> Needless to say, Bangladesh is important for Japan. It is because Bangladesh plays key roles in South Asia, the Islamic world and multilateral forums. It also maintains significant contribution as a profound and prolific trade and investment partner to the Japanese business communities. The perpetual friendship between Bangladesh and Japan generates impeccable impact in

the lives our Bangladeshi friends. The list produces a number of tangible outcomes.

The most visible Japanese support is portrayed in developing large-scale infrastructure here in Bangladesh. Japan has significantly supported in con-structing local transportation network that include the Meghna and Meghna-Gumuti Bridges, the Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge, the Lalon Shah Bridge, and the Khan Jahan Ali Bridge, etc. Such substantially built and fully operational transportation network greatly enhance the economic activities and improves people's lives. In addition, Fertilizer factories financed by Japanese ODA produce 60 percent of the total local fertilizer output that eventually contributes Bangladesh in achieving self-sufficiency in

Japan's aid in Bangladesh gives a profound impact on daily lives of the grassroot Bangladeshi people. Such aid, furthermore, played a prominent role in supporting polio eradication and improving reproductive health status in Bangladesh. Moreover, Japan provided more than 80 cyclone shelters in this country so that the needy and deprived ones have some shade in the moments of unforeseen disaster. Japan also participated in rural development and arsenic mitigation interventions that influenced significant progress in this devel-

oping country. Evidently, Japan pays much focuses on developing Bangladeshi human resources and in building their capacity. Every year, approximately 80 Bangladeshi students and professionals go to Japan for education and training purposes under various Japanese government programs. More than 4,000 JICA alumni, 1,000 AOTS alumni and 2,000 Monbu-Kagakusho Scholarship alumni are now playing important, productive, and effective professional and policy-making roles in their respective fields all over
