Beekeeper dealt bitter blow

Honey yield from mustard fields in Tangail drops due to cold, dense fog

MIRZA SHAKIL, Tangail

Honey yields from mustard in Tangail were dealt a blow this year due to unfavourable weather conditions, say cultivators.

Although half of the season has already passed, beekeepers have not been able to collect honey as per their expectations due to the bitter cold and dense fog since the time mustard flowers began blooming.

On the other hand, local beekeepers are deprived of fair prices -- with many selling the honey they produced last year at throwaway prices.

A large amount of honey, around 100 tonnes, collected from mustard and other flowers last year remain unsold, leaving honey cultivators in a tight spot.

Cultivators said where they sold per maund of honey for Tk 6,000 in 2018, they were unable to sell it for even Tk 4,000 last year.

During the season, cultivators get honey five times a year: from mustard flowers from the second week of November till

JNU RAMPAGE Protests rage across India

Protests were held across India yesterday after masked assailants wielding batons and iron rods went on a rampage at a top Delhi university, leaving more than two dozen injured.

Controversy over Sunday's violence at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) comes as a new challenge to the government as it confronts major nationwide protests against a new citizenship bill that critics say is anti-Muslim.

Some students blamed the university attack on right-wing activists, but they also accused police of doing nothing to stop the violence.

At least 28 students and teachers were injured, while doctors and nurses from a nearby hospital who went to treat them were also attacked, their union said.

Scores of riot police yesterday patrolled the university -- the alma mater of several key ministers in Prime Minister Narendra Modi's cabinet -- picking their way past shattered glass and broken doors and furniture.

They made no immediate arrests, but blamed the violence on "rival student groups".

As condemnation of the attacks spread, more than 1,000 people held a vigil in

Police want postings on deputation

On second day of Police Week, they also demand rise in number of SP-rank officials, interest-free car loan, among others

Police have demanded postings on deputation in the Anti-Corruption Commission, Department of Narcotics Control (DNC), BRTA, and BIWTA to look after the enforcement and investigation activities of those organisations.

During a conference with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at her office in the capital yesterday, top police officials also asked for increasing the number of posts at the ranks of superintendent of police and above, providing interest-free loan for personal vehicles, residential facilities for the chiefs of different police units and posting officials in Bangladesh missions abroad.

The meeting was organised on the second day of the ongoing Police Week 2020.

On the demand for postings on deputation, Hasina said policemen were already being posted to the ACC. She said she thought the police should have representatives in the DNC, Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) and Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA).

She said the government would take steps in this regard. Her speech was broadcast live on Bangladesh Television.

Harun Or Rashid, deputy inspector general of Mymensingh Range, placed the demands at the meeting.

Asked why police wanted postings in those organisations, a number of officials said enforcing law and carrying out investigations are the inherent duties of the policemen who are trained on these subjects.

"So, if police are given the duties in those organisations, those will be carried out more effectively," a DIG-ranked official told The Daily Star on

Scientists plan to plant a billion new trees using drones

A group of scientists in Canada have announced a new initiative to use drones to plant new trees cheaply and quickly in part of an effort to fight against the negative effects of climate change and deforestation.

Called Flash Forest, the team began testing its drone delivery systems in August, with a test flight that saw them successfully plant 100 trees with a drone.

Those results were so encouraging they've expanded their goals to use their specially designed drone systems to plant a billion new trees by 2028.

"Every year the planet loses 13 billion trees and regains less than half of that," the team's Bryce Jones

USE OF EVMS CEC says it's to ensure no irregularities take place

Chief Election Commissioner KM Nurul Huda yesterday turned down BNP's demand for not using electronic voting machines (EVMs) in the Dhaka city elections slated for January 30.

After a meeting with the CEC, the BNP alleged that the EVMs would be used in the Dhaka north and south city corporation polls for "silent vote rigging", while the CEC said they wanted to ensure no irregularities take place in the elections.

"As EVM is an offline system, there is no scope for hacking. There is no scope for silent vote rigging. We had used the EVM in the parliamentary, local government, and city corporation elections. Voters or candidates did not raise such allegations," the CEC said.

Defending the EC's decision to use the voting

SLAIN IRANIAN GENERAL'S FUNERAL New commander promises revenge

Trump steps up rhetoric against Iran, threatens Iraq sanctions

Hundreds of thousands of Iranians thronged Tehran's streets yesterday for the funeral of military commander Qassem Soleimani, killed by a US drone strike, and his successor promised to drive US forces out of the region in revenge.

The coffins of Soleimani and Iraqi militia leader Abu Mahdi al-Muhandis, who also died in Friday's attack in Baghdad, were passed over the heads of mourners chanting "Death to America".

The killing of Soleimani, the architect of Iran's drive to extend its influence across the Middle East, on the orders of US President Donald Trump has stoked concern across the globe that a broader Middle East conflict could erupt.

Trump has listed 52 Iranian targets, including cultural sites, that would be hit if Iran retaliates with attacks on Americans or US assets.

"I promise to continue martyr Soleimani's cause as firmly as before with the help of God, and in return for his martyrdom we aim to get rid of America from the region," said General Esmail Ghaani, the new commander of the Quds Force, the elite unit of Iran's Revolutionary Guards charged with overseas operations.

"God the Almighty has promised to take martyr Soleimani's revenge. Certainly actions will be taken," he told state television.

Other political and military leaders have made similar threats without offering specifics. Iran, which lies at the mouth of a Gulf oil shipping route, has a range of allied
