WB to curtail loan as CG can't meet conditions

The World Bank (WB) will curtail 50 percent of its fourth instalment. worth \$200 million, of Development Support Credit (DSC) for Bangladesh, as the caretaker government cannot fulfil the conditions required for receiving the fund.

Finance and Planning Adviser Dr Akbar Ali Khan said this after a meeting with a 6-member WB team led by the outgoing WB Country Director Christine I Wallich in Dhaka yesterday.

Khan said the WB was not supposed to release any fund without full implementation of its terms. "But considering the present volatile economic condition of the country, the bank has agreed to release

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Hajj flights likely to be open to other airlines

Biman's partner Saudia declines to operate special flights for pilgrims

The government is likely to allow other airlines to carry hajj pilgrims to Saudi Arabia this year in addition to designated carriers the Bangladesh Biman and Saudia airlines.

The decision was taken as the Saudia expressed inability to carry its share of pilgrims. Earlier, Saudia and Bangladesh Biman used to carry 50 per cent pilgrims each, sources said.

"The Saudia airlines has officially informed the government that it will

not operate any extra flights for carrying hajj pilgrims from Bangladesh this year," said a high official of Biman Bangladesh

The Saudia will carry pilgrims only in their normal scheduled flights, he said, adding that Saudia might have taken the decision thinking that the operation of extra flight would not be profitable for

A high-level meeting at the Ministry of Religious Affairs yesterday was told that the Saudia would

not be able to carry more than 10,000 pilgrims this year by its regular flights.

The job of carrying the rest of around 38,000 pilgrims has been kept for Biman alone. Although the government is yet

to officially declare to allow third carrier, it would be necessary as it is impossible for Biman alone to carry all the 48,000 pilgrims, the source

Earlier, another Dhaka court had sentenced Hafez to 54 years of rigorous imprisonment for possessing illegal firearms, explosives and

Trans-Asian train

Bangladesh is about to miss the chance to sign up for the Trans-Asian Railway network in the first round of agreement signing at Busan, South Korea.

A conference of United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UN-Escap) member countries on the Trans-Asian Railway network began at Busan on November 6 and will continue until November 11. Todav and tomorrow have been reserved for signing the agreement after a technical meeting that finished

The countries which will fail to sign the agreement in the first round will, however, be allowed to sign up

the government or ambassador of the country concerned to USA can sign the agreement at any time during November 16, 2006 to December 31, 2008. The treaty would be kept at the UN headquarters during this time, sources said.

ter Nazmul Huda said the four-party alliance government had no objection to join the UN-Escap sponsored Trans-Asian Railway network but the time to sign the agreement is yet to mature.

According to Huda, one junior level officer was supposed to attend the conference in South Korea. But he was not authorised to sign any

agreement or give consent to any policy matter, he told The Daily Star Wednesday night. Bangladesh Railway sources, however, said none was sent to represent Bangladesh at the conference.

Huda claimed the conference in South Korea was not for singing any agreement rather it was just to discuss about the progress in this regard. He also claimed that no concrete proposal was made from Escap to sign any agreement.

When asked whether Bangladesh will join the network, Nazmul Huda said, "I do not see any problem in joining the network as there is no dispute on the question of proposed railway route.

Contacted, a BDR high officia confirmed the postponement.

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

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) reports that Bangladesh has outshone Asia's emerging giants in a few fields with impressive gains, especially in water and sanitation sectors.

"Income matters, but public policy shapes the conversion of income into human development," says the UNDP Human Development Report 2006.

The report entitled "Bevond Scarcity: Power, Poverty and the Global Water Crisis", substantiated its observations through a comparison with the situation in India at the next door.

"India may outperform Bangladesh as a high-growth globalisation success story, but the tables are turned when the benchmark for success shifts to sanitation...despite an average income some 60 percent higher, India has a lower rate of sanitation coverage. Similar gaps between wealth and coverage are observed for water,'
