#### Miyamoto signs for Salzburg

AFP, Osaka

Former Japan defender Tsuneyasu Miyamoto has agreed to play for Austrian first division outfit FC Salzburg, his current club, J-League's Gamba Osaka, said Wednesday.

The 29-year-old Miyamoto, known as "Batman" since he played with a mask on his fractured nose in the 2002 World Cup, joined Osaka in 1995 and has scored seven goals in 295 games in the J-League.

He captained the national team in the 2002 and 2006 World Cups and scored three goals in 71 international

Miyamoto was to sign a contract Wednesday. He is expected to join

Salzburg on January 4. "I wanted to play for overseas

clubs. I want to improve my skills in completely different conditions," said Miyamoto.

"I'm ready to show 100 percent of what I've learned through experiences in Gamba Osaka and the national team. I'd like to play like a freshman."

Osaka failed to defend the J-League title this year, finishing runners-up, while FC Salzburg are top of the Austrian league with 44 points, 10 points ahead of SV Mattersburg

### Japan expect tough road

Japan expect a tough road to win the Asian Cup for a record fourth time after the defending champions were drawn against Qatar, the United Arab Emirates and Vietnam.

Qatar are the Asian Games gold medallists, while Vietnam is the cohost of next year's tournament.

Qatar are coached by Dzemaludin Musovic, who was an assistant coach when current Japan coach Ivica Osim piloted the former Yugoslavia to the 1990 World Cup quarter-finals.

"There are no easy groups. Host countries have an advantage at home. It would be a tough competition. We should not lose," said

Tsuyoshi Ono, the Japan Football Association's technical director. "It doesn't matter who's drawn

with Japan. We must prepare for the Asian Cup thinking that we can't beat anybody easily. Qatar have two wins and two

draws against Japan, the United Arab Emirates have two wins, two defeats and six draws, and Vietnam won 3-2 when they played Japan in 1961

Japan lost to the Emirates 1-0 when they played the last time in

the Kirin Cup in May last year Qatar have midfielder Khalfan Ibrahim, who became the youngest player to win the Asian Football Confederation's Player of the Year this season, and Uruguay-born forward Sebastian Quintana, both

Osim, who has called the Asian Cup "a stepping stone to the World Cup," plans to send scouts to January's Gulf Cup in which Qatar and the United Arab Emirates are to take part

The Bosnian-born coach said the gaps among Asian countries were narrowing

"New countries, including those from the former Soviet Union, are getting stronger and stronger, Osim said.

The top two teams from each group will advance to the knock-out round in the Asian Cup, to be cohosted by Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand and Vietnam in July.

### Asian Cup draw held **Everton get**

Debutants Australia were pitted Tuesday alongside Asian Games runners-up Iraq while defending champions Japan were drawn with Asiad winners Qatar in next vear's Asian Cup finals.

At a glitzy ceremony in Kuala Lumpur, 2003 beaten finalists China were lumped in the same group as Iran and Uzbekistan. They will also play co-hosts Malaysia.

South Korea are alongside fellow World Cup side Saudi Arabia, the semifinalists at the last Asian Cup, Bahrain, and co-host Indonesia.

Australia, the most successful Asian team at the World Cup, are in the Asian Cup finals for the first time after abandoning Oceania in January this year, and will also face Oman and Thailand.

As well as Qatar, Asian powerhouse Japan face off against United Arab Emirates and Vietnam

Australian coach Graham Arnold singled out Irag as their toughest

"I'm very happy with our pool. We are going in as one of the top seeds

and we have plenty to live up to," he "Thailand are the highest ranked

of the co-hosts. Oman are an unknown quantity but Iraq we are familiar with. Irag are our toughest opponent. They are the one we fear and respect the most."

Arnold said he believed "75 to 90 percent" of his overseas-based stars. including Harry Kewell, Tim Cahill and Mark Viduka would play, adding glamour to the tournament.

"We are demanding that they be made available by their clubs because this is a very prestigious tournament," he said. Australia were seeded along with

Iran, Japan and South Korea. It means they will avoid each other until the knockout stages.

The tournament opens in Bangkok on July 7, with the semifinals played in Hanoi and Kuala Lumpur before Jakarta hosts the final on July 29.

There was last-minute drama when Saudi Arabia said it would not play in Thailand "for diplomatic reasons" that were not fully explained, although it is believed to stem from the killing of a Saudi diplomat in Thailand

It meant the three-time champions could not be drawn in Thailand's group, or Vietnam's, as the winner of that group would play their quarterfinal in Bangkok.

Takeshi Ono, technical director at the Japan Football Association, said all groups were equally tough, highlighting the standard of football in Asia. "We are just happy to be in the last

16."he said "We realise there are no easy groups. Of course there is added pressure on us as the defending champions, but our philosophy is to take one game at a time and see how

things develop." South Korea, who have failed to win the Asian Cup since 1960, have a tricky draw against Saudi Arabia and Bahrain with only the top two teams from each group moving into the knockout stages

But Korean officials were content with the way it panned out.

"It is very good for Korea, although we are wary of Saudi Arabia as our results against them have never been good," said Korea Football Association manager of international affairs Shin Man-kil

"We have not won the Asian Cup since 1960 and our goal is to change that in 2007."

The draw is the culmination of 10 months of qualifying.

Organising the tournament in four different countries for the first time has been fraught with difficulties, with four organising committees, four media centres, as well as the

#### Bayern firm on **Hargreaves**

Bayern Munich have emphasised that their England international midfielder Owen Hargreaves will not be joining Manchester United or anyone else in the winter break, saying they need him to challenge for the Bundesliga and Champions League crowns.

The 25-year-old Hargreaves has used the press to try and pressurise Bayern into letting him join Manchester United -- who have already had a 25 million euro bid snubbed -- but Bavern want the midfielder to help them achieve this season's aims. "Nothing is going to happen in

the winter break," general manager Uli Hoeness said on the club's homepage. "We are facing Real Madrid in the Champions League so we do not want to weaken our team. We are a football club not a "We have to look how we can

strengthen the team. What use is an additional 30 million euros in the bank? We want to go far in the Champions League and catch Bremen and Schalke in the league we need Owen Hargreaves to do

However Hoeness did admit that Hargreaves, contracted until June 2010, could be sold in the future if a replacement could be found for the right price.

"If at some point we think we have a replacement for Owen who costs less then perhaps we w think about it," Hoeness added.

VfL Wolfsburg was agreed. The 23-year-old dos Santos agreed to move to Wolfsburg on loan until the end of the season on Tuesday afternoon before sustaining an injury to his right leg in Bayern's training session.

Dos Santos will now miss the first month of the season when the Bundesliga resumes after a sixweek winter break.

The Paraguayan midfielder oined Bayern 11 months ago from Cerro Porteno in a two-million euro deal but has only played five league matches.

The Premiership club agreed to buy the player from Uruguayan side National Montevideo at the start of last season but he was unable to obtain a work permit for Britain.

"He used to be my hero," said

McCarthy. "He was a player who I always wanted to be like. I have so much respect for him -- and I love learning from him. "It's a little bit strange actually

because I have gone from being a big fan to standing next to him on the training pitch. "In South Africa I used to watch a lot of English football -- everyone

ikes to see winning teams and I think that's why I adopted Manchester United. I used to know everything about them, but now I'm Blackburn through and through.

"I couldn't have come to a better club. It may be a smaller club than United, but it has a big heart, I'm feeling loved and very welcome.
