SC Bar urges Hasan to reject voluntarily caretaker job

The Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) yesterday appealed to Justice KM Hasan to voluntarily reject the post of chief adviser of the caretaker government in the interests of national stability, constitution and the very institution of interim government.

"If Justice Hasan rejects the post with a judge-like attitude, he will be remembered as a chief justice with honour more than that he might earn by heading the next caretaker government," said Barrister Amir-Ul Islam, president of SCBA, at a press conference at its auditorium.

The earlier he takes the decision, the bigger the chance for the country and its democracy to get out of the ongoing crisis fast, he said adding that it is a matter of paramount importance as only a free and fair election can ensure democracy and continuation of the

Plant pumps out 1,100 tonne groundwater an hr

Exhausts water level fast, poses ecological disaster in 15 villages

The Barapukuria 250 megawatt coal-fired power project pumps out a staggering 1,100 tonnes of groundwater per hour threatening an unforeseen environmental disaster in 15 villages around the coalmine area.

The plant built by a Chinese consortium led by CMC is using at least 1,100 tonnes of water per hour for power generation and then wasting it all away, power plant sources said.

Within a span of about eight months, the underground watertable has apparently depleted by three times, villagers said. As a result, almost all the tube-wells in these 15 villages have become completely dry, creating an acute crisis of drinking water.

Villagers are now being compelled to use polluted and unfiltered water for drinking, cooking, cleaning and other purposes while the authorities are yet to take any remedial action.

Lowering of groundwater level now affects nearly 35,000 acres of land of the 15 villages, and the water level is going down day by day, much to the distress of the farmers, sources at the Department of Agriculture Extension said.

Farmers said at least 30 per cent arable land of these villages remain uncultivated due to water short-

The affected people of the 15 villages formed a Sangram Committee to protest this excessive underground water usage by

the power plant. The situation is also posing a threat to the existence of fish species, aquatic resources and birds of the area as most of the ponds in the area are drying up, said experts in the Parbatipur Fisheries Department. Many ponds and small canals of the affected area became vulnerable for fish and birds, they added.

It is not clear how the CMC was given the government's environmental clearance for such an operation, and why the authorities till date took no action to force the CMC to change its design or penalise the company for the disaster,

Rab recovers explosives from old Dhaka house

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) yesterday seized huge quantity of crackers and explosives from a house at Becharam Deuri in old Dhaka.

Rab men also arrested Mir Shajahan, 35, in this connection said a Rab press release.

Following information that a gang at Becharam Deuri under Kotwali Police Station stocked huge quantity of explosives and were planning to conduct some criminal activities, a team of Rab-10 raided a house at Noor Box Lane and arrested Shajahan with the explosives and firearms at 2:00am.

The seized items include six kg sulphur, 200 gm gunpowder, 5,000 crackers, 700 gm aluminium pow der, 60 kg potassium nitrate, 15 kg charcoal, one kg iron dust, three kg calcium carbonate, detonating wire, an airgun and 50 small knives.

The Rab men also picked up Humayun, 40, and Habibullah, 33, for selling crackers.

Kotwali police could not give any details about the incident as Rab was yet to handover the arrestee and the recovered goods to the police station as of filing this report at 8:00pm.

At least 50 people including two firefighters were injured in the Witnesses said it took three
