Only half the targets met

Says draft of country performance report

Bangladesh could achieve only a little more than half of the targets set by the World Bank Group for 84 projects and programmes in the last four years, says a draft performance review report of the World Bank Group.

The government's prolonged processing requirements, delayed procurement and weak capacity are the major reasons behind the slow implementation of the projects, according to the report.

The multilateral lender has already

given Bangladesh \$10.06 billion under the Country Partnership Framework (CPF) for five years from fiscal 2015-16.

With the funding, it set some targets in sectors such as energy, transport, social protection, education, job creation, health, and climate and environment management.

Under the CPF, the lender will provide \$12.26 billion from fiscal 2015-16 to 2019-

HC orders law enforcers about Prothom Alo editor, 5 others; bail hearing today

The High Court yesterday ordered the law enforcers not to harass or arrest Prothom Alo Editor Matiur Rahman and five others until the hearing on the bail petition in a case filed over the death of Naimul Abrar Rahat, a student of Dhaka Residential Model College.

The HC bench of Justice Obaidul Hassan and Justice AKM Zahirul Huq passed the order after Matiur Rahman and five others appeared before the court seeking bail.

The court also fixed today for hearing the petition. The five others are: Anisul Hoque, deputy editor of Prothom Alo, Kabir Bakul, head of event and activation of Kishor Alo, Shuvashish Pramanik Shuvo and Shah Paran Tushar, assistants at event and activation of Kishor Alo, Mahitul Alam Pavel, senior assistant editor of Kishor Alo.

Rape, Violence against Women

Form commission within 30 days

HC directs govt; asks why no death penalty for rape of children under 16

The High Court yesterday directed the government to form a commission within 30 days under the law ministry to

stop rape and violence against women. The court also issued a rule asking the authorities to explain why rapists should not be awarded capital

punishment if the rape victim is under 16. Besides, it wanted to know in the rule why the government's inaction to drop life imprisonment provision alongside the capital punishment in case of death in rape

incident should not be declared illegal.

The HC bench of Justice FRM Nazmul Ahsan and Justice KM Kamrul Kader came up with order and rule after hearing a writ filed in the form of public interest litigation.

It ordered to form the commission, led by a law ministry additional secretary, comprising representatives from lawyers, judges, rights activists, renowned personalities, media persons, physicians, and victims if any victim agrees.

The HC also asked the commission to be formed to make recommendations within the next six months on how to stop rape incidents.

It also sought why directives would not be given to enact the law for protection of witnesses in rape cases, create database to save rapists DNA samples, ensure protection for victims through the one-stop crisis centre in every district, remain alert in publishing images of victims in media, form separate court for rape trial and resolve rape cases as early as possible.

Rabeya Bhuiyan stood for the writ petitioner and Deputy Attorney General ABM Abdullah Al Mahmud Bashar represented the state.

Rabeya filed the writ last week.
