'Calling of the Roots' underway at Zainul Gallery

The art forms that showcase Bangladesh and India's shared legacy deserve celebration. Bearing that in mind, Prachi Protichi, an Indo-Bangla cultural organisation, has arranged the group art exhibition, Calling of the Roots, at Zainul Gallery, Faculty of Fine Art (FFA), University of Dhaka (DU), in collaboration with the Department of Drawing and Painting, FFA, DU. Eminent Bangladeshi artist Rafiqun Nabi inaugurated the exhibition as the chief guest on January 8. Renowned artist Professor Jamal Ahmed, the President of Bangladesh Charushilpi Sangsad, attended the occasion as the special guest. Tapos Mallick, convener

of Prachi Protichi, talked about the activities of the organisation. Dulal Chandrow Gain, Assistant Professor, Department of Drawing and Painting, FFA, DU, delivered the welcome address at the programme.

Walking in noted painter Tarun Dey's footsteps, Prachi Protichi started their journey in 1999, with the vision of fostering collaborations between painters of various schools as well as bringing prominent and promising artists together on a common platform. Eminent poet-litterateur Sunil Gangopadhyay and Bangladeshi artist Jamal Ahmed are notable supporters of the organisation. "In 2002, we organised our first International exhibition in Dhaka," said Tapos

Mallick, convener of Prachi Protichi. "So far, we have organised 43 art exhibitions, and over 30 art camps and workshops in India and

beyond. We also set up the Prachi Protichi Gállery at Santiniketan last year. We plan to launch another gallery in Kolkata soon."

Prachi Protichi has a publication, which has already published 8 literary books. The organisation has also honoured luminaries like Debes Roy, Sudhir Chakraborty, Mohan Singh Khangura, Santimoy Chakraborty, Bani Basu, Rafiqun Nabi, Jamal Ahmed, Hiran Mitra, Bulbul Mahalanbish and others with the annual 'Santiniketan Sammanana'.

Calling of the Roots features an array of artworks by 48 Bangladeshi and Indian artists. The participating Indian artists at the exhibition are M F Hussain, Paritosh Sen, Ganesh Pyne, Bijan Chowdhury,

Buddhadev Guha, Somnath Hore, Ganesh Halui, Suhas Roy, Prakas Karmakar, Robin Mondal, Jogen Chowdhury, Bipin Goswami, Ramananda Bandopadhyay, Sanat Kar, Dhiraj Chowdhury and Washim Kapoor. The featured Bangladeshi artists are Rafiqun Nabi, Shahabuddin Ahmed, Alokesh Ghosh and Dr Farida Zaman, alongside Jamal Ahmed, Mostafizul Haque, Rokeya Sultana, Ahmed Shamsuddoha, Nisar Hossain, Sheikh Afzal Hossain, Mohammad Iqbal, Anisuzzaman, Harun-ar-Rashid, Dulal Chandrow Gain, Abdus Sattar and Bishwajit Goswami. The artworks on display reflect the ethos of Bangladesh and India's shared heritage. The exhibition concludes on January 14.

Sylhet enjoys an evening with the maestro of rhythm

The four-time Guinness World Records holder, London based Bangladeshi percussionist Pandit Sudarshan Das's rhythmic performances enthralled Sylhet's audience, recently.

He performed in an exclusive programme organised by the division's Sammilita Natya Parishad, and shared his experiences of four record breaking performances.

The programme, Taal O Loy'er Oporup Oishwarya, was held at Kabi Nazrul Auditorium in the city's Rikabibazar area on Wednesday evening after two days workshop on tabla on Sunday and Monday.

The percussion maestro set the Guinness World Record in 2016 by playing the tabla for 557 hours and 11 minutes, at a stretch. In 2017, he set the record for playing the dhol for 27 hours. He played 14 hours of drums in 2018. His latest achievement was drumming for 140 hours and 5 minutes in 2019.



Pandit Sudarshan Das's family hails from Chattogram and is based in London, where he started learning tabla at the age of four.

In the programme, he stated that he wants to break his own records in the future, and set an example for the future generations so that they can bring honour to the country.

The programme was supported by Chattogram Samity in Sylhet and Sylhet-Chattogram Friendship Foundation.



220 films from 74 countries to be screened this year

The 18th Dhaka International Film Festival (DIFF) opens today with the screening of *Una Ventana Al* Mar (Window to the Sea), directed by Miguel Angel Jimenez, at Bangladesh National Museum (BNM). Rainbow Film Society has been organising the festival since 1992, with the theme 'Better Film, Better Audience and Better Society'. Foreign Minister Dr A K Abdul Momen will attend this year's opening ceremony as the chief guest, while State Minister for Foreign Affairs Shahriar Alam, the chief patron of the DIFF, will preside over the programme. A cultural event will be held before the screening of the opening film.

Earlier this week, during a press conference held at Dhaka Club's Samson H Chowdhury Lounge, the organisers officially announced the dates and details of the festival. Festival Director Ahmed Muztaba Zamal stated that 220 films from 74 countries will be screened this year, across BNM, National Public Library, Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA), Alliance Française de Dhaka (AFD), Madhumita Cinema Hall and Star Cineplex.

Film tickets at BNM and Central Public Library are BDT 50, while shows at BSA and AFD are free. Students can watch the films for free upon showing their valid ID cards. However, ticket prices at Star Cineplex and Modhumita Cinema Hall are set by their authorities. "We have 26 films in DCP format, which can only be screened at Star Cineplex. This year, we managed

a 4K projector and two more projectors sponsored by Jazz Multimedia," said Ahmed Muztaba Zamal. "However, we still lack a fully equipped festival zone. Most international film festivals have a fixed venue with the required equipment for screenings. We hope that in the near future, we will have

The press conference was also attended by executive committee members M Hamid, Mofidul Haque and Nazmul Ahsan Kalimullah, along with Kishwar Kamal, Chairperson of the DIFF and Iranian filmmaker Zohreh Zamani, Head Programmer of the festival.

The jury board of the DIFF features Polish filmmaker Joanna Kos-Krauze, prominent Bangladeshi filmmakers Mostafa Sarwar Farooki

and Nargis Akhter, renowned singer

Taneem Rahman Angshu's 'No Dorai' is one of the eight films in the Bangladesh Panaroma section.

Maqsoodul Haque, Australian docu-filmmaker and human rights activist Robyn Hughan and several other notable film personalities from Bangladesh, India, Sri Lanka, Italy, Spain, Kosovo, Canada, Russia and Iran.

The films will be screened in eight sections, including Asian Competition, Retrospective, Cinema of the World, Children's Films, Spiritual Films, Women's Films, Short and Independent Films and Bangladesh Panaroma.

This year, the Retrospective section features four films by Polish director duo Joanna Kos-Krauzey and Krysztof Krauze. Bangladesh Panaroma, a section for local films, offers eight films — Amra Ekta Cinema Banabo, Mayaboti, Shuttle Train, Chandrabati Kotha, Tunes of Nostalgia, Maya

No Dorai. One film from among the eight will be awarded by the International Federation of Film Critics jury.

The Lost Mother, Nigrohokal and

Rainbow Film Society will also host the 'Sixth International Women Filmmakers Conference', a twoday event, starting from tomorrow. Female filmmakers, actors and several other notable personalities from all over the world will participate in the conference, along with BGMEA President Dr Rubana Huq, at Dhaka Club's Samson H Chowdhury Lounge. A daylong programme, 'West Meets East', will also be held on January 14 at the same venue.
