Warne rides into sunset

Test cricket's greatest bowler Shane Warne announced his retirement from international cricket on Thursday, drawing the curtain on one of the most celebrated careers in the sport's his-

Saying he wanted to go out on top, the 37-year-old Australian legspinner with a world record 699 Test wickets revealed the two remaining Ashes Tests against England will be his last international matches.

"It's been unbelievable -- my ride in international cricket's been phenomenal," an upbeat Warne told a packed media conference at the Melbourne Cricket Ground.

Warne said he had also retired from Australian domestic cricket but will see out the remaining two vears of his contract with English county side Hampshire.

Fast bowler Glenn McGrath is also tipped to announce his retirement soon, while batsmen Damien Martyn quit suddenly just before the third Ashes Test.

Warne said he had considered retiring after the 2005 Ashes but decided to press on after Australia's shock loss to England set him on "a mission to get that

The goal was accomplished in

Australia took an unassailable 3-0 lead in the series and Warne said he could now retire happy, even though his remarkable bowling prowess remains intact.

He broke the news to captain Ricky Ponting as the team celebrated its Ashes victory in Perth.

"While the team's successful I think it's a good time to go out on top," Warne said, declaring "now is my time" and saying he could not imagine reversing the decision.

Warne's Test record and largerthan-life personality have already assured his status as a legend in

The Sydney Daily Telegraph declared Warne's departure as the "End of an era" and the Australian newspaper hailed him as cricket's best ever bowler.

Warne was pleased to have the chance to take his 700th Test wicket before his adoring home crowd here and then finish his career in Sydney, where he made his debut against India in January

"I don't think I could have written the script any better," he told the nationally televised press

Warne -- almost as well-known for his off-pitch antics including a series of sex scandals, a positive drugs test and bookmaking controversies -- said he was looking forward to time away from the

"I suppose there's always going to be attention on what I'm doing in my personal life, off-field ... hopefully it won't be to the same level, the same scrutiny, the same intensity, the same judgemental, moralistic sort of stuff," he said.

The scandals led to Warne being stripped of the vicecaptaincy in 2000 and probably prevented him from becoming Australian skipper, but he said he had no regrets.

"I've given everything I possibly could to the cause, and that was winning. Cricket to me is my hobby, my passion and I love doing it. Yeah, I'll probably miss it

I've missed one-day cricket in the last few years." Warne said he felt privileged to have played in a champion Australian side and felt he had

Warne said he would like to be remembered as someone who gave it everything he possibly could, he had fun along the way, he was an entertainer and people liked watching me, I suppose".

Warne, whose attacking flair revolutionised spin bowling, also stressed the importance his fighting qualities played in his game.

"I've never walked away from an issue -- I'm knackered, I'm tired, I can't move -- I've still been able to turn up and play," he said. "I've given absolutely everything to the

He said he did not yet have any post-retirement plans, except to spend more time with his children, amid reports he will take a commentator's job with Australia's Channel Nine

"I don't know what the future holds, I don't know what I'm going to be doing," he said, adding however that he had "some

He said he would work with Cricket Australia to forge a role in the sport in his home country.

"I love Australian cricket... and I'll do whatever it is to keep Australian cricket at the top," he

He laughed off a suggestion from his former captain Steve Waugh that he could eventually coach bitter rivals England, a side he has haunted and humiliated as a bowler.

"I don't know what Stephen's on," he said.

On his immediate future, Warne said: "My focus is these next two Test matches and after that I'll sit back and have a few quiet beers and few smokes and try and weigh it all up and see what the future holds.

Bangladesh will tour Zimbabwe in February 2007 for a one-day international series but on their own conditions, mentioned Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) general secretary

Zimbabwe Cricket (ZC) had invited Bangladesh to play a fivematch series as preparation for next year's World Cup in the West Indies but the board, which agreed to make the tour, proposed for a four-match

"We have agreed to tour but we want to make the trip as short as possible and play not more than four matches. Our proposal is a tour from February 1-11," Mahbub told the Daily Star last night.

The tour was originally proposed for January but BCB wanted a change in the schedule as it clashes with the domestic league.

"We also want to give the cricketers more time to rest before leaving for the Caribbean. We have yet to receive the confirmation but we're expected to get the answer from the ZC very soon," he added.

Ronaldinho seeks to be a Spaniard

Throughout his career, only Shane Warne's sublime on-field performances have generated more headlines than his tempestuous life away from the cricket pitch.

By retiring at the height of his powers, the 37-year-old lea-spinner

who announced his departure from international and Australian cricket Thursday has cemented his reputation as the greatest bowler ever to play the game.

Already, Warne has been acclaimed as the second best sportsman in Australia's history, behind only legendary batsman Don Bradman, one of his heroes.

tainment and I've tried my guts out every single time," he said, announcing his retirement.

The spinner they call Hollywood has taken more Test wickets that any other bowler, skittling 699 batsmen in 143 Tests at an average of 25.49 since his debut against India in January 1992.

But the statistics tell only part of the story. The cigarette-puffing, beerswilling Warne revived the longdormant art of leg-spin bowling with his amazing ability to turn the ball and

intimidate the opposition. His former national captain Steve Waugh said he knew there was something special about the chubby young bowler from suburban Melbourne when he first saw him bowl on an Australian youth tour

"I could hear the ball fizzing down the wicket," he said of the unlikely

prodigy sporting spiky blond hair. "It's something I've never heard before or since from another bowler. it was just the revolutions and energy he was putting on the ball."

Warne posted inauspicious figures of 1-150 in his 1992 Test debut but knuckled down under his mentor Terry Jenner and 18 months later caught the cricketing world's attention with the "ball of the century" against England.

The delivery, Warne's first in an Ashes Test, turned prodigiously to bamboozle England's Mike Gatting and herald the arrival of a cricketing superstar.

But controversy accompanied the stellar performances, tainting

Warne's reputation to the extent that he was never made captain of the Australian cricket team, a position his ability certainly warranted.

England fast bowler Steve Harmison announced his retirement from oneday internationals on Thursday, while injured captain Michael Vaughan was recalled for next month's triangular series here. Harmison, 28, said he wanted to

concentrate on Test cricket as he quit ahead of the series with Australia and New Zealand and next year's World Cup. "After careful consideration and

having taken advice from several people who have been close to me throughout my career, I have decided to retire from one-day international cricket with immediate effect," he said in a statement.

"This has been a difficult decision but I want to play at the highest level for as long as I can and believe that concentrating solely on Test cricket is the best way forward for me during the next phase of what will hopefully be a long England

career," he said. Harmison has struggled with his

form, taking just one wicket in the first two Ashes Tests against Australia. He took five in Perth but was unable to prevent Australia taking an unbeatable 3-0 series lead. He has taken 67 wickets in 46
