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# EC flouts law to start picking polling staff

DCs still predominantly appointed by last 4-party regime

The Election Commission (EC) has directed the district administration, which is still largely dominated by the immediate past government's appointees and its selection, to prepare a panel of polling officials to conduct the next parliamentary election at field

The directive violates the existing electoral laws, which do not allow to officially start the process before announcing the election schedule and appointing returning officers (RO), who are legally

authorised to do the job.

The EC generally appoints the ROs soon after announcing the election schedule and the ROs prepare the panel of presiding officers, assistant presiding officers and polling officers. But, in line with an EC decision,

the EC Secretariat in an emergency written directive asked the deputy commissioners (DCs) on Thursday to prepare the panel of polling officials soon after the announcement of the election schedule.

Immediately after taking charge as the acting chief election commissioner on Thursday, Justice

Mahfuzur Rahman said the election schedule will be announced

About five lakh polling officials will be recruited to conduct the next parliamentary elections, sources in the EC Secretariat said.

Defending the decision to give the responsibility of preparing the panel of polling officials to the DCs, senior EC Secretariat officials said usually the DCs are appointed as the ROs and they have initiated the move to save time

Of the present 64 DCs, 30 were appointed by the immediate past BNP-led alliance government

t. The caretaker government appointed 18 DCs from its own fit

Besides, of around 480 upazila nirbahi officers who would be given appointment as the assistant returning officers, 100 were appointed by the caretaker government, but the rest have been serving since the time of the BNP gov-

## Jamaat's 'Islamisation' of village names

In an ominous development in Shyamnagar upazila, Jamaat-e-Islami Bangladesh is quietly 'Islamising' the names of villages and educational institutions there, destroying the rich history, tradition and heritage of the area.

The move, bearing all signs of rabid communalism, was initiated following a locally issued fatwa that the names, many of which have been existing for many centuries, now smack of 'Hinduism'.

Since the immediate past four-

party alliance government had assumed power in 2001, of which Jammat is an important component, it successfully 'Islamised' the names of many villages and educational institutions in the upazila.

Local units of Jamaat also started using the new 'Islamic names' on their official writing pads, propaganda leaflets and invitation cards, sources said.

Hari Charan Roy Chowdhury, the erstwhile Zamindar (large scale land owner during the Mughal rule and in colonial India) of Shyamnagar, established a high

school at Nakipur in 1899 under what is now Shyamnagar upazila head quarters, and it was named after him as Nakipur Hari Charan High School.

As the name Hari Charan is a traditional Hindu name, local Jamaat leaders changed the high school's name to Nakipur Pilot High school and the school authorities hung a sign board touting the newname.

Local residents alleged that soon after the immediate past fourparty alliance had assumed power SEE PAGE 2 COL 1





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
