Warne puts Victoria in charge

Test leg-spinner Shane Warne claimed five wickets and opener Nick Jewell neared a century as Victoria took charge of their Sheffield Shield cricket match against South Australia here Sunday.

By the close of the third day, Victoria had reached 201 for four to hold an overall lead of 304 runs on a pitch that will Warne confidence of more wickets on Monday's final day.

Jewell (93 not out) attacked late in the day to ensure Victoria did not squander the gains made in the morning by Warne (5-103), who worked through his extensive repertoire in an unchanged stint.

Despite several chances, Warne was unable to dislodge former Australian team-mate Darren Lehmann, whose unbeaten 136 lifted SA to 282, 103 runs short of Victoria's 385 for six declared.

In Brisbane, Queensland must defy form, history and NSW's quality attack to pull off an outright victory at the Gabba on Monday.

A 68-run last wicket stand between spinner Beau Casson and Doug Bollinger forced Queensland to chase a last-day target of 325 runs for victory.

Only four times in the 75-year history of interstate cricket has a team scored as much to secure victory at the Gabba.

NSW eked out 308 in its second innings with only Casson (52) getting a half-century after skipper Brad Haddin, and left-handers Ed Cowan and Aaron O'Brien all fell when well set in the 40s.

Maria Sharapova claimed her fifth title of the year at the Linz Open on Sunday when she beat defending champion and number two seed Nadia Petrova 7-5, 6-2 in an all-Russian final

Sharapova added to her victories at the US Open, Indian Wells, San Diego and Zurich. By reaching the final the 19-year-old will overtake Justine Henin-Hardenne as the world number two when the rankings are announced on Monday.

Top-seeded Sharapova is also in contention, along with the Belgian and Amelie Mauresmo of France, of finishing the season at number one. a position she last held on October

shown a remarkable return to form, having lost five consecutive matches up to September's US Open after returning from a hip injury. She won in Stuttgart and reached the final in Moscow and

The match between two players ranked in the top five was by no means a classic.

Petrova failed to repeat the commanding form she had shown in reaching the final for the loss of just nine games, and Sharapova rarely had to rise above the ordinary.

Sharapova made a perfect start, breaking to lead 1-0, but the next several games featured little drama as both held serve with little trouble.

Petrova, playing with her right thigh strapped, failed to find the power on her serve that had made her such a force against other

opponents, but she finally stepped up a gear and levelled at 4-4 with a backhand volley.

She went on to earn two set points on Sharapova's serve at 5-4 but her opponent held off the threat and broke for 6-5 when Petrova double-faulted.

Federer, Nadal have plenty to prove

Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal may have 60 titles and banked 30 million dollars in prize money between them, but they still find themselves having plenty to prove at the Paris Masters this week.

World number one Federer has endured a series of bitter disappointments in the French capital.

As well as coming up short at the French Open, the only Grand Slam to elude him, his record at the Paris Masters is far from impressive having never got beyond the last eight in three visits.

The last time he appeared at the Bercy arena, in 2003, he was dogged by back trouble and tumbled out in straight sets at the quarterfinals stage at the hands of Tim Henman.

Adding insult to his injury, his lacklustre performance sparked a chorus of jeers as he left the court.

'This was the worst week ever," moaned the Swiss at the time. Over in the plush, western side of

the city, the clay courts of Roland Garros have also found him wanting with Nadal beating him in the semifinals and final in the last two years at the French Open.

Meanwhile, Nadal, responsible for four of Federer's five defeats in 2006, is making his first appearance at the Paris Masters and comes into the event looking to get his season back on track.

After a disappointing four months, the 20-year-old Spaniard is hoping to bounce back in the city which has yielded him the last two French Open

"I'll do my best to win, that's the plan. I know that I'm playing much better than a month ago," said the world number two.

Nadal started the season strongly, winning five titles including Masters Series events in Rome and Monte

Carlo and Roland Garros. But since his surprise final finish at Wimbledon, where he lost to Federer, he has suffered a drop in form and

made a quarter-final exit on home soil in Madrid two weeks ago, losing an angry encounter with Paris champion Tomas Berdych.

"I played a lot in the first half of the season and left a lot of physical and mental energy behind me," explained

"But in Madrid, despite losing to Berdych, I played one of my best tournaments of the year. I want to go on playing like that.'

Paris Masters organisers will have breathed a sigh of life that Federer and Nadal are fit to play.

The duo were just two of the highprofile injury absentees 12 months

Lleyton Hewitt, as well as former champions Marat Safin and Andre Agassi, also opted not to play leaving the final Masters tournament of the year with just five of the world's top ten in the French capital

Drawcard Andy Roddick struggled through to a semi-final defeat leaving Berdych to take the title against Ivan Ljubicic and the organisers to demand action to cure the problem of the no-shows.

One notable absentee this year is world number three David Nalbandian. The Argentinian is suffering from stomach problems.

Federer and Nadal start their Paris campaigns with a bye into the second round.

The Swiss will face either former Australian Open winner Thomas Johansson of Sweden or a qualifier in his first outing.

Nadal comes up against either French wildcard Nicolas Mahut or former double champion and world

India will stage the second Afro-Asia Cup one-day series next June, the Asian Cricket Council announced on Sunday.

The combined Asian and African teams will play three one-day games in Chennai on June 6, 8 and 10. Two Twenty20 games will be played on June 5, one of them between the women's teams of the two continents.

The inaugural edition was in South Africa in August 2005, ending 1-1 after one game was washed out.

Seventy percent of the net proceeds will go towards developing the game in the host continent, the visiting continent will receive 20 percent with the rest going to charity.
