US Senate acquits Trump of impeachment charges as reelection campaign looms

President Donald Trump was acquitted on Wednesday in his US Senate impeachment trial, saved by fellow Republicans who rallied to protect him nine months before he asks voters in a deeply divided America to give him a second White House term.

The businessman-turned-politician, 73, survived only the third presidential impeachment trial in US history - just like the two other impeached presidents - in his turbulent presidency's darkest chapter. Trump now plunges into an election

season that promises to further polarise the country.

Trump was acquitted largely along party lines on two articles of impeachment approved by the Democratic-led House of Representatives on December 18. The votes to convict Trump fell far short of the two-thirds majority required in the 100-seat Senate to remove him from office under the US Constitution.

The Senate voted 52-48 to acquit Trump of abuse of power stemming from his request that Ukraine investigate political rival Joe Biden, a contender for the Democratic nomination to face him in the November 3 election. Republican Senator Mitt Romney joined the Democrats in voting to convict. No Democrat voted to acquit.

The Senate then voted 53-47 to acquit him of obstruction of Congress by blocking witnesses and documents sought by the House. Romney joined the rest of the Republican senators in voting to acquit on the obstruction charge. No

#### No toll for ambulances from March 1

Road transport ministry issues circular

From March 1 this year, ambulances carrying patients will not have to pay toll on roads, ferries, and bridges under the Roads and Highways Department.

Road Transport and Bridges Ministry yesterday issued a circular in this regard, Nazrul Islam, secretary to the road transport and highway division (RTHD) told The Daily Star.

"This is one of the initiatives the ministry has taken to mark 'Mujib Borsho' [the birth centenary of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman]," he said.

The circular said tolls would be waived both for the government and private ambulances on the condition that the service providers would deduct the amount from the ambulance fare.

# Steps to be taken to prevent it

Education Minister Dipu Moni yesterday said steps would be taken to prevent distribution of wrong question papers in the exam halls.

"Answer scripts of the affected SSC examinees, who suffered difficulties after the distribution of wrong question papers at some examination centres, have been kept aside and they won't be affected," she said. The minister said the problem could

have been avoided if the authorities had taken steps to make separate sitting arrangements for regular and irregular candidates of Secondary School Certificate (SSC) exams.

"The problem is seen every year due to the question papers for regular and irregular students," she told a press briefing on "Skills, Readiness for Achieving SDGs and Adopting IR 4.0" at the Secretariat.

Talking about guide books, Dipu Moni

said there was no need for guide books under the creative question method.

Cops recover Tk 34 lakh from microbus

Police yesterday detained three more people who allegedly snatched Tk 66 lakh from officials of three companies in Barguna's Amtali upazila.

On Wednesday afternoon, muggers attacked officials of REW, SEW, and JT Traders near Tiakhali College and took the money. The companies provide manpower to the Payra power plant project in Patuakhali's Kalapara upazila.

The officials were going to the power plant in a microbus after withdrawing Tk 1 crore from a bank in Barishal city.

The sketching appeared to hint at an early version of the image that differed from the

#### Israeli Air Strikes 23 pro-regime fighters killed in Syria

Israeli air strikes near Damascus and in the south of Syria yesterday killed 23 Syrian and non-Syrian fighters aligned with President Bashar al-Assad's regime, a Britain-based war monitor said.

The new toll for the predawn strikes included three Iranians and seven Tehranbacked foreign fighters near Kisweh south of the capital, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

## Onion, garlic get dearer

Garlic prices soar by Tk 80 a kg, onion by up to Tk 20 in a week

Garlic, ginger and onion prices soared in the capital throughout last week as traders fear that China may not

resume business operations after its Lunar New Year break is over.

Bangladesh imports these spices from different countries, including China which is a major source of

garlic and ginger. But the country is struggling to cope with its coronavirus outbreak.

Retail prices of each kg of imported garlic rose by Tk 80, ginger by Tk 30 and onion by Tk 10-20 within a week at

kitchen markets and grocery stores in the capital's Karwan Bazar, Moghbazar and Farmgate.

At retail shops, Chinese garlic was sold for between Tk

At retail shops, Chinese garlic was sold for between Tk 200 and 220 a kg, depending on the quality. It was between Tk 120 and 140 about a week ago.

Wholesale price of garlic rose to around Tk 190, from

about Tk 120.

A kg of Chinese ginger sold for about Tk 150, up from about Tk 120. The prices of almost every variety of onion

have increased by Tk 10-20.

"This hike is too much," said Zobayer Ahmed, a private employee, who was shopping in Karwan Bazar yesterday.

"It is a big burden for us," he added.

Some sellers alleged that traders were taking advantage of the uncertainty that looms over export and import operations in China.

"We have nothing to do because we depend on the wholesalers and importers," said Ainul Haque, a retailer in Karwan Bazar.
