

Punishment not enough to dissuade youths from militancy

Counter Terrorism chief says

Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) Additional Commissioner Monirul Islam yesterday said punishment is not enough to dissuade youths from getting involved in extremism.

"Extremism can't be stopped by hanging or imprisoning the extremists; extremism generates in the brain," said Monirul, also chief of Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) unit of DMP.

"We want to address this and stop young minds from being corrupted," he added.

Monirul made the remarks while speaking at a workshop, held at Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy in the capital.

Darshak Shrota Pathak Foundation, in association with seven other organisations -- including Utsarga Foundation and CTTC -- arranged the workshop titled "Tarunner Bangladesh". Youths from different districts took part in the event.

Seeking cooperation from the youths, the CTTC chief said youngsters have a major role to play in eradicating extremism from the country.

Law enforcement agencies alone cannot curb militancy and extremism; everyone must shoulder the responsibility, Monirul said.

"We need support from families, civil society, teachers, religious leaders, cultural personalities and so on. If they perform their duties with conviction, youths won't be misguided and won't take the destructive path of extremism," he added.

Darshak Shrota Pathak Foundation President Ziaul Hasan said youths played a vital role during the Liberation War in 1971, which helped the country achieve independence faster.

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72nd founding anniversary of BCL today

Shovon, Rabbani not invited to celebratory reunion

Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) is going to observe its 72nd founding anniversary today.

The student body -- formerly East Pakistan Student League -- was formed in 1948 under the leadership of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, then a student leader and law student of Dhaka University.

Since its inception, the organisation has made significant contributions to national events including the Language Movement in 1952, Mass Uprising in 1969, Liberation War in 1971, and Anti-Autocracy Movement in 1990.

Marking the founding anniversary, a reunion is scheduled to be held at Suhrawardy Udayan this afternoon with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina as the chief guest.

Meanwhile, the student body has not invited its two top former leaders -- Rezwanul Haque Chowdhury Shovon and

Golam Rabbani -- to the reunion.

"We have not invited them as per the instruction of AL high command," said the organisation's acting president Al-Nahean Khan Joy.

Shovon and Rabbani were removed from the posts of Chhatra League president and general secretary on September 14, 2019 for their controversial activities and alleged abuse of posts.

According to several media reports, the top leaders of BCL were removed after Jahangirnagar University Vice-Chancellor Prof Farzana Islam alleged that Shovon and Rabbani demanded "four to six percent" cut from a Tk 1,445-crore project at the university.

On December 17 last year, the organisation relieved 21 central executive committee members of their duties amid allegations that some members of the committee were involved in irregularities and misdeeds -- including not being enrolled

in educational institutions, and engaging in extortion, drug dealing. Eleven other members of the central executive committee submitted resignation at different times.

Apart from the reunion, BCL has organised a three-day programme starting from today, according to a press release of the organisation.

Today's programme will include hoisting the national and party flags at party offices at 6:30am, placing wreaths at the portrait of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman at Dhanmondi-32 at 7am, and cutting a cake at 8am in Curzon Hall on DU campus.

Other programmes include a voluntary blood donation drive on January 6 at Aparajeyo Bangla on DU campus, distribution of educational materials on January 7 at the same venue and donating winter clothes among the destitute in front of Shoparjito Swadhinata sculpture on the campus at 4pm the same day.

'Police threatening BNP leaders ahead of city polls'

Ruhul Kabir Rizvi claims

BNP yesterday accused law enforcement agencies of raiding houses of its leaders and activists and intimidating them ahead of elections to Dhaka south and north city corporations.

"The government is trying to cause problems [for us] over the city polls. Our Bangshal unit president and councillor candidate [Tajuddin Ahmed] Taj was arrested yesterday [Thursday]," said BNP Senior Joint Secretary General Ruhul Kabir Rizvi.

"Police has started arresting our popular candidates to keep them away from campaigning," he added. Rizvi claimed the law enforcers were going to the houses of BNP leaders and activists and were intimidating them.

"Many of our councillor candidates told me that police have threatened to arrest them or create trouble for them if they contest the polls," Rizvi said.

The BNP leader came up with the

allegations at a press conference at the party's Nayapaltan headquarters.

Rizvi said they are joining the election braving all odds and enduring repression to expose the "despotic" attitude of the government.

Taj, who submitted his nomination paper to vie for Ward 32 councillor post in DSCC polls with BNP's support, was arrested on Thursday from Tikatuli intersection.

Rizvi said they have almost finalised their councillor candidates for the two city corporation elections.

They will complete the process by January 9, he added.

He also accused the jail authorities of barring the relatives of BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia from meeting her for the last 19 days.

"It's a violation of the jail code," he said. He urged the government to take steps to allow Khaleda's family members to meet her.

BNP councillor candidate sent to jail

A Dhaka court yesterday sent BNP-backed councillor candidate Tajuddin Ahmed Taj to jail over a case lodged against him for torching vehicles. Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Ashek Imam passed the order.

Taju was set to stand in the forthcoming Dhaka South City Corporation election as a councillor for ward-32. He is the president of Bangshal Thana unit of BNP.

Earlier, Bangshal police produced him before the court on two cases including torching of motor vehicles.

Talking to the agency, OC of Bangshal Police Station Shaheen Fakir said Taju was an accused in several cases.

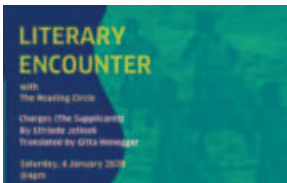
