 and March 2006 is \$14.34 Sources said that on August 15, Niko sent its letter to the energy


