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Build consensus for peace and prosperity

President urges in his address to first JS session of new year

President Abdul Hamid yesterday urged concerted efforts to build a national consensus regarding the fundamental issues of continuity of democracy, the rule of law, and the country's uninterrupted socioeconomic development.

"Peace and prosperity cannot take a permanent shape without national consensus," he said while addressing the first session of the new year at the House, which is also the sixth session of the 11th parliament.

According to the constitution, the president is scheduled to address before the first session of new year.

His speech was earlier approved by the cabinet.

Terming the Jatiya Sangsad the centre of the nation's hopes and aspirations, the head of the state said the ruling party and the opposition should also play a constructive role side by side to successfully fulfil the hopes and aspirations of the nation, consolidate transparency, accountability, tolerance, human rights, and the rule of law.

"Irrespective of the treasury bench and the opposition, I request all concerned to play appropriate roles in this House, which is the ultimate resort to fulfilling of people's expectations."

He added that the ruling party and the opposition would also have to play a constructive role in strengthening

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Tk 1.85cr found in civil servant's possession

ACC raids his home, office in Parbatipur; detains him

A government official was detained in Dinajpur yesterday after the Anti-Corruption Commission recovered more than Tk 1.85 crore from his possession, said ACC officials.

The detainee is Tajul Islam, project implementation officer (PIO) of Parbatipur upazila.

Although there was no official comment on how the 40-year-old man accumulated the money, an ACC official said it was stolen from different government project funds.

Abu Hena Ashiqur Rahman, deputy director of the anti-graft watchdog in the district, said acting on a tip-off received on ACC hotline 106, a seven-member team raided Tajul's office at Parbatipur Upazila Complex around 5:30pm.

The team, accompanied by policemen, found Tk 55,000 at the office, he said, adding that they later found more money stashed in four travel bags at Tajul's residence at the complex.

Doctors at NICVD perform minimally invasive procedure on elderly heart patient; the new surgery in Bangladesh gives hope to people with aortic valve stenosis

Surgeons at the National Institute of Cardiovascular Disease (NICVD), for the first time, have successfully replaced the aortic valve in an elderly woman's heart using a minimally invasive procedure.

The surgery known as transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) was performed on Archana Rani Deb, 55, on January 5. She had been suffering from a medical condition called aortic valve stenosis.

The condition occurs when the heart's aortic valve narrows and does not open fully, obstructing blood flow from heart into the aorta, the main artery of the body, said Pradip Kumar Karmakar, who led the operation.

Eminent Indian interventional cardiologist Ashok Seth and NICVD Director Mir Jamal Uddin supervised the surgery.

"This non-surgical intervention is much safer than the open-heart surgery, especially for old people," Ashok told The Daily Star.

Archana's husband Ratan Sarkar said, "My wife came home two days ago and she is doing the household chores. I offer the heartiest thanks to the doctors."

Open-heart surgery was the only way of treating such patients in Bangladesh, surgeon Pradip said, adding that the major beneficiary of new

Police recovered the bodies of a woman and her six-year-old son at their home in Manikganj's Satura upazila yesterday.

It is known that, during the sixth and seventh century, more than half of all Scandinavians perished as frigid temperatures caused widespread devastation.

Experts have long been stumped by the 8.5ft tall stone, with most theories claiming it is a dedication to the legendary Ostrogoth king, Theodore the Great.

More than 700 runes cover its five sides and its true meaning has eluded experts as chunks of the rock are missing or worn away.

The deceased Basi Mong Marma, 30, of remote Gobachhari area in the upazila, used to transport people on motorcycle as a profession, police said.

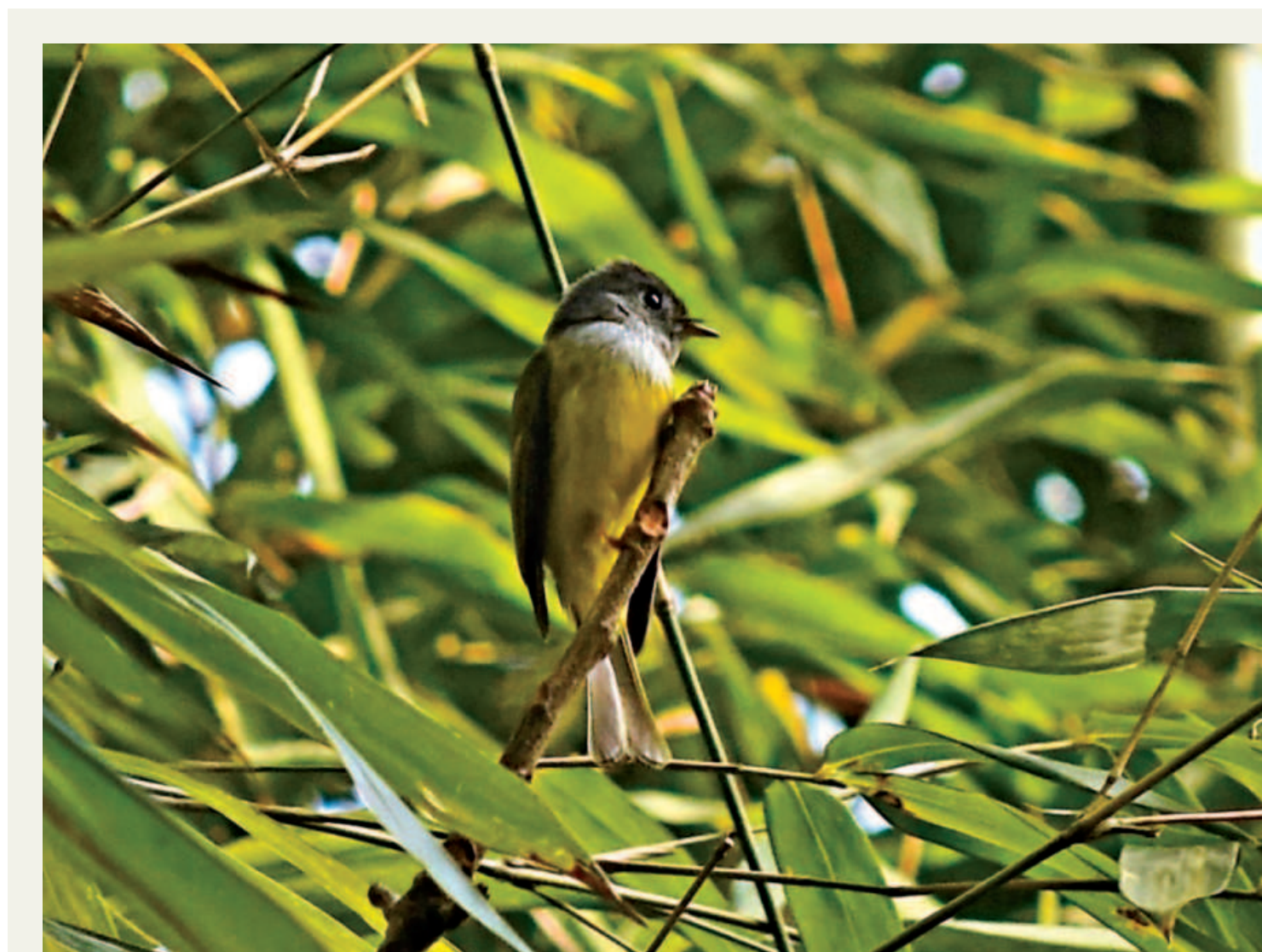

HUGE BUSHFIRES Australia urges another mass evacuation

Australian authorities urged another mass evacuation across the heavily populated southeast yesterday as a return of hot weather fanned huge bushfires threatening several towns and communities.

Victoria state Premier Daniel Andrews urged communities to be on alert ahead of the extreme conditions.

"If you receive instructions to leave, then you must leave," Andrews said in a televised briefing. "That is the only way to guarantee your safety."

Parts of Kangaroo Island, a wildlife-rich tourist spot off the southeast coast where Prime Minister Scott Morrison on Wednesday made a plea for foreign tourists not to be deterred by the fires, were again evacuated yesterday.

"I urge everyone to heed warnings, follow advice, and to head to the east part of the island, which is deemed safe at this point," South Australia Fire Chief Mark Jones said in a separate briefing in Adelaide.

A third of the island has been destroyed. Twenty-seven people have been killed this fire season, according to the federal government, as the monster fires have scorched through more than 10.3 million hectares (25.5 million acres) of land, an area the size of South Korea.

Thousands have been made homeless and thousands have had to evacuate repeatedly because of the volatility of the fires.

Residents of the coastal town of Mallacoota, where

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
