This is pretty much what Shahin it to him." Alam heard, when he arrived at Karwan Bazar in search of work.

The 30-year-old Sirajganj native had lost everything to river erosion and in desperation, came to the capital

But things were not easy. He tried his luck in construction, transport and garment sectors, but to no avail.

"All I had left was Tk 100. I came to Karwan Bazar, not knowing what to do. It was late at night but the area was abuzz with activity. I saw workers unloading goods from trucks and delivering those to merchants," Shahin said.

So he started asking around. "They told me I can get work here but I have to rent a tukri

[wicker basket] first." One of the workers turned out to be from his village. "He took me to the 'Arot Bhaban' [dry goods depot] and introduced me to a person there. He wrote down my name and took Tk 20 from me and handed me a basket. He said after I was done, I have to return

"That's how I started working as a porter at this market," a busy Shahin told these correspondents recently, in between delivering goods. "I remember, I made Tk 300 that

arduous, it's not complicated nor do I have to face any hassle," he added. "I can support my family with the money I make," said Shahin.

haggling in the dank alleys, the market is quite a sight.

Meanwhile, amid the constant shouting of merchants, workers pushing and shoving anything and everything on their way and buyers complaining of being charged extra or not getting a better deal, Sumon Hawladar - with a basket filled with coriander leaves loaded on his head -- was seen completing a deliverv.

The 35-year-old was a busy man to talk to. He had to take the produce to a nearby shop, unload the herb and then come back for another round.

For Sumon, this will continue till dawn. He has been working as a porter for over nine years.

He said he used to be a aretaker at a building in Dhanmondi back in 2010. He left the job after an argument with one of the owners.

It's all too loud

Noise levels higher than permissible everywhere in Dhaka; secretariat area the worst-affected

It seems practically impossible to find an area inside Dhaka without noise pollution, as evident by a recent study -- that collected data from 70 neighbourhoods in the city and found sound levels higher than permissible

levels in every one of them.
Findings of the study, by Center for Atmospheric Pollution Studies (CAPS), were disclosed at a press conference organised by Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (Bapa) at Dhaka Reporters' Unity

The extent of sound pollution in the secretariat area still is uncontrolled, although the government on December 17 last year declared it a "silent area".

Presenting the study, Dr Ahmad Kamruzzaman Majumder -- professor of Environmental Science at Stamford

University -- said people from almost all areas including silent, residential and mixed categories in the city are facing noise pollution.

In the secretariat area, he said they found the lowest level of sound at 99.5 decibels (dB) at Shikkha Bhaban area, and the highest of 124.1 dB at Paltan bus stand.

The standard noise level should be within 50 dB in a silent zone, according to Bangladesh's noise pollution guidelines.

The data was collected using sound level meters during daytime at 12 spots surrounding the secretariat area, and other places of the capital between December 14 to 22 last year, Dr Kamruzzaman added.

Death anniv of **Justice Habibur** Rahman today

Today marks the sixth death anniversary Justice Muhammad Habibur

Rahman, who served as the chief of the caretaker government prior to the 1996 general election.

Born on December 3, 1928, Rahman was a language movement veteran, a teacher at Dhaka University and Rajshahi University, and author of 95 books on topics including politics, religion and works of Rabindranath Tagore.

He was appointed chief justice in February 1995.

No room for autocracy in Bangladesh: Dr Kamal

Stating that there is no room for autocracy in independent Bangladesh, Jatiya Oikyafront convener Dr Kamal Hossain yesterday said people must take risks to

Speaking at a discussion, he also said creating obstacles to holding a fair and credible election is tantamount to disgracing martyrs of the Liberation War.

Bangabandhu had sought democracy, but there's no democracy in our country now as we accepted autocracy instead of independence. Sometimes, risk needs to be taken for protecting democracy, and we've to take that risk this time," Dr Kamal said.

Gonoforum arranged the programme at Jatiya Press Club, marking Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's Homecoming Day.

Dr Kamal, also the president of Gonoforum, said he was "very fortunate to have got the chance to work as an activist of a great leader like Bangabandhu Sheikh

Mujibur Rahman".

"As long as Bangladesh remains, people of the country will remember him and respect him. He liberated the country and made people its owners. It's written in the constitution signed by him that people are country's owners. We achieved the independence as we got an outstanding leader like Bangabandhu," he observed.

Mentioning that Bangabandhu never compromised with injustice and unfairness, the Oikyafront chief said, "We must put up a resistance against unfairness. There's no scope for autocracy in Bangladesh.

Dr Kamal said Father of the Nation Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had given the guidelines through the constitution so people can enjoy their basic rights.

Four councillors elected unopposed

Two ward councillor candidates and two other candidates for reserved women councillor seats in Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) have been elected unopposed.

They are: Anwar Iqbal of ward-25, Arif Hossain of ward-43, Nargis Mahtab (reserved seat) of ward-6, and Nilufar Rahman (reserved seat) of ward-8. They all are supported

by the ruling Awami League. Returning Officer Abdul Baten said they found single candidate in those four positions on Thursday after the withdrawal of candidacy.

"We have informed the candidates of their unopposed win," he said.

According to Election Commission, a total of seven candidates are vying for mayoral, 335 for general ward councillor and 82 for reserved women councillor posts in DSCC election, to be held on January 30.
