Hajj still uncertain for thousands of pilgrims

Hajj performance of around 4,000 prospective non-ballottee pilarims will become uncertain even if the national flag carrier arranges additional hajj flights of its own, unless foreign airlines also agree to do so.

The number of ill-fated prospective pilgrims may rise to 12,000 if Bangladesh Biman also fails to operate additional flights for three

The civil aviation and tourism ministry applied to Jeddah airport authorities for 11 additional slots for Biman's hajj flights for the period of December 23 to 25, but the clearance has not come yet, the sources said adding that they will know about it tomorrow. The original schedule for Biman's hajj flights has been from November 26 to December 22.

Leaders and activists of Jatiya Party (JP) yesterday vowed not to let the next general elections be held if their chairman HM Ershad is not allowed to participate in the


The JP declared a dawn-to-dusk hartal in five northern districts of the country for tomorrow in protest against what the JP leaders termed

Hamas accuses Fatah of trying to kill Haniya

Bodyguard killed, son injured in attack on PM

The ruling Palestinian Hamas movement accused its Fatah rivals yesterday of trying to assassinate Prime Minister Ismail Haniya as the duelling factions clashed in the West Bank

Tensions escalated after a latenight attack on Haniya's convoy at the Rafah border crossing in the Gaza Strip left one of the Hamas leader's bodyguards dead and his son injured.

Hamas, which has accused a strongman in the Fatah party of Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas of being behind the attack, responded by deploying hundreds of masked gunmen in the otherwise deserted streets of Gaza City.

In the main West Bank city of Ramallah, 26 Palestinians were injured when police, swinging truncheons and firing rifles into the air, clashed with Hamas sympathisers.

The latest flareup comes amid rapidly escalating cross-faction

violence ahead of a speech by the moderate Abbas Saturday in which he is expected to call early elections despite protests from Hamas.

The attack on Haniva's convoy happened Thursday night as he crossed through Rafah after waiting hours at a border checkpoint that had been shut by Israel to prevent the Islamist premier bringing tens of millions of dollars into Gaza after a regional fundraising tour.

"It is an assassination attempt carried out by traitors led by Mohammad Dahlan," Hamas spokesman Ismail Radwan told a press conference in Gaza City, referring to a powerful security figure in Abbas's once dominant

"Mohammad Dahlan bears personal responsibility for this sassination attempt."

Hamas has also blamed Abbas's own presidential guards, who are responsible for security at the Rafah terminal, for the attack, which occurred after Hamas gunmen stormed the border

Dahlan, long one of Hamas's harshest critics, was quick to deny the charge, as were other prominent Fatah leaders.

Abbas spokesman Nabil Abu Rudeina denounced the "arbitrary and irresponsible charges against the presidential guard and certain Palestinian leaders.

Hundreds of masked Hamas gunmen, brandishing AK-47s and anti-tank rockets, took up positions along Gaza City's central thoroughfares following the pointed accusa-

Abbas, at loggerheads with Hamas since it took power after a shock January election win, said he 'regretted" the attack on Hamas, the Palestinian WAFA news agency

But Israeli Deputy Defence Minister Ephraim Sneh said his initial regret was that the gunmen had missed their target.

Japan creates defence ministry for first time since 1945

Japan yesterday created a fullfledged defence ministry for the first time since World War II, when the United States stripped the defeated country of its right to a military.

The upper house voted, with support from both the ruling coalition and main opposition, to create the defence agency. The lower house had earlier passed the bill. meaning it becomes law, a parlia mentary official said.

Post-war Japan has had a "Defence Agency" with lower standing than full-fledged ministries as the 1947 constitution declared the country to be pacifist.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, the first Japanese leader to be born after the war, has put a top priority on creating a defence ministry and eventually rewriting the constitu-The reform would give Defence

Agency Director General Fumio Kyuma the title of defence minister. although Japanese troops would still be called the "Self-Defence Forces"
