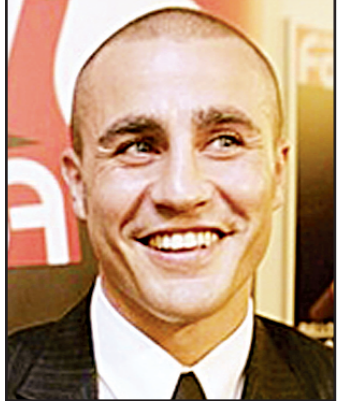

Vengsarkar, who has been asked by BCCI President Sharad Pawar to join the team in South Africa, is likely to leave on December 10, five days ahead of the start of the first Test in Johannesburg.

Yousuf at his modest best

Prolific scorer Mohammad Yousuf said the best thing about his world record for the most Test runs in a calendar year is his country will be mentioned whenever people talk about the new landmark.  
"I am happy this world record has Pakistan's name," said Yousuf, who beat West Indian great Viv Richards' 30-year-old mark with his 124 on the fourth day in the third Test against the West Indies on Thursday.  
"I would like to dedicate the record to my mother, my wife and my brothers who have been a great support and are very happy about my success," said Yousuf, who rose from the slums of Lahore to make his Test debut in 1998.  
Yousuf said his record was for his country.  
"It is a great honour to create a world record. You play for your country, which is a great privilege, and to create history is a matter of

great pride," said Yousuf, who also set a new Pakistan mark for a three-Test series score of 665.  
The 32-year-old right-handed batsman drove paceman Corey Collymore to the boundary to cross Richards' record tally and went on to set a new mark of 1,788 Test runs in 11 Tests.  
He also scored his ninth century of the year, beating his own record of eight that he set on Monday in the first innings. One of the previous holders for the century record was Richards, again in 1976.  
Yousuf also equalled Australian great Don Bradman's record of scoring six centuries in successive Tests -- although it took him only five matches compared with Bradman's six.  
But Yousuf played down the comparison with Richards and other Pakistani greats.  
"I still feel that Richards and Brian Lara are the two greatest batsmen of this century. I had followed Richards in my childhood and think he should still be regarded as the greatest.

"Lara is the best batsman of my time, scoring 400 runs in a Test innings is no mean achievement and Lara has done it," said Yousuf, referring to the master West Indian's highest Test score made against England at St. John's in 2004.  
Lara hailed Yousuf's achievement, saying he had been phenomenal over the year.  
"His is an excellent achievement. Nine hundreds in a year was never done before and the credit must be given to him. He has become a role model, not only for youngsters of Pakistan but also around the world," said Lara.  
The West Indian captain, who before this Test had pledged he would come down hard on Yousuf to stop him from snatching Richards' record, said Yousuf's run of form was tremendous.  
"I didn't like that the last 600 runs of his record because those were made against us -- but his run of form was tremendous," said Lara.

"It is excellent, to score nine hundreds in a year and near 1,800 runs in a year. Yousuf deserves all the credit. His run of form is tremendous, but I didn't like the last 600 he scored this season," said Lara, who added his team could still save the match.  
"Our minds will not be on the total, but to bat out the day."  
The West Indies were again sloppy in the field as Ganga grassed Yousuf in the penultimate over before lunch off part-timer Sarwan, when the batsman was on 68.  
Paceman Jerome Taylor then spilled a simple chance off his own bowling when Yousuf was on 87. Yousuf once again capitalised on the fumble to punish the West Indian bowlers.  
Yousuf hit paceman Dwayne Bravo for his 14th boundary to reach his 23rd Test century off just 125 balls -- his second of the match.  
It meant he beat his own record of eight Test centuries in a year, set with his fighting 102 in the first innings.  
The previous mark of seven was held by Richards (1976) and Sri Lanka's Aravinda de Silva (1997).  
Yousuf was finally bowled round his legs by part-timer Ramnaresh Sarwan. He hit 15 boundaries during his 294-minute knock.  
Meanwhile Hafeez, also dropped by Bravo on 103, reached his second Test century with his 10th boundary off Taylor, before the fast bowler forced an edge for Denesh Ramdin to take a catch behind the stumps.  
Pakistan lost Shoab Malik and Abdul Razzak for 10 each before Inzamam, who scored his only 50 of

the series, declared the innings.  
Yousuf became the sixth Pakistani batsman to score a century in each innings of a Test, following Hanif Mohammad, Javed Miandad, Wajahatullah Wasti, Inzamam and Yasir Hameed.  
When on 43, Yousuf further surpassed the Pakistan record for the most runs in a three-match series, set by former great Zaheer Abbas with 583 made against India in 1978. Yousuf's series total is 665.  
And he equalled Australian great Don Bradman's record of scoring six centuries in successive Tests -- although it took Yousuf only five matches compared with Bradman's six.  
Yousuf has now scored four hundreds in five innings against the West Indies since his 192 in Pakistan's nine-wicket win in the first Test in Lahore. He also made 191 in the drawn second Test at Multan.

England look likely to play two spinners after coach Duncan Fletcher said he wanted to use Monty Panesar alongside Ashley Giles on the spin-friendly Adelaide Oval, with James Anderson set to drop out.  
Misfitting pace man Steve Harmison has been working in the nets to recapture the bowling rhythm which deserted him so spectacularly in Brisbane. But he is expected to keep his place.  
"Harmy has worked unbelievably hard this week, he wants to show he is better than what he was last week," Flintoff said.  
"He has been coming to the nets early and on his own working with (bowling coach) Kevin Shine to get back to what we know he can do and there's been a massive improvement in his bowling this week.  
"He's desperate to give something to the side and he's quite open about that. You know what you're getting from Harmy, he's tries every time, it might not happen for him but I'm sure a good performance from him is just around the corner."  
Australia, keen to preserve a balanced team, have shied away

from bringing in Stuart MacGill in a tandem leg-spin attack with Shane Warne following the continuing unavailability of injured all-rounder Shane Watson.  
Warne generally does well in Adelaide, his third most productive ground with 51 wickets in 12 Tests at a 29.20 average.  
If McGrath does not make it his place will be taken by either Shaun Tait or Mitchell Johnson.  
England have drawn on the similarities between the start of this series and the last one.  
McGrath led Australia to a 239-run victory at Lord's in 2005, but after he pulled out on the morning of the second Test at Edgbaston with an ankle injury, the visitors lost the Test and eventually the series.  
The Adelaide Oval is a high-scoring ground with the Australians amassing 500-plus in three of their last four Tests here with four batsmen scoring double-centuries -- West Indies' Brian Lara (226) last year, Justin Langer (215) against New Zealand in 2004 and Ricky Ponting (242) and Indian Rahul Dravid (233) in the 2003 Test loss to India.  
England last won here three

tours ago in 1995 when Australia were bowled out for 156 in the fourth innings for Mike Atherton's team to win by 106 runs.  
England have won eight of 28 Tests in Adelaide with five drawn, and the toss will be important here with first use of the pitch expected to offer the most runs.  
Curator Les Burdett said the Adelaide pitch offers batsmen a chance to play their shots but it will crack through the game.

Workers who helped refurbish the 50,000-seater showpiece Khalifa Stadium said contractors continue to rob them of a slice of their paltry wages.  
"The company for which I work promised to pay me 1,000 rials (275 dollars) a month, but its (Indian) manager is only paying 750 rials (206 dollars)," said Raju Nat, a 24-year-old Indian.  
Inside the stadia, early action has been played out in ghost-like atmospheres.  
The group stages of the football tournament, which kicked-off on Tuesday, have yet to capture the imagination of the public with only the match between Qatar and Jordan keeping the stewards gainfully employed.  
The athletes village, which will be converted into a hospital after the

tournament, has also had to contend with a chicken pox scare.  
Two members of the Maldives volleyball team were diagnosed with the disease while another showed signs that he too was infected.  
The entire team was then moved out of the athletes village. As a result of the outbreak, the team was forced to cancel its match against Taiwan on Tuesday.  
Also missing out on volleyball action was the Palestinian territories team who failed to make it out of the Gaza strip in time. The same fate befell their table tennis squad who were forced to skip their opening team event clash on Wednesday.  
On Thursday, there will be action in five sports.  
China's badminton world champion Lin Dan got the team off to a flying start with a 21-19, 21-11 win over Anup Sridhar of India, but

his build-up was far from perfect.  
"I heard our driver went to get coffee, so I lost 20 minutes of preparation time," said Lin who was also unhappy with the playing conditions at the Aspire Dome.  
"There was a little bit of wind blowing around the venue because of the ventilation."

Glue comes undone!

Macau's women were disqualified from the Asian Games table tennis team event Thursday for using illegal glue on their bats.  
They were found guilty of using "dangerous and high levels" of glue during routine testing of players' equipment, a Games official said.  
"The level of aromatic solvent was 300 parts per million. Those are very dangerous, high levels," technical official Park Do Cheon said while announcing the quarterfinal draw of the women's team event.  
The glue is used to stick the rubber to the bat but high levels can also help increase the spin and alter the speed of the ball.  
Macau's women lost both their matches Wednesday 3-0, to Thailand and Singapore. Their men also lost and have bowed out of the team competition.  
A spokesperson for the Macau team could not be reached.

Regueiro out for six months

Valencia's injury problems took another turn for the worse on Thursday when Uruguayan international winger Mario Regueiro tore the cruciate ligament in his left knee in training.  
The club said that the 28-year-old will be out of action for between six and seven months after twisting his knee as the team prepared for this weekend's match against Recreativo Huelva.  
Valencia have been plagued by injury this season with fellow midfielder Edu suffering the same ligament tear two weeks ago.  
Eight other players are on the treatment table including leading strikers David Villa and Fernando Morientes who are doubtful for the Recreativo match.  
Valencia have not won a league match in over a month and dropped to eighth in the Primera Liga following last week's 1-0 defeat at home to Real Madrid.

Caribbean show awaits

With 100 days to go to the start of the 2007 World Cup, officials in the Caribbean are frantically putting the finishing touches to arrangements for the hosting of the event.  
International Cricket Council (ICC) and local organisers have just completed a crucial 'make-or-buy' spin through the region to examine the stadia and assess the readiness of the nine countries hosting the matches.  
All have been given the green light, with minor concerns about timelines for completion of some parts of the infra-structure.  
Chris Dehring, managing director of CWC 2007, and Don Lockerbie, the event's venue development director, have constantly reminded officials in the nine host venue territories that time is of the essence.  
They also reminded them that failure is not an option, and if one territory "messes up", then the whole Caribbean has "messed up", and they have kept officials on their toes with the threat of matches being switched to another venue.  
In Barbados, where the final will be contested on April 28, the government is spending 67.5 million dollars on upgrading the famous Kensington Oval.  
This does not cover major improvements to the island's airport, roads, medical, and other ancillary facilities.  
This sort of development is taking place in all, if not most of the nine host territories which also include Antigua, Grenada, Guyana, Jamaica, St. Kitts, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, and Trinidad.  
In Antigua, they have built a completely new stadium with the help of the Chinese government which will carry the name of the island's most famous son of the soil, Sir Vivian Richards, the former West Indies batting legend of the 1970s and 1980s.

The Chinese have also helped Grenada which was ravaged by two major hurricanes in the last five years to reconstruct the Queen's Park Stadium.  
Guyana has leaped on the Indian government for help to construct the new Providence Stadium to replace the Bourda Oval sward which was outdated and flooded every time it clouded over the capital of Georgetown.  
Jamaica and Trinidad too, the most populous of the English-speaking Caribbean nations, as well as St. Vincent have followed Barbados and have also made improvements to the long-serving Sabina Park, Queen Park Oval, and Amos Vale respectively.  
St. Lucia opened the Beausejour Stadium four years ago and have hosted Tests and one-day internationals, while St. Kitts inaugurated the new Warner Park earlier this year when India visited the Caribbean.  
In all, airports, roads, medical and other ancillary facilities have all been spruced up to meet the challenge of hosting the 100,000 visitors which organisers estimate will come for the event.  
Detractors have argued whether it was necessary to spend so heavily on the event, but Dehring has constantly indicated that some of the development was necessary, and had been fast-tracked by eager governments looking to put on a good show for the World.  
Security, a major, major concern in an era of terrorist plots and threats, has also received extensive attention.  
The United States and Britain, both long-time allies of the region, as well as South Africa, host of the 2003 tournament, have all offered technical and financial assistance to the Caribbean nations.  
Police officers and military personnel have undergone extensive counter-terrorism measures, and they will also receive human resource support from the United States, Britain, and South Africa.

All of the territories have signed into law Sunset Legislation with hefty fines for security breaches at grounds, but it also covers the host nations sharing immigration information, and offering one entry visa for travellers for the period of the World Cup.  
But it has not all been smooth sailing.  
There are still some unanswered questions about accommodation, and the fickle intra-regional travel service which the venue inspection team experienced for themselves on a recent trip from Guyana to Grenada.  
Several pieces of luggage were left behind, and it prompted a stern reprimand from Dehring to operators of regional airlines.  
There may be more concerns about airline travel for Dehring and his team of planners in the New Year, when all four of the major regional air carriers -- BWIA, LIAT, Caribbean Star, and Air Jamaica -- will undergo either significant restructuring programmes, or mergers.  
The other critical area of operations which officials have not addressed with any confidence is accommodation.  
Major hotels have charged mega-bucks for premium rooms, much to anger of organisers, and Dehring has expressed concern that this may drive away some of the extra-regional visitors that had planned to come for the event.  
To combat the problem, local organisers have pursued a 'bed and breakfast' programme as well as calling in cruise ships.  
Ticketing officials have recorded 55 per cent sales of seats for the matches, with the final in Barbados, all but sold out.  
Prices in some cases remain out of reach for the average Caribbean citizen, with a premium seat for the final costing 300 dollars, six times the price for a similar seat at the Wanderers in Johannesburg four years ago.

India shift focus

Virender Sehwag, India's stand-in captain, looked ahead to a three-match Test series after his side took a third successive pounding from South Africa's fast bowlers in the fourth one-day international at St George's Park Wednesday.  
South Africa clinched the series with an 80-run win after India were swept aside for 163.  
Herschelle Gibbs, caught off a no-ball when he had two, made 93 not out to anchor the South African innings after the home side again lost early wickets.  
Pointing to a lack of substantial partnerships among the top order batsmen, Sehwag said: "We have a long tour with three Test matches. We have lost the one-day series but we are looking forward to the next games."  
Sehwag said experienced batsman VVS Laxman, on his way to replace injured captain Rahul Dravid, would strengthen the batting for the final one-day game at Centurion Sunday.  
South African captain Graeme Smith said: "We haven't batted at our best but we have shown a lot of character and we have bowled and fielded well. The energy the guys have shown has been terrific and we haven't given them a chance to get a sniff."

India made a promising start, with Wassim Jaffer and Sehwag putting on 23 before Jaffer was caught at slip off Makhaya Ntini in the sixth over.  
Within the next four overs, the match was effectively over as a contest with Sachin Tendulkar and Sehwag, the side's most senior batsmen, falling to Shaun Pollock and Ntini respectively.  
Mohammad Kaif was run out and Mahendra Dhoni played one extravagant shot too many as India slumped to 82 for five on a ground where conditions are generally more difficult for the side batting second under floodlights.  
Left-handed all-rounder Irfan Pathan was defiant to the end, making 47 not out to give the total some respectability.
