## Fire guts 200 shanties

At least 200 shanties were gutted as a massive fire tore through two slums in the capital's Banani T&T area early yesterday.

However, no casualty was reported. The fire broke out at the Godown Slum and Bede Slum around 3:30am, Rasel Shikder, a duty officer at the Fire Service and Civil Defense headquarters, told The

On information, 22 fire engines rushed to the spot and extinguished the blaze around 7:00am.

It is still unclear what caused the fire. The fire service officials, however, suspected that the fire originated from an

incident of gas leak or short circuit. A four-member committee led by fire service Deputy Director Nur Hossain has been formed to look into the incident and estimate the damage.

The fire incident took place at a time when most of the slum dwellers were in sleep. They were forced to run out of their rooms leaving their belongings.

Witnesses said the flames spread immediately throughout the slum.

Jahanara Begum, a slum dweller, said she woke up from sleep hearing screams and she came out immediately and without

She had a shop in the slum which has turned into ashes. "My four children are studying at schools. How would I bear the cost now?" lamented Jahanara.

Another slum dweller Musa Hossain said he had Tk 4 lakh in cash, two shops

"Everything's gone. I could not save anything," Musa said, as tear rolled down

The slum dwellers had no way but to live

Some complained about the lacks in rescue operation of the fire service. They said the fire service could not spray water properly at the right time.

However, the fire service officials said the rescue operation was delayed due to water

### Ducsu opposes unified entry exams

Members of Dhaka University Central Students Union (Ducsu) yesterday opposed unified admission tests at all public universities, saying that it would hamper "distinctiveness and tradition" of DU entry test.

The proposal to oppose the decision -- taken by University Grants Commission more than two weeks ago was placed by Ducsu Assistant General Secretary Md Saddam Hussain and passed unanimously at its fourth executive meeting, said Ducsu General Secretary Golam

Talking about another issue, the Ducsu members complained to the vice-chancellor that proctor Prof Golam Rabbani is not student friendly and does not treat students

Ducsu General Secretary Golam Rabbani told The Daily Star that the vice chancellor assured them of taking the allegation into account.

The VC said he would suggest the proctor to become more student friendly, he added. At the Dhaka University Central Students Union

meeting, its members and leaders proposed for introducing more bus routes for DU students, banning plastic products on the campus and allotting seats from first year.

They also demanded formulating a policy for development fees, making full-fledged lists of students with disabilities and establishing footnotes at the bases of all sculptures on the campus.

## Street movement cannot free Khaleda: info minister

Information Minister Dr Hasan Mahmud yesterday reiterated that there is no way of freeing BNP chief Khaleda Zia through movements or street campaigns. The only way to get her released from jail would be the legal way, he added.

"BNP is showing disrespect to the law and the court by repeatedly raising the demand to the government for releasing Begum Zia," he said, addressing a meeting at an auditorium of Jatiya Press Club.

Bangabandhu Sangskritik Jote (BSJ) organised the event, marking the birth centenary of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and "Mujib Borsho", with BSJ president Sarah Begum Kobori in the chair. Awami League Office Secretary and

Prime Minister's Special Assistance Barrister Biplob Barua addressed the discussion as key speaker while BSJ general secretary Arun Sarker Rana conducted it. The minister said BNP yesterday called

for rallies demanding Khaleda's release. "The BNP chief is in prison being convicted in a graft case and only the court can release her. The government has no jurisdiction to release her," he added.

"BNP's rally goes against the court. I think the court will take proper steps..., said Hasan, also Awami League joint general secretary Referring to the trials of Pakistani leader

Nawaz Sharif and Indian leader Jayalalitha, Hasan said their parties did not wage any movement against the court decisions. The minister said they [BNP] always

created anarchy in the name of movement and assaulted people and vandalised vehicles. Many untoward incidents took place when they held rallies for the release of Khaleda, he added. About BNP leaders' allegations on the

recent city corporation elections, he said the polls were held in a transparent manner. Regarding BNP's complaints on using

Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs), Hasan said EVM is a modern technology, which was used in the general election in India and no complaints were raised about it there. Even, EVM was used in the US, he

"I cannot understand why BNP opposes the use of this modern technology in elections. BNP always opposes modern

## Be more transparent in sharing info: speakers

Seminar held on a decade of the RTI Act

Senior government officials at a discussion yesterday urged all public servants to be transparent when it comes to sharing information with people. This, the speakers said, will help to ensure an open flow of information.

If information is shared this way, it not only ensures transparency and accountability of the government's activities, but also helps accelerate the ongoing development of the country, the officials said.

On the occasion of a decade of the Right to Information (RTI) Act, enacted in 2009, the Cabinet Division and Information Commission jointly organised the discussion at Officers Club in the capital.

Speaking as the chief guest, Cabinet

Secretary Khandker Anwarul Islam said open flow of information is essential to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) within 2030 and the government's plan to turn the country into a developed nation according to Vision

"We will have to change our traditional mindset and be more open to share information if we want to achieve these targets," the cabinet secretary said, addressing government employees.

Information Commissioner Martuza Ahmed said the formulation and implementation of RTI in 2009 was a groundbreaking event in the country's history as it helped to ensure people's access to information widely.
