Tea seller Bishal: An unstoppable

The 11-year-old boy secured GPA 5 in the PEC exams

A tea seller has got grade point average (GPA) 5, obtaining 529 marks out of 600 in this year's Primary Education Completion (PEC) examinations.

Md Bishal Mia, son of Liakat Mia, took part in the PEC exam from Sahera-Gafur Government Primary School in Dakkhin Mourail area of Brahmanbaria town.

The tremendous result has amazed people of his locality as the boy, who has to work at the tea stall of his father from 5:00pm to midnight every day, was rarely seen to manage time for his study.

Hailing from Araisidha village in Ashuganj upazila, Liakat, father of three children, has been struggling to run his five-member family with his small income from the tea stall. He runs the tea stall at the platform of Brahmanbaria railway station from 5:00pm to 12:00am every day.

Of the children, elder son Evan is

now doing his diploma at Brahmanbaria Polytechnic Institute, daughter Tarin Akter is a Class VII student of local school and Bishal achieved GPA 5 in this year's PEC exam, said Liakat.

Bishal said earlier Evan helped his father. He is now working at the tea stall since his brother got chance in the polytechnic institute two years ago.

"Every night I studied for two hours after returning home from the tea stall. I hardly could manage time for private tutoring, said Bishal.

Bishal dreamt of becoming a cricketer or engineer in his life.

School Managing Committee President Golam Mohiuddin Khan Khokon said 36 students, including Bishal, got GPA 5 from the school. Bishal was also the first boy in Class III and IV.

Poverty cannot bar anyone from achieving his or her success, he said.

Beekeepers flourish around mustard fields

Different areas near mustard fields in Faridpur Sadar upazila are now teeming with beekeepers from neighbouring districts. In Charmadhabdia union, several beekeepers

from Rajbari has set up their man-made hives on open land near mustard fields where the honeybees forage for nectar.

Beekeeper Arman Mandal, an 18-yearold from Goalanda upazila in Rajbari, told this correspondent that this year he came to Taltala village and set up bee colonies in

100 hives. "My father has been doing this work for 16 years and I've been doing this for five years."

He has been extracting eight to ten maunds of honey from the bee colonies every week and the prices he was getting for each maund ranged between Tk 14,000 to Tk 16,000.

Almost half of his earnings is spent on his higher than that in last year.

daily expenses during the extraction period and feeding of the bees in the off-season, he added.

Mokter Mondal, another beekeeper this correspondent met in the village, said the weather condition this year has so far been favourable for harvesting honey and he was collecting about five to seven maunds of honey each week from 80 bee hives he set in the area.

"I'm getting good price for it too," the man said happily.

Contacted, deputy director of Department Agricultural (DAE) Extension Faridpur, Kartik Chandra Chakraborty, said mustard is being cultivated on 8,305 hectares of land in nine upazilas of the district this year.

He also said the department has been providing all sorts of support to the beekeepers and according to their estimation, about 14 tonnes of honey would be harvested in the district this year -- one tonne
