

A milestone towards attaining secularism

Hindu Bouddha Christian Oikya Parishad on students' demonstrations for polls deferment

Following Election Commission's announcement to change Dhaka city polls' date to February 1, Bangladesh Hindu Bouddha Christian Oikya Parishad in a press release welcomed the decision, and said further demonstrations will be discontinued.

In the press release, the Parishad's general secretary Rana Dasgupta said, "The students' protest to defer the date of the polls will be a milestone for establishing the secular nation that Bangabandhu dreamed of."

Earlier in the day, the platform had

announced that minority communities across the country will begin a week-long demonstration from tomorrow, including an hour-long road blockade on January 25, demanding deferral of Dhaka north and south city corporation elections, which were scheduled for January 30, coinciding with Saraswati Puja.

"We will start our countrywide demonstration through human chains and protest rallies on January 20," Rana Dasgupta had announced at a press conference at the platform's office at Paltan Tower in the capital yesterday.

TWO TALES OF A CITY

Protests over the deferment of city polls date raged on throughout the day, with some DU students needing saline after falling sick during their hunger strike, while some had to be hospitalised. This is the length that protesters went to press home their demand, which was finally met after the EC yesterday night changed the polls date to February 1. The students celebrated the decision by bringing out a procession on the campus late at night. On the other side, candidates campaigned in full swing. Atiqul Islam met voters in Mirpur's West Shewrapara; Ishraque Hossain greeted the crowd at Islampur; Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh spoke to a gathering at Jatrabari, and Tabith Awal visited Khilgaon.

Students call off hunger strike

Students of Dhaka University ended their hunger strike yesterday as the Election Commission deferred the date of Dhaka north and south city corporation elections to February 1.

They brought out a procession on the campus celebrating the occasion and thanked the EC for its decision, reports our DU correspondent.

The demonstrators had started the hunger strike on Thursday, demanding rescheduling of the polls which coincided with Saraswati Puja on January 30.

On the last day of their event held at the base of Raju memorial sculpture, three DU students fell sick. With them, a total of 13 students faced similar fate while observing the hunger strike.

Jagannath Hall Union Vice-President Utpal Biswas said one of the three students were admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) while the rest were given

Of them, a student named Ovi Das Pritom was taken to DMCH around

11:30am vesterday.

The other two -- Tanvir Hasan Saikat, member of Dhaka University Central Students' Union (Ducsu), and Dipto Saha, joint secretary of DU unit of Bangladesh Chhatra League -- were administered intravenous saline in the morning.

"Most of the students, who had been observing the strike since the beginning, fell sick. They should be taken to hospitals,

Earlier students had said until the EC deferred the polls date, they would not take

Arnab Hore, who fell sick during the strike, had said, "If needed, the strike will continue till the day of the polls.



The above reverberated through BNP's campaign yesterday. The party also said their leaders and activists will remain present on

the voting day, defying all odds to encourage voters to practice their democratic rights on January 30.

"We as a responsible party will encourage voters to cast their votes on the election day. We will be present [at the polling centres] and no matter what, we will stand our ground strongly," said BNP mayoral candidate Tabith Awal for Dhaka North City Corporation yesterday.

Tabith, on the ninth day of the campaign, was electioneering in the Khilgaon area.

"Voters are afraid. They want their voting rights to be protected. They want to vote for their chosen candidate through a democratic process. We urge the Election Commission to ensure safety for all voters on the day,"

He promised that if elected, he will ensure accountability of the mayor and councillors and make the city corporation a corruption-free institution.

He also expressed concern regarding the use of electronic voting machines (EVM) and "capture" of polling centres by the incumbent party.

With elections to the two city corporations less than two weeks away, Awami League mayor and councillor candidates are campaigning in full swing, while BNP aspirants are alleging that their supporters are being pressurised and intimidated by ruling party activists.

Tabith Awal complained that polls code was being violated incessantly

but the Election Commission was not doing anything about it, even after complaints were lodged. Meanwhile, AL mayor candidate Atiqul Islam campaigned in Kochukhet,

Kazipara and Shewrapara areas yesterday. While campaigning in Kochukhet Bazar, he said if elected again, he will

aunch an app named "Sobar Dhaka" through which anyone can inform about their problems and DNCC will take immediate steps to solve those. Besides, he also promised to set up a passenger shed in the Kochukhet area within three months of being elected mayor.

He hoped that he will be elected mayor again as people are with him. "I am hopeful to win as I am getting huge response from people," he added. Meanwhile Atiqul's wife Dr Shaila Shagufta Islam campaigned for her husband in Mohakhali's Karail slum area along with media personalities Shomi Kaiser and Tanvin Sweety.

"We are getting huge response from people. All are supporting 'boat' Awami league's electoral symbol]," said Dr Shaila Shagufta.

People skeptical of big pledges

The two mayor candidates for Dhaka South City Corporation polls --Awami League's Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh and BNP's Ishraque Hossain -- yesterday campaigned in different parts of the city and made big pledges to woo voters

On the ninth day of electioneering, both Taposh and Ishraque promised a clean and developed DSCC, if elected.

Several voters, however, while talking to this correspondent, expressed apprehension whether the city corporation mayor has enough power to take decision regarding development of Dhaka.

"Every day, they [Awami League and BNP mayor candidates] are making big promises that if elected they will resolve all problems. I want to ask them if they have enough jurisdiction to implement their promises or they are just rhetoric," said Mozibur Rahman, a tea vendor from Iatra Bari

While campaigning in the area, Taposh, flanked by hundreds of leaders and activists of AL and its associate organisations, pledged that people's civic amenities would be ensured within five years, if he is elected.

Seeking co-operation from all to make Dhaka a modern city, he said, "I will serve as a public servant and build a developed city.

The mayor aspirant said under a proper plan, Dhaka will be modernised systematically. "We will bring back the culture and heritage of the city."

Asked, Nizam Uddin of Uttar Jatrabari, said, "We are used to hearing such pledges from candidates before the polls. But the reality is quite different. Many roads in the city are in a sorry state. We continue to face water crisis. We cannot walk on footpaths as they are grabbed by hawkers. Meanwhile, Ishraque started his campaign in Sadarghat area yesterday.

He also announced short, medium and long-term plans to solve the city's problems. "My main task will be to make this city liveable as the present condition of the city is not suitable for that," he added.

He said he will take all measures to make Dhaka a clean city.

"I saw the sorry state of different parts of the city including Kadamtali, Shyampur and Jatrabari areas recently. It's more or less the same in other areas. The current undemocratic and unelected government is responsible for the city's condition," he alleged.

"As the present government is not elected, they feel no responsibility towards people," Ishraque further alleged.

His speech, however, made many locals skeptical.

Nabi Mohammad, a trader from Bangla Bazar area, said how Ishraque will be able to develop the city if Awami League government does not cooperate with him? "How will he fulfil his pledges without the government's support?" he asked.

Says president at National Defence College reunion

President Abdul Hamid yesterday expressed hope that all members of the armed forces will continue their relentless efforts through discipline, skills, patriotism and dutifulness for the betterment of the force.

"Trust in leadership, mutual belief, respect, professional skills and discipline are prerequisites to the development of any force, It is my firm belief that members of armed forces will continue their relentless efforts through hard exercise, discipline, professionalism and patriotism," he said. The president was addressing the reunion of National Defence College (NDC) of Bangladesh held at Mirpur Cantonment.

Terming the armed forces a symbol of pride, he said members of armed forces are playing a laudable role in nation building, facing the natural disasters and supporting the civil administration apart from maintaining the country's independence and sovereignty.

Referring to the implementation of Armed Forces Goal-2030 for modernisation of the forces by the government, he said the plan will make them more skilled and dynamic. In the beginning of his speech, the president also recalled the architect

of country's independence Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and paid homage to the martyrs and valiant sons of the soil who had made supreme sacrifices for the country. He expressed his hope that all units of the forces will organise special

Maulana Muhammad Jamshed, an Indian preacher, is scheduled to conduct the munajat seeking divine blessings for all, said Tabligh Jamaat leaders.

Tabligh Jamaat has been organising the annual event on the bank of the Turag river in Tongi of Gazipur since 1967. The first phase of the ijtema was held
