# Language a problem for Gibbs

Sylhet Thunder coach frustrated by communication issues

"About local players, a lot of them don't understand English. So, it is difficult for me to make points all the time. It is frustrating," said Gibbs yesterday in Sylhet.

However, Gibbs is not the only South African on coaching duty with Bangladeshi players. There are in total four South Africans currently working in the Bangladesh national team management with head coach Russell Domingo, batting coach Neil McKenzie, fielding coach Ryan Cook and physio Julian Calefato all from South Africa.

### Domingo ready to go to Pakistan

Uncertainty has surrounded Bangladesh's scheduled tour of Pakistan later this month. While the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) was confident and adamant about hosting

all three scheduled T20Is and two Tests, the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) said that they would prefer a short tour but that too depended on whether the board could form a good team for the tour as a number of players and coaching staff were unwilling to travel to Pakistan.

However, Bangladesh head coach Russell Domingo made his stance regarding travelling to Pakistan clear yesterday.

"I think some guys [in the team management] are not keen to go. But if we have to, then I am going," Domingo told Cricbuzz yesterday.

A two-member International Cricket Council delegation comprising CEO Manu Sawhney and head of finance and commercial affairs Ehsan Mani is expected to visit Bangladesh later this month on a routine visit, informed Bangladesh Cricket Board CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury yesterday.

Sawhney, who was appointed as the fifth ICC CEO in April last year, is expected to exchange views with BCB.

"The delegates are expected to discuss about the tender process and commercial rights of upcoming ICC events after 2023. It's a routine visit from the ICC,' Nizamuddin told The Daily Star yesterday.

### 'Hope he plays as long as he can'

Paine will be Australia's captain for the foreseeable future and there is no reason why he would not lead the team in next year's inaugural

World Test Championship final if they qualify, coach Justin Langer said on

Paine was seen by many as a placeholder when he became Australia's 46th Test captain in 2018 after the 45th, Steve Smith, was banned for 12 months for his part in the Newlands ball-tampering scandal.

Selected for his demeanour as much as for his batting and wicketkeeping skills, Paine was at the helm when Australia lost a first home series to India, but has since overseen the retention of the Ashes in England and two series triumphs.

Langer gave the idea of a leadership change short shrift ahead of the third Test against New Zealand on Wednesday.

"Truth is there's been conjecture from outside but there's never been one millisecond of conjecture within our team," he told reporters at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

"He's almost our most important player because he's a very good leader, his captaincy's been excellent, he's the best wicketkeeper in the world, he's as fit as anyone in the group.

"If he believed he could bat as well as we think he can, then we'll see results like we did in the last Test.

Forty points from a victory in the third Test, which starts at the SCG on Friday, would help second-placed Australia close the gap on top-ranked India in the nine-team table.

Langer said he thought there was every chance Paine would lead the team out at Lord's in 18 months' time should they remain in the top two and qualify for the title-decider.

"I hope he plays as long as he possibly can because his leadership's been brilliant," Langer added.

## NZ look to salvage pride in smoky Sydney

Smoke haze could come into play as New Zealand look to salvage some pride from their miserable tour of Australia in the third and final Test in Sydney

With bushfires raging across New South Wales state, day two of the match on Saturday shapes up as the biggest challenge with temperatures forecast to soar and smoggy conditions expected.

The issue of smoke is a difficult one for officials, who currently rely on a mix of air quality guidelines from the International Cricket Council, state governments and the Australian Institute of Sport.

But there are inconsistencies on what is considered "unsafe", with Cricket Australia and the players' association currently working to develop better protocols around visibility and air quality.

It follows a Big Bash League match in Canberra being abandoned this month because of toxic bushfire haze.

Currently, it is up to the umpires to decide whether conditions are safe, without any formal framework for that decision. With the first two Tests at Perth and

Melbourne ending in heavy defeats inside four days, New Zealand will need all the help they can get. Coach Gary Stead admitted the

Black Caps were "beaten up by Australia again" in their 247-run Melbourne thrashing and they have had to go back to the drawing board. "We've got to find some areas

where we can keep chipping away, make improvements and put Australia under pressure for longer," he said.

When you get put under pressure for the periods Australia have put us under, then you have to question what we're doing.

### Archer may miss 2nd Test

England paceman Jofra Archer may miss out on second Test against South Africa after skipping bowling practice at Newlands on Wednesday.

Archer, who took six wickets in the first Test defeat at Pretoria including 5-102 in the second innings, did bat in the nets and took part in fielding drills but a sore right elbow kept him from bowling. A decision on the 24-year-old

would have to be made just before the start of the Test on Friday.

### **Lyon against 4-day** Tests concept

Australia off-spinner Nathan Lyon says he is totally against the idea of tinkering with the duration of five-day Test matches and hopes the proposal to shorten the game's longest format is not even considered by administrators.

The International Cricket Council (ICC), the world governing body of the sport, is set to reflect on the idea of making Test matches fourday affairs to free up a crammed international calendar and reduce player workload.

Australia have said they will seriously consider the concept, while England will back making it mandatory from 2023.

The cash-rich Indian board (BCCI) are yet to declare their stance on the matter.
