Lyon hold off Real



Real Madrid missed the chance to go top of group E when they were held

Champions League rivals Lyon here at the Santiago Bernabeu on Tuesday.

Lyon raced into an early lead and with seven minutes remaining still held a 2-1 lead after Ruud van Nistelrooy had managed to sandwich a goal in between strikes for the visitors from John Carew and Florent Malouda.

Former Manchester United striker van Nistelrooy could have secured victory from the spot kick however his effort six minutes after his equaliser was turned away by France keeper Gregory Coupet.

And Real then had former Lyon midfielder Mahamadou Diarra to thank for a late equaliser which ensured they took a share of the

The result means Lyon remain top on 13 points, with Real -- who were also qualified for the knockout phase before kick-off -- in

Steaua Bucharest remain third

on four points after their draw at home to Dynamo Kiev.

Lyon coach Gerard Houllier admitted it was one of the most difficult matches they had played in the competition.

But he added: "There were a lot of positives, but at the very top level when you create chances you can't afford to miss them.

"But I can't fault the players' commitment.

Real coach Fabio Capello claimed that Lyon's first goal was off-side, but added: "Lyon showed they are a difficult team to beat." Lyon began the match without a

handful of regulars including Brazilian forward Fred, Karim Benzema, Sidney Govou, and Sylvain Wiltord, who is ill.

Gerard Houllier's men controlled the opening period and had big Norwegian striker Carew to thankfortheir opening. Having given Real defender

Fabio Cannavaro a taste of his technique, the Norwegian finally got the better of the Italian to beat ker Casillas in the Real goal in the

Brazil still

Brazil have maintained top spot in

the latest FIFA world rankings ahead of world champions Italy and South American rivals Argentina.

World Cup finalists France slip one place to fourth while top African side Nigeria break into the top 10 at eighth.

Brazil have 1,588 points, World Cup champion Italy have 1,560. Brazil have been ranked No. 1 since July of 2002. Italy's 1-1 draw with Turkey in a

Nov. 15 friendly in Turkey would have been enough to pull even with Brazil in ranking points. But the Brazilians increased their lead at the top by beating Switzerland 2-1 in a friendly the same night.

Argentina moved up to No. 3 with 1,551 points, swapping places with France (1,523).

England, Germany and the Netherlands remain at Nos. 5, 6 and 7, with Nigeria moving up two places from 11th and the Czech Republic falling two places to 10th. Spain fell two places to 12th.

Ruud in disarray

Real Madrid striker Ruud van Nistelrooy said he was devastated after missing a last-gasp penalty that would have earned his side a first win against Olympique Lyon in the Champions League.

The Dutchman scored Real's second goal as they battled back from 2-0 down against a dominant Lyon on Tuesday and earned a penalty when he went down in the area as he challenged Cris for the ball in the 89th minute

But he missed his third spotkick in five attempts when Lyon goalkeeper Gregory Coupet guessed right, dived to his left and turned his low shot past the post. "The team has a right to be

pleased with their performance, but don't," the former Manchester United striker told reporters.

"I'm upset because the team played with a lot of guts and character to get back into the match and then I missed the penalty in the last

"I didn't hit it well and it isn't good to be missing so many penalties, but drawing the game after being 2-0 down isn't a bad result." Even if Van Nistelrooy had net-

ted his spot kick Real would still have in second place in Group E given that they lost 2-0 to Lyon in their opening match.

Tugay, Ghaly appeals fail

Blackburn's Tugay and Tottenham's Hossam Ghaly have both had their claims for wrongful dismissal rejected by an independent disciplinary commission, the Football Association (FA) announced Tuesday.

Both midfielders were sent off during Sunday's 1-1 Premiership draw at Ewood Park.

Turkish international Tugay, 36, opened the scoring for Rovers before his foul on Ghaly led to the visitors' equaliser with Jermain Defoe scoring from the penalty spot.

Tugay will now serve a onematch suspension as a result. Egypt's Ghaly, 24, was sent off

after he appeared to elbow Michael Gray late in the game. He will serve a three-match suspension.

The red cards angered Tottenham boss Martin Jol and Blackburn manager Mark Hughes, who criticised referee Phil Dowd's performance after the match.

Porto bring down CSKA

CSKA Moscow's Champions League hopes dipped dramatically here Tuesday after a comprehensive

2-0 defeat to group Grivals FC Porto. FC Porto had a red hot start in the icy Russian temperatures, taking a second-minute lead through Ricardo Quaresma.

Argentinian Lucho Gonzalez · then hit a superb second-half goal for the Portuguese visitors, who moved top of the group ahead of Arsenal's match against SV Hamburg at Highbury. CSKA's recent league title vic-

tory celebrations were tempered by the news that their coach Valery Gazzaev's younger brother Ruslan had been killed in a car crash on Saturday

On Tuesday, Gazzaev could only watch as his side succumbed to a conspicuously superior side who pushed them into second place in the group. In their final group game against

SV Hamburg in a fortnight the Russians could be forced into battling to stay in the competition, but they will do so without Brazilian striker Vagner Love.

Love was booked in the second half. Influential Bosnian midfielder Elvir Rahimic will also miss that match after picking up a yellow

Porto's early lead hit CSKA hard, but was merely a sign of things to

After just two minutes Helder Postiga found Lisandro Lopez down the right and he produced a superb pass across the penalty area which the Porto striker met with a shot that found the far corner of Igor Akinfeev's net.

It was Quaresma's first ever goal in his 19th Champions League appearances.

Porto were on fire despite the icy conditions. First Postiga forced Akinfeev into

turning the ball round the post and from the resulting corner Pepe should have scored as the ball evaded all the defenders but free at the far post he volleyed over the bar.

CSKA won their third league title inside four years on Saturday, however in this match they were sorely lacking any kind of winning

Technology on the cards

in next year's World Club Championship following trials this year in junior competitions run by world football's governing body, FIFA president Sepp Blatter said on FIFA had planned to use the

technology in this year's World Cup but shelved the idea after trials had proved inconclusive. "In 2005 we did different tests at

the Under-17 World Cup in Peru but the evidence wasn't clear so we will continue to carry out trials in junior competitions in 2007," Blatter told a news conference in Madrid. "We will then use it at the 2007

World Club Championship and offer its use at other FIFA competi-

England's Premier League, which intends to submit a paper on the issue to FIFA in January, welcomed the news, describing it as a only use specialist linesmen. "step in the right direction".

There were problems of course as we know in the beginning, but from our studies, this technology can be very effective," said Premier League spokesman Dan Johnson. But proposals by the English

league on the introduction of a "video-referee" to solve other arguments during a game such as offside, penalty claims and off-theball clashes were quickly dismissed by both FIFA and UEFA, the European governing body.

Blatter said goal-line video equipment was the only type of technology that might be used to help referees, stressing the need for improved training for match officials.

"We need to have better training for referees and especially linesmen," he said.

"Referees need to be professional and the linesmen must be specialists. The 2009 Confederations Cup will

UEFA chief executive Lars-Christer Olsson said his organisation was in favour of goal-line technology, but said this was "far enough". "The goal-line system is in real-

time and happens quickly, but we are concerned that video-refereeing would stop the flow of the game," he told Reuters after a meeting at the European Parliament in Brussels. This would also open up win-

dows for further commercials in the middle of the match, which would damage its image and secondly this would lead to a referee's authority being undermined during a match.' The English Premier League said

that despite these comments, it still hoped the broader issue of video technology would be debated by UEFA and FIFA next year.

Argentina lift ban on away fans

(AFA) has lifted a ban which prevented away fans from attending first division games for the rest of "Football goes back to being the

way it was 15 days ago," said AFA executive committee member and Boca Juniors vice-president Pedro Pompilio after the meeting on Tuesday.

The ban was an initial attempt by the AFA to respond to the violence and intimidation which has plagued Argentine football this season. It was lifted 24 hours after the

players' union said they did not

believe the ban was the right way to fight the violence and threatened to go on strike if it continued. On Sunday, the supporters of Racing Club and San Lorenzo blocked their respective team buses

and forced the match between the two sides to be called off. The fans were unhappy at the decision to play the game behind closed doors after rioting Racing fans caused their derby at Independiente to be abandoned in

the 64th minute the previous week. Two other first division matches have been suspended because of crowd trouble since August. Both were later completed without any punishments being handed out to the respective teams.

In addition, the Gimnasia-Boca Juniors match on Sept 10. was abandoned at halftime after the referee claimed he had been threatened in his dressing-room by the Gimnasia president.

The remaining 45 minutes were played 10 days ago when Gimnasia, leading 1-0 before the re-start, conceded four goals and lost 4-1.

The following day, public prose cutors ordered an investigation into allegations that the Gimnasia players had received death threats from their own supporters, who demanded they throw the game.

The fans wanted to help Boca, the championship leaders, pull clear of Estudiantes, who are Gimnasia's bitter rivals. On Tuesday, referee Daniel

Gimenez told public prosecutors he had noticed a change in attitude on the Gimnasia players between the two halves. "He said that in the first half of

the game, Gimnasia were playing on equal terms with Boca and were clearly determined on winning the game, whereas in the second half. one or two months later, it was completely the opposite," Marcelo Romero told reporters.

Odonkor set for surgery

Jurgen Klinsmann. The operation is expected to take place on Thursday.
