Memorable 500th for Paul Scholes

Manchester United ran out 2-0 winners over Liverpool in front of a record Premiership crowd at Old Trafford.

Scholes put United ahead on 39 minutes as he poked Ryan Giggs' ball across the face of goal home at the second attempt.

United were dominant for much of the game, with Liverpool very rarely troubling Edwin van der Sar, and Rio Ferdinand scored a superb second mid-way through the second half.

The England defender took advantage of a poor Jamie Carragher clearance to fire a firsttime shot into the top corner from 12 yards and give Sir Alex Ferguson's men a lead they did not relinquish.

The game lived up to its billing right from the off, with both sides allowing for a lively and open affair and chances aplenty at both ends.

John Arne Riise tried to catch out Van der Sar early with a Xabi Alonso-type effort from just inside the Manchester United half, but the ball sailed comfortably over the Dutchman's crossbar.

United were soon into their stride and the Liverpool fans will have had their hearts in their mouths inside 10 minutes as a poor decision from Jose Reina almost let the hosts in for the opener.

Darren Fletcher beat Reina to a loose ball on the right wing but fortunately for the Spanish keeper, The Reds had enough defenders back to bail him out.

Giggs was causing untold problems for the Liverpool defence with his delivery from set pieces but the United attackers could not take

Liverpool's defence was struggling to cope with set pieces and Reina had to be quick to get down to Louis Saha's snap-shot from the corner of the six-yard box.

The Frenchman was again denied by Reina soon after as his ferocious attempt from 20 yards was kept out by the Liverpool

Wayne Rooney had a sniff of goal on two occasions just after the half hour mark as first he miscontrolled Michael Carrick's brilliant ball over the top, before being beaten to the ball by Reina after Saha's mis-timed header

looked to have put him in. In between Rooney's two openings, Liverpool created their best chance of the half and Dirk Kuyt should have done better than head straight at Van der Sar when Mark Gonzalez's perfect centre found the Dutch striker at the back post.

Gonzalez then spurned no less than three opportunities to give Liverpool the lead in the final ten minutes of the half as he saw a shot blocked on the break and twice shot wide from good positions.

Liverpool were certainly enjoying their best spell of the half but United made them pay for not taking their chances as Scholes popped up to send the home fans into raptures.

Rooney played in Giggs down the left and his first-time ball cross the six-yard box found an unmarked Scholes who poked home at the second attempt after Reina had saved the midfielder's initial effort

well at his feet.

Saha was superbly denied United's second minutes later when his 25-yard shot looked like finding the bottom corner until Reina tipped the ball around the post.

Alonso went close in stoppage time with a shot from the edge of the area but United were full value for their lead going in at the break.

United started the second 45 in a similar manner to the way they ended the first half, with Saha and Scholes both shooting wide from the edge of the area.

Liverpool were continuing to struggle to trouble Van der Sar, with Luis Garcia's tame header from Steven Gerrard's dinked ball over the top the best they could muster in the early stages of the second half.

United, meanwhile, continued to bear down on Reina's goal and Saha saw a shot blocked before Ferdinand's magical strike doubled the hosts' advantage. Carragher had earlier taken a

knock to his ankle and his poor clearance went straight up in the air in the Liverpool penalty area. Ferdinand took the ball down exquisitely before sending a first-time shot with his left foot into the top right-hand corner of Reina's net for his first goal of the season. United slowed the tempo after

the second but Giggs was clearly keen to get himself on the scoresheet as he rolled back the years with a dazzling run from the left, but the veteran winger could not find the finish the run deserved.

Gerrard headed over and fired wide late on but The Reds' day was summed up when Luis Garcia sent a disappointing effort high and wide in the final embers of the match.

Diego downs Bayern

Werder Bremen showed they are genuine contenders to end Bayern Munich's dominance of the domestic

defeating the reigning champions 3-1 on Saturday to stay top of the Bundesliga.

Bremen, champions in 2004, are now three points ahead of Bayern, although Schalke 04 are level with them on 16 points, as they bid to stop the title going to Munich for the third successive season

"If we carry on playing like this I think it is fair to say we have a good chance of winning the title," said midfielder Torsten Frings.

Goals from Brazilian Diego, Cameroon international Pierre Wome and an own goal from Brazilian World Cup winner Lucio clinched the points for Bremen after Bayern had threatened a comeback when Roy Makaay scored.

"We constantly went forward and tried to create chances against a very good team," said Bremen manager Thomas Schaaf. "We are top of the table but are not relaxing. There is a lot of hard work to do before we can achieve our goals."

League and cup holders Bayern fell to fourth after their third defeat of the season, the same number they lost in the whole of last season.

"Werder deserved the win for the way they started. We did not put up enough resistance and at 2-0 the game was wide open," explained Bayern coach Felix Magath. "The own goal then decided the match for them and we are all very disappointed.'

Schalke leapfrogged Bayern with a 2-1 win over Hannover and are only behind Bremen on goal difference.

Goals from Zlatan Bajramovic (18min) and Levan Kobiaschvili (27) put Schalke in command early on and they held on for the three points.

"We had a shaky period after they scored in the second half but we got the three points and need to keep on going," said Schalke captain Frank Rost.

Hertha Berlin also moved above the champions on goal difference after a 2-1 win over Borussia Monchengladbach.

Bayern kept faith with their adventurous 4-3-3 formation as Lukas Podolski, Claudio Pizarro and Makaay started in a three-man

Bremen were forced to draft Jurica Vranjes in as a late replacement for German international defender Christian Schulz who injured himself in the pre-match

The match started at a frantic pace and a goal came after just 11

minutes with Bremen's Brazilian playmaker Diego, a record six million euro signing from FC Porto, hammering an unstoppable shot past Oliver Kahn with the ball crashing in off the underside of the cross-

Bayern were firmly on the backfoot and fell further behind in the 34th minute with Wome's swerving free-kick leaving Kahn rooted to the

The champions responded quickly with Dutch forward Makaay volleying in three minutes later for Bayern's 3,000th Bundesliga goal.

Bremen fans feared a comeback but Lucio deflected a Wome cross into his own net just after the hour mark to give Bremen some breath-

ing space.

'The Lucio own goal was unlucky but we made too many mistakes for a game at this level." said Bayern's French international Willy Sagnol.

Elsewhere German football began its campaign to crack down on racism with fans accross the country holding up big red cards reading: 'show racism the red card'.

Racism came to the fore in September when supporters of Hansa Rostock's reserve team directed monkey noises at Schalke's Ghana-born German international Gerald Asamoah during a cup match. Similar incidents followed prompting German football chiefs to take action.
