Families cry for justice

Official figures show sharp rise in casualties

Carrying a small bag, Ahsan Ullah Tutul yesterday attended a press conference organised to seek justice for his son and numerous others killed in road accidents.

At the end of the programme, he opened the bag and took out more than a dozen certificates -- all belonged to his son Adnan Tasin.

One was for Tasin's outstanding results in SSC exams while another for securing the second spot in mathematical Olympiad. He also got one for 100 percent school

"There are some 100 such certificates and medals at our home. My son earned all of them, but he's gone. What will I do with these now?" Tutul asked, his voice cracking.

Tasin, a student of the capital's St Joseph Higher Secondary School, died when he was only 17. A speeding bus hit him on Airport Road in the capital's Sheora area on February 11 last year while he was going to the other side of the street using a zebra crossing.

Despite being ill, Tutul, a former merchandiser in his mid-40s, did all he could do in the last one year to ensure justice for his son. He wrote to the prime minister and over a dozen ministers. He talked to police and Dhaka North City Corporation mayor on several occasions.

"I didn't even get sympathy, let alone justice," he said. Like Tutul, family members of four other road crash victims shared similar experiences at the press conference, organised by Sarake Santan-Swajanhara Avhibhabak Forum, in association with Nirapad Sarak Andolan, at the city's Crime Reporters Association of Bangladesh.

They did not get justice for their loved ones killed. Neither did they get any compensation from the authorities concerned, they said

Triumphant homecoming of U-19 today

At around 4:55 pm today, the nation will for the first time have the opportunity to welcome home world champions. The Bangladesh Under-19 team will touch down with the ICC Under-19 World Cup trophy three days after beating their Indian counterparts in the final in Potchefstroom, South Africa on Sunday.

While the BCB have planned a low-key reception, the response from the general public is expected to be anything but if the outpouring of joy after the threewicket win in the final was any indication. Bangladesh's previous seminal, perception changing win took place 23 years ago when the national team won the ICC Trophy and qualified for their first World

Coronavirus 'grave | Treacherous journey ends in tragedy

15 Rohingyas drown, 50 still missing in Bay as trawler carrying over 135 to Malaysia sinks near St Martin's

At least 15 Rohingyas were killed as a trawler sank in the Bay of Bengal near St Martin's Island in Teknaf upazila early yesterday. They were trying to go to Malaysia illegally.

The victims -- 11 women and four children -- were residents of different Rohingya camps in Teknaf and Ukhia upazilas.

Apart from the victims, 72 people, including four boatmen, were rescued, while 50 others are feared missing.

The trawler capsized around 5:45am

near Zinjira point, some 8km northwest of the St Martin's Island, after running aground, said coast guard officials.

Some fishermen, who were catching fish in the Bay, saw the incident and informed the coast guard of the matter, said Naimul-Haque, commander of coast guard's St Martin's Island station

Coast guard members went to the spot around 7:30am and started a rescue operation in association with the navy, he

Talking to journalists, a navy official said there were 138 people, including 136 Rohingyas, in the trawler. They were going to Malaysia illegally after human traffickers lured them into taking the risky journey.

DU teachers uninterested in uniform entrance test

Most Dhaka University teachers and Ducsu leaders oppose the University Grants Commission's move to hold uniform admission test for all public universities.

They said a uniform test would compromise the "quality of students" getting into the university and the almost hundredvear-old institution would lose its uniqueness.

DU authorities were vet to decide on the matter, said DU Pro Vice-Chancellor Prof Muhammad Samad, adding that they would accept the decision of the academic council, one of the highest bodies that deal with such matters.

During a meeting with public university vicechancellors, the UGC on January 23 decided that uniform admission tests would be held for the 2020-2021 academic year. In a late January meeting
