## **UAE 35th National Day Report**

National Day of the United Arab Emirates, a seven-member federation in the southeast of the Arabian peninsula, marks the completion of 35 years since it was formally established in December 1971. Under the leadership of President His Highness Sheikh Khalifa bin Sayed Al Nahyan and Vice President and Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, who succeeded his elder brother, Sheikh Maktoum bin Rashid Al Maktoum early in the year, the state has succeeded over the past twelve months in making substantial further progress in its economic and social development,

and has continued to play an active and constructive role in regional and international affairs.

The basis for the country's thriving economic and social sectors was laid down by the UAE's founding President, Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan Al Nahyan, who died in November 2004. Although this was a sad loss for the UAE and its people, it has not interrupted the country's development, and, indeed, the smoothness of the transition to a new generation of leaders has underlined the way in which the UAE has enjoyed remarkable stability since it was formed.

Building upon the work of their predecessors, the President and Vice President, with the support of

the other members of the country's seven-member Supreme Council of Rulers, have now embarked on a major initiative designed to broaden popular participation in government. In mid-December, elections will take place for the first time for half of the members of the Federal National Council, the UAE's parliament. Candidates will come from over 6,500 members of electoral colleges established in each of the emirates, over 1,100 of whom are women. Provided that the elections are successful, it is then planned that the FNC will be expanded and that it will be given greater powers to initiate and scrutinise legislation and the work-

ings of the Council of Ministers, the

executive arm of government.

Thirty-five years ago, when the

United Arab Emirates was established, its population was far smaller than it is today, around 2,50,000 people, compared to today's figure of over 4 million. Many of the people lacked access to modern education and other facilities, and the structure of government was only just beginning to be developed. Now, however, the UAE enjoys one of the highest rates of literacy in the developing world, as well as an enviable level of social and economic development. It is now time, the government and the people of the UAE believe, for the system of government to be reformed so as to encourage a

greater degree of popular participation, in accordance with the country's traditions and heritage.

Major changes are also underway in the structure of the country's economy. Whereas in the past the government, both at a federal level and at the level of the individual emirates, played the major role in terms of the economy and provision of social and other services, now the local private commercial sector has developed the sophistication and experience to be able to take on the responsibility for a wide range of tasks once handled by government. The last year has seen further divestment by government of its interests in areas such as power and water as well as

liberalisation of property ownership legislation that has stimulated growth throughout the economy.

According to a recent study by the Ministry of Economy, the UAE's Gross Domestic Product, GDP, is expected to grow at a rate of around 23 percent during 2006, compared to the 2005 figure, to reach a total of 597 UAE billion dirhams (around 162 billion US dollars). Local investment is expected to reach 117 billion dirhams (US dollar 31.8 billion), an increase of 24.9 percent, while commodity exports are expected to rise by 21 percent to 514 billion dirhams (US\$ 139.7 billion), of which around 40 percent will come from oil and gas
