Culprit a serial rapist: Rab

Lone suspect in DU student rape arrested; victim 'identifies' him

He is a serial rapist and he tried to kill the Dhaka University student after raping her in the capital's Kurmitola area on Sunday night, Rab said hours after arresting the suspect in nearby Shewra area yesterday.

The law enforcers also said the arrestee, Majnu, a 30-year-old drug addict, had earlier raped several female beggars and intellectually challenged women near the same place.

"Majnu is a mugger, a vagabond and a serial rapist ... He raped his victims whenever he got a chance while mugging them," Lt Col Sarwar-Bin-Quasem, Rab's legal and media wing director, said at a press briefing at their media centre in the city.

He claimed Majnu admitted during primary interrogation that he alone raped the DU student and tortured her for about three hours.

Majnu told the Rab that he was lying in wait for a victim on his way from the Kurmitola General Hospital on Sunday.

When the DU student was walking from Kurmitola bus stop to a friend's house in nearby Shewra area around 7:30pm, he saw her backpack and started following her.

At one point, he grabbed her from behind, gagged her and dragged her to a quiet place nearby, where he slapped, beat and raped her, the Rab official said, quoting the arrestee.

The crime scene is several yards from the Airport Road, one of the busiest thoroughfares in the capital, and surrounded by bushes.

The rape incident sparked a firestorm of protests and condemnations across the country. The victim's fellow students at Dhaka University took to the streets, demanding the rapist's immediate arrest. They were later joined in by students in other districts.

After arresting Majnu early yesterday, Rab personnel showed his photograph to the victim, 21, at One-stop Crisis Centre of Dhaka Medical College Hospital, where she was taken after the rape.

UKRAINE PLANE CRASH IN IRAN

All 176 on board die

82 Iranians, 63 Canadians among them; unverified video show plane on fire in sky; Iran says they won't let the US have the black boxes

A Ukrainian airliner crashed shortly after take-off from Tehran yesterday, bursting into flames and killing all 176 people on board.

Debris and smouldering engine parts from the Boeing 737, which carrier Ukraine International Airlines said was last serviced two days ago, were strewn across a field southwest of the Iranian capital where rescue workers in face masks laid out scores of body bags.

Among the victims were 82 Iranians, 63 Canadians, 11 Ukrainians, 10 Swedes, three Germans and three Britons, Ukrainian Foreign Minister Vadym Prystaiko said. Most passengers were in transit, the airline said.

The plane crashed hours after Iran launched missiles at bases housing US forces in Iraq, with the confrontation between Tehran and Washington threatening to cause a wider conflict in

the Middle East. Officials cautioned that speculation about what happened was premature. It was the Kiev-based carrier's first fatal crash, and it said it was doing everything possible to establish the cause.

Ukraine was to send a team of experts to Iran later yesterday to investigate the crash, President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said in the Ukrainian capital.

"Our priority is to establish the truth and those responsible for this terrible catastrophe," he said.

Canadian Foreign Minister Francois-Philippe Champagne said he was in touch with Ukraine's government.

"Our hearts are with the loved ones of the victims ... We will continue to keep Canadians informed as the situation evolves," he said on Twitter.

Iran's civil aviation authority yesterday said they have recovered the black boxes of the plane.

Trump avoids escalating crisis

Imposes sanctions; 22 Iranian missiles hit US targets in Iraq

President Donald Trump yesterday said the United States did not necessarily have to use its military power against Iran, in an apparent attempt to defuse a crisis over the American killing of Iranian military commander Qassem Soleimani.

Speaking from the White House, Trump said no Americans were harmed in Iranian missile attacks on military bases housing US troops in Iraq overnight and suggested Washington might not carry out immediate retaliation.

"The fact that we have this great military and equipment, however, does not mean we have to use it. We do not want to use it. American strength, both military and economic, is the best deterrent," he said.

"Our great American forces are prepared for anything. Iran appears to be standing down, which is a good thing for all parties concerned and a very good thing for the world," he said.

Trump stopped short of making any direct threat of military action against Iran but said the United States "will immediately impose additional punishing economic sanctions on the Iranian regime" in response to what

Crosscheck it before sharing

PM urges people

UNB, Dhaka

Stressing the need for ensuring cybersecurity, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged all to cross-check any information before sharing it on social media for the good of the country and the society.

"Cybersecurity is very much important. I would like to tell the people that it is not wise to react just after seeing anything on the internet without checking its authenticity...all have to cross-check the information," she said.

The PM was speaking at an award-giving ceremony of Digital Bangladesh Day 2019 at the capital's Bangabandhu International Conference Centre.

She said it has been observed that different unwanted contents appear while using the internet. "There should be a system to filter all those...there should be a system to give security [to the users]."

Hasina called upon the people not to pay heed to rumours. "The validity of information is very important because it can cause extensive damage to the society and one's personal life."

She also put emphasis on making children and youths aware of cybercrimes.
