Mosquito Control

DNCC launches crash programme

Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) authorities yesterday launched a two-week crash programme for mosquito control, amid a rise in mosquito population in the capital partly due to subdued activities of city corporations because of the recently-concluded city polls.

"All 54 wards of DNCC will come under the crash programme," said panel mayor of DNCC Jamal Mostafa, while inaugurating the programme at Police Staff College in Mirpur-13.

"We hope city dwellers will get its benefit," he said, adding that the programme will continue till February 28.

Jamal said they will use fogger machines, wheel-barrow machines and vehicle-mounted foggers to kill mosquitoes.

Jamal said 10 workers -- who will be outsourced -- will join regular workers in every ward. Five of them will help spray adulticide and larvicide through fogger machines and hand spray, while five others will identify hotspots of Aedes and culex mosquitoes, he said.

The waste management division will also remain active, Jamal said.

The move comes at a time when residents of different parts of the city have been suffering from mosquito menace over the last one month, as no significant efforts were seen on the city corporations' part in recent weeks.

Surveillance of Rohingya not weak: home minister

Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan yesterday expressed hope that Myanmar will take back their nationals as discussion is still underway regarding Rohingya repatriation.

He came up with the statement in reply to a journalist's query after attending the 25th anniversary of Bangladesh Coast Guard (BCG) at its headquarters in the capital's Agargaon.

In replay to another query on surveillance of Rohingyas, the minister said, "The surveillance is not weak at all. You know there are 1,100,000 Rohingyas [living in Cox's Bazar], which is three times the population of Teknaf."

"They have been placed under the supervision of our law enforcement agencies including police, Rapid Action Battalion, Border Guard Bangladesh and Ansar," he said.

In addition, watchtowers and CCTV cameras are also being installed to further strengthen surveillance of the Rohingya camps, said Asaduzzaman.

The activities of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in the international arena after the liberation of Bangladesh show he was a friend of whole world,

"He fought not for just one nation but for all of humankind. In his death, his life shines more brightly than ever," said Haider A Khan, professor of Economics of University of Denver, while delivering a lecture at Bangladesh Economic Association (BEA) yesterday.

BEA organised the public lecture titled "From Bangabandhu to Viswabandhu: Towards Global Liberation Through Public Reasoning" at National Planning and Development Academy.

Highlighting Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's political acumen and stance for repressed people, Haider said, "It is up to us and the succeeding generations to apply the principles that he left behind flexibly, wisely and cooperatively to avert the third global crisis and move towards a brighter future for generations to come."

major breeding source of mosquito, he said. Fatima Urmee, a resident of Mirpur-12, said they have been suffering from mosquito menace since the beginning of winter.

"It is really tough to sit in a room without using any mosquito repellent or net," she said.

Meanwhile, an official of Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) said they are continuing their adulticide and larvicide-spraying work to control mosquito population.

Ensuring justice a precondition for Rohingya repatriation

Says Ambassador Rabab Fatima Bss, Dhaka

Ensuring justice and accountability for the Rohingya population is an important precondition for their safe, dignified and voluntary return to Rakhine state in Myanmar, said Ambassador Rabab Fatima, permanent representative of Bangladesh to the UN.

She said this on Thursday while addressing the Security Council Open debate on "Peace building and sustaining peace: transitional justice in conflict and post-conflict situation", said a press release.

Highlighting the importance of internationally recognised criminal justice mechanisms in ensuring justice for countries coming out of conflict, she welcomed the "groundbreaking decision" of the International Criminal Court about ensuring accountability of the rights violations and crimes by Myanmar against its Rohingya population. momentous development in this regard. In reiterating Bangladesh's commitment to the Security

Council's Women Peace and Security, and Youth, Peace and Security agenda, the envoy said, "We remain committed to supporting multi-pronged efforts of the UN to prevent and ensure accountability for violence against women and children during armed conflicts."

Four die in Gazipur alone

Six people were killed and 13 injured in road accidents in two districts yesterday, according to reports from our

In Gazipur, an unidentified youth was killed as a bus hit him while he was crossing Dhaka-Mymensingh road at Gilaberaid in Sreepur, said police.

In another incident, a man, whose identity could not be known, died instantly as a pickup ran him over on a road in Joinabazar area, said Monjurul Haque, officer-in-charge of Mawna Highway Police Station.

In Rajendrapur, the supervisor and conductor of a bus were killed and 10 passengers injured when the vehicle hit a covered van from behind, said OC Alamgir Hossain Buiyan of Gazipur Sadar Police Station.

The identities of the deceased could not be known immediately.

In another incident in Gazipur, an SUV carrying Mymensigh Divisional Commissioner Mostafizur Rahman hit a road divider at Rajendrapur Chourasta, injuring him and two of its passengers, said Joydevpur Police Station OC Jabedul Islam.

The accident occurred as the vehicle tried to avoid collision with an oncoming speeding car, said the OC.

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab-7) in a drive yesterday seized a tanker truck carrying 9,000 litres of stolen furnace oil and arrested two persons from port city's Panchliash area.

The arrestees are Md Rizwanul Haque (35) and Md Rahman (34), said Rab

According to Rab, the two are part of a smuggling gang. They used to smuggle oil from abroad through ships and unload those at the outer anchorage to evade tax.

"Tipped off, we arrested the duo from the entry point of a flyover in Shulokbahar area around 2pm," Assistant Superintendent of Police Tarek Aziz, also operation officer of Rab-7 (Chandgaon camp), told The Daily Star.

"They were planning to take the oil to Sitakunda after unloading in Bridge Ghata area of Karnaphuli upazila," said ASP Aziz.

The Rab official said, "Every month, the syndicate used to smuggle two consignments through deep sea."

"We are not sure whether the consignment was smuggled from a mother vessel or government vessel. We'll know the details after interrogating them," he

Maj Shamim Sarkar, deputy director of Rab-7, said they have gleaned names of some syndicate members from the duo and actions will be taken against them.

ASP Aziz said a case was filed with Panchlaish Police Station in this connection.

Tackling the nuisance | Dog culling in St Martin's of hydraulic horns

Savar youths run awareness campaign

As hundreds of vehicles pass through Savar every day, the busy, bustling area on the outskirts of the capital sees severe sound pollution, further aggravated by hydraulic horns used in local battery-run three wheelers.

On Friday, a group of university and college students -- part of an organisation called Chobighor -- conducted a campaign on the town's central thoroughfare to raise awareness about the nuisance.

Around noon, the group organised a rally at Savar Bazar road, and seized some 100 hydraulic horns from auto-rickshaws. Keeping with the theme of Valentine's Day on Friday, the youths gifted a rose to each autorickshaw driver, and educated them on why they should not be using such

According to news reports, the sound of hydraulic horns measure at 95 decibel, higher than the permitted level (75dB) for vehicle horns.

Prince Ghosh, founder and president of Chobighor, said, "We want to see a hazard-free Savar. Hydraulic horns on auto-rickshaws are causing severe sound pollution here, so we decided to raise awareness among drivers.'

"The drivers have responded positively to our campaign and we hope that they will accept our request to stop using such loud horns," he added. "We also submitted an application to Savar municipality's mayor, seeking a ban on hydraulic horns in this municipality, which he accepted," said Prince.

Meanwhile, locals welcomed the initiative. Kamrun Nahar, a sixthgrader, said, "The loud noise of these horns is very disturbing, especially during studies. I'm glad this issue is being addressed."

Rabul Mia, who used a hydraulic horn in his auto-rickshaw, said, "I was not aware of the harm this was causing, and I will use a different horn

Mayor of Savar municipality Hazi Abdul Goni appreciated Chobighor's initiative and thanked them for this timely initiative.

"I have decided to declare a ban on hydraulic horns following their request. We will work together to reduce sound pollution," he added.

Last week, a group of people were seen scouting the beaches of Saint Martin's island with a large net in hand. They were capturing dogs, and strangling them to death one by one, using a metal contraption.

The canines squirming and screaming to escape this death trap had become a common scene during winters in the island, and this has allegedly been happening under the supervision of Saint Martin's Union Parishad.

This month, they culled around a hundred dogs, and stopped only after a tourist challenged them on the legal grounds of this cruel act on February 13.

Samee Kader, a lawyer who was on holiday at the island, witnessed the culling. He told The Daily Star that a group of people were capturing dogs and killing them mercilessly.

He saw four spots on the beach where dead bodies of at least 30 dogs were piled

"When I challenged them and asked who ordered the culling, they were faltering to answer. At one point they said they were forest department staff, and fled when I asked them to produce identification documents," said Samee.

Riazul Haque, member of the island's Union Parishad, denied giving any order for dog culling, and claimed not to have any knowledge of it.

The Daily Star could not reach Shah Jahan Mia -- chairman of the union parishad -- for comments, as he is currently in prison.

Seeking anonymity, a former member of Saint Martin's Union Parishad told The Daily Star that every winter, the parishad has been hiring a group of people to cull dogs, as they find it to be the "easiest option" to keep the dog population of the island under control.

First-ever cath lab opens at MMCH

Cardiac patients in Mymensingh have much to cheer about as a cardiac catheterisation laboratory (cath lab), was inaugurated at Mymensingh Medical College Hospital (MMCH) yesterday.

Patients admitted at the 1,000-bed hospital with heart diseases will be able to avail better treatment from this lab, said hospital sources. Cath lab is an examination room in a hospital or clinic with diagnostic

imaging equipment used to visualise arteries and chambers of the heart and treat any stenosis or abnormality found. MMCH is often burdened with patients three times its capacity. Of

those, some 200 are currently admitted at the cardiology department But they could not be served fully when they needed stenting. "Now

patients will get this facility at the hospital," said Dr Ganapati Aditya, an associate professor of cardiology (head of unit-2), at MMCH. A stent is a tiny tube that doctors can insert into a blocked p

to keep it open. Stents restore flow of blood or other fluids, depending on where it's placed. Dr Aditya said previously, many had to travel to Dhaka to get the services.

"Disadvantaged patients will be benefitted most from this lab," said Dr Laxmi Narayan Majumder, deputy director of MMCH.

A patient will have to pay around Tk 6,000 for angiogram and related tests at the hospital, which is around Tk 25,000 in private hospitals.

Thousands from greater Mymensingh region (Mymensingh, Jamalpur, Sherpur, Netrakona, Kishoreganj and Tangail), Sylhet, Sunamganj, Gazipur, Gaibandha, Kurigram and Gazipur districts come to the hospital

Why are people with addiction being tortured at rehabs?

They need holistic support, not beatings

E are deeply concerned at the death of a patient at a drug rehabilitation centre in Savar. His family alleges that he was tortured to death at the rehab, hours after the 30-year-old was admitted there. The police too suspect he was tortured, based on injury marks on different parts of his body, including face, head and neck. It goes without saying that the owner and employees of the rehab centre must be brought to book—the police cannot be complacent about finding and arresting the owner of the rehab, who, apparently, is on the run.

But beyond the arrest of the person(s) responsible for the untimely death of a man in his prime, we must decry the inhumane treatment of drug addicts at facilities that are supposed to support them and cure them of their dependency on drugs—not beat them out of it! Just last year, a 37-year-old recovering addict's body was discovered in an ambulance in the parking lot of a drug rehabilitation centre in Moulvibazaar. His body, too, showed signs of torture. In 2016, a 27-year-old died of pneumonia after being made to sit in an icebox filled with ice for up to five hours a day—a treatment prescribed by the doctors of his drug rehabilitation centre in Pabna. What sort of rehabilitation programmes are we designing that require torture techniques for people in need of holistic and sensitive treatment of the body as well as the mind?

Unfortunately, when it comes to the issue of drug addiction, most of our interventions are focused on stopping the supply of drugs, rather than in understanding why people become addicted and how to guide them towards a healthy and meaningful life. Meanwhile, according to a Harm International's report titled "The Global State of Harm Reduction 2018," Bangladesh lacks basic facilities, including medications that can save the lives of people overdosing on drugs. The majority of rehabilitation centres—an unknown number of which operate without licenses—are in terrible conditions, overrun with cockroaches, expired food and drugs, and untrained staff.

In our country, people with addiction are treated no better than jail convicts—and our facilities reflect this mindset. We must change this mentality first and foremost. Only then can we design rehabilitation centres that focus on understanding the root causes of addiction, provide sensitive support to addicts and help them recover.

7 HILE we commend the government as well as many non-government organisations for their efforts towards ensuring the rights of people with disabilities, we must also admit that they still have to face many impediments in their day-to-day life. Accessibility still remains a major issue while education and employment opportunities are not ensured for the vast majority of them. at all aware about the rights of persons with disabilities. Raising awareness about the issue as well as their specific needs is absolutely necessary to integrate them into mainstream society. Thus, it was very encouraging to see The Centre for the Rehabilitation of the Paralysed (CRP) organise an event called the Annual Sponsored Walk in the capital recently to raise awareness about disability rights and raise funds for treatment and rehabilitation of the underprivileged patients.

Bangladesh has the necessary policy frameworks to protect the rights of around 16 lakh people with disabilities. The country has ratified the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) in 2007 and has also formulated Persons with Disabilities Rights and Protection Act 2013 and Neurodevelopmental Disability Protection Trust Act 2013, which are aimed at eliminating the discriminations persons with disabilities face. However, in terms of implementing these laws, we are still lagging behind.

We could not yet properly address the accessibility issue they face every day in their educational institutions, workplaces, and public transports. According to the Persons with Disabilities Rights and Protection Act, 2013, all public establishments must be accessible to people with disabilities. Moreover, it has been stated in the Building Construction Act 1952 and National Building Code 2008 that every establishment should be designed in a way that it is accessible to a disabled person (a disabled person should enter and exit a building and use the toilet there without any difficulty). But reportedly, 90 percent public buildings in Dhaka and Chittagong are not accessible. What is more, bringing students with disabilities into mainstream education and creating employment opportunities for them still remain a major challenge for the government.

Therefore, what we need now is proper implementation of the policies, which definitely calls for an increase in our budgetary allocation for the disabled.

The coronavirus conundrum for Bangladesh apparel industry



HE coronavirus, which has already killed hundreds of people in China and is now making its way across the globe, will inevitably cause significant disruption to

apparel supply chains during 2020. The question is, to what extent, for how long, and how will Bangladesh be impacted?

Already, we are seeing that the virus is impacting China's polyester and textile supply chains. With Central China at a virtual standstill, and the transport system not operating, it is claimed by some that passing through the Yangtze river—stretching from one end of China to the other—has become impossible. With land transport limited, if the virus spreads further, more parts of China could see a similar lockdown, creating a logistical nightmare and huge disruption to the textile industry.

Leading global apparel brands are already taking a significant hit due to store closures in China as a result of the coronavirus outbreak. H&M has announced that around 45 store closures hurt sales in January while other brands have also noted major disruption in their Chinese operations. Gap, Uniqlo, Hugo Boss, Ralph Lauren, Nike, Levi Strauss and Adidas have all gone public with the announcement of store closures in central China as the impact of the virus continues to leave large parts of the country on lockdown.

I point all of this out because there are major implications for Bangladesh here. It is a story our whole industry will be watching closely.

I know from conversations I have had that the coronavirus has already caused business disruption to garment suppliers in Bangladesh. The reason for this is that, for raw materials such as fabrics and yarns as well as other inputs such as trims, labels etc., we are still heavily dependent on China. In fact, more than 50 percent of Bangladesh's textile and textile-related goods, including garment accessories, are imported from China. In addition, about 40 percent of capital machinery and spare parts for the textile and garment industry come from the country.

For all the strides made by our RMG sector in recent years, this lack of vertical integration—the fact that we only carry out one part of the supply chain process—remains a major source of vulnerability. It is an Achilles Heel for our

industry.

The coronavirus, then, can be viewed as a wake-up call for the Bangladeshi RMG industry and also for the apparel industry globally. This heavy dependence on China is unhealthy in many ways as the disruption to supply chains by an epidemic such as the coronavirus can be devastating; there is a real risk that some businesses may never recover from the problems this causes.

To fulfil orders, many Bangladeshi factories now face having to look beyond China for raw materials and

disruptions.

The lessons here are simple and obvious. Our RMG industry in the long-term needs to become more self-sufficient and less dependent on imports. There is no reason why much of what we import from China should not be produced within Bangladesh, creating extra jobs and adding to gross domestic product in the process. But we can only do this if we develop our industry upwards as well as sideways

Developing our own supply chains for raw materials and fabrics is a must

But other products have to now follow. We also need proper research to find data on the gap between demand and supply of every raw material. For example, how much cotton fabrics do we need for the annual production of cotton-based apparel? How much man-made fibre or yarn do we need? How much accessories such as metal button or zipper do we import every year and how much are we producing locally?

We need better industry infrastructure, and more investment into supply chains, in order to become more self-

other product intermediaries. This will not be a straightforward task and, with supply of such materials being squeezed globally, prices will likely be higher in what is a seller's market. This could potentially increase the cost of apparel being produced by Bangladesh (although whether brands will accept this increase is another question).

For now, our industry will have to deal with the challenge at hand, but we must learn from it and never again leave ourselves exposed to supply chain

for Bangladesh, even if this means incentivising foreign investors to partner in the building of the required infrastructure. I believe a number of fabric mill investors are already eyeing Bangladesh so we need to give them the push they need to choose us and not a competitor.

The thing is, we can do vertical integration. To offer one example, the vertical manufacture for T-shirts has added a lot of value to the Bangladesh proposition already.

sufficient and better placed to take on large and complex orders. The whole apparel industry has been caught out by the coronavirus, but we cannot say we were not warned and we must all now recognise that we have become dangerously dependent on China. Such a scenario can never be allowed to happen again.

Toward a New Iran Nuclear Deal

HEN Iran announced in January that it would further "reduce" its commitments under the 2015 deal limiting its nuclear activities, it was not responding

to the United States' assassination of Iranian Quds Force leader General Qassem Suleimani a few days earlier. But both developments reflected the escalating confrontation between Iran and the US since the summer of 2019. Any effort to safeguard the substance of the 2015 deal (formally known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, or JCPOA) must take this context into consideration.

The Iranian regime declared that with this "fifth and final" phase of scaling back its commitments under the JCPOA, it would no longer feel bound by the deal's agreed upper limits on centrifuges and uranium enrichment. At the same time, Iran said that this move, as well as its previous phased commitment reductions, is reversible, and that the authorities would not restrict inspections of the country's nuclear installations by the International Atomic Energy Agency.

But European governments say that Iran's latest step constitutes a grave violation of the deal. Having warned Iran after its previous round of commitment reductions in November 2019, the "E3"—Germany, France, and the United Kingdom—have now triggered the JCPOA's dispute-resolution mechanism (DRM), which is designed to deal with possible breaches of the agreement.

Under the DRM, the agreement's remaining signatories following the withdrawal of the US in 2018—the E3, Russia, China, and Iran—have at least 30 days to resolve the dispute among themselves. If they fail to agree on either a substantive solution or an extension of this deadline, then any of the signatories may bring the dispute to the United Nations Security Council. That body would then have a month to vote on a resolution to extend the suspension of international sanctions against Iran that took effect when the JCPOA entered into force in 2016. Without such a resolution,

the old sanctions would automatically "snap back" into place. And, because US President Donald Trump's administration would certainly use its veto to block such a resolution, bringing a dispute to the Security Council would be a death sentence for the JCPOA.

This doesn't have to happen, if the E3, Russia, China, Iran, and the European Union (which acts as a notary of sorts to the agreement) use the DRM for its intended purpose. None of them wants to lay the JCPOA to rest. But it is unclear whether the deal can be rescued

an opportunity for constructive talks on such a framework. The strategic escalation since last summer, in particular Iran's attacks in September on Saudi Arabian oil facilities and Suleimani's assassination in January, has shown how close the region may be to a (probably uncontrollable) military confrontation. As a result, Gulf states that earlier had encouraged Trump to take a hardline stance against Iran have called explicitly for de-escalation. In addition, various parties that had not been on speaking terms began to talk, or at least prepared to do so: the United Arab Emirates to Iran, the Saudis

before November's US presidential election; and it almost certainly would not survive a second Trump term. This realisation underpins the slowly emerging consensus, not only among the agreement's European signatories, that a post-JCPOA arrangement needs to be considered. Although UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson has called for a "Trump deal" with Iran, the E3 leaders have jointly spoken of the need to define a "long-term framework for Iran's nuclear programme."

Counter-intuitive as it may seem, current regional dynamics could provide

At the time of last August's G7 summit in Biarritz, even Trump and the Iranian regime seemed prepared for some form of diplomatic engagement. Although hardliners in Tehran and Washington prevented further progress, the so-called Swiss track subsequently led to a prisoner exchange between Iran and the US, demonstrating that, with help from friends or partners, basic bilateral understandings are possible. Trump even thanked Iran "on a very fair negotiation," and called it a "precursor to what can be done."

European governments should continue trying to facilitate serious, direct talks between the US and Iran. At the same time, they should use the DRM both to discuss immediate de-escalation measures and to explore the contours of a follow-up agreement to the JCPOA—or an alternative should the current deal collapse.

Such discussions should address how to realise the French proposal, originally endorsed by Trump, of a European credit line to help ease Iran's economic distress, as well as how to overcome current US resistance to the idea. Iran could support such a move by reinstating some of its recently "reduced" commitments.

More far-reaching talks could focus on timelines and provisions for future voluntary limitations on Iran's nuclear activities once the JCPOA's "sunset clauses" expire. Eventually, the US would have to be part of any new agreement, and Iran would need guarantees that a future US administration would not revoke it. Securing congressional approval-which the Obama administration did not seek for the JCPOA—would strengthen such an agreement. This would require addressing major concerns of US legislators, such as the longevity of Iran's commitments, which Iranian officials have indicated they are open to discussing if certain other conditions, notably an "economic ceasefire," were met.

That said, any future deal with Iran should still be an arms-control agreement that is not overburdened with other contentious matters. Issues regarding sovereignty, security, and safety, such as the use and arming of militant proxies, missile proliferation, or the safety of waterways, would be best addressed in a regional context.

Given the recent interest of most regional actors in de-escalating tensions, now may be the right time to go beyond bilateral talks and initiate a regional Conference on Confidence-Building, Security, and Cooperation. Such a process would complement renewed and probably lengthy nuclear negotiations between Iran and the major international powers.

What really happened in Bhashantek?

Rethinking resettlement of the urban poor

ETWEEN 1998 and 2010, the B government of Bangladesh facilitated the construction of an affordable housing complex budgeted at Tk 341.65 crores for urban slum dwellers. However, today slum dwellers occupy only a minute fraction of the apartments allocated for them. What led to the failure of the government's wellintended plan to house some of Dhaka's working-poor citizens? On a related note, are high-rise apartments the solution to our city's growing informal settlements? The project in question, Bhasantek Rehabilitation Project (BRP), proves that producing housing through public-private partnership is not impossible in Dhaka. At the same time, the long-running imbroglio of BRP shows how well-intentioned policy responses end up excluding and punishing the most vulnerable in the

officials. In its present incomplete state, BRP consists of 18 buildings out of which six are allocated for informal settlement dwellers. The type-A flats in these buildings are 215 square feet with one room, a kitchen and a toilet.

After a five-year pause from the project's first announcement, the Ministry of Land signed a contract with a private developer, North South Property Development Limited (NSPDL) in September 2003. Earlier that year, before the construction began, the Ministry of Land attempted to evict Bhasantek dwellers. Under the direct involvement of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, the Ministry of Land halted the eviction.

Laid out over 49.7 acres of land that the National Housing Authority acquired, BRP was set to be completed at the end of 2009. But BRP construction and implementation under NSDPL was riddled with so many violations that a formal private-public resettlement

lower-paid government employees, professionals in private sectors, and small businessmen. An article in an English daily reported that NSDPL made an additional Tk 300 million in profit from selling flats in BRP. During this time when frustrated Bhasantek dwellers organised and went to occupy the BRP compounds, the police pushed them back. With far too many of Bhashantek's informal settlement dwellers waiting for the promise of housing to materialise and government resources having flowed into private hands, the Ministry of Land finally cancelled their agreement with NSDPL in October 2010. Whether NSDPL faced any fines or consequences remain unknown. Despite this longdrawn fiasco, there is no national council working to monitor and ensure slum dweller's housing rights to this day.

When BRP started in 2003, the Bhashantek settlement sheltered 3,260 households according to the

apartments. The rule is there to make sure that the allotments only go to those with long residence. However, the age bar fails to account for people born or raised in the area who may have lost their senior family members. Mohammad Nazrul Islam, a now 40-year-old rickshaw puller, grew up in Bhasantek but could not apply for the flats in 2012.

During the application process, government officials have been rigid and insensitive to the needs of slum-dwelling applicants. Officials exaggerated minor flaws to procedurally exclude slum dwellers from BRP. For instance, 70-year-old Felu Mia, who's been living in Bhasantek for about 40 years, applied for the flats in 2012 but was denied on grounds that he had forgotten to sign the application. "If they just asked me to sign the papers, I could have signed them," he pointed out. While filled out forms were rejected due to minor omissions, there are reports that people from outside Dhaka were able to buy flats in BRP through fake residence

Several slum dwellers claim they missed their chance to apply for the flats in 2012 due to lack of funds, but they can afford to make the down payments now if given the opportunity. It should be noted that the government had opened up the application process once more in 2015 but this was soon stopped without explanation.

Most importantly, the 215 square feet flats are unworkable for joint families of 5-7 members. Mohammad Saiful Islam, who lives with his wife in one of the flats, said that both his sons and their families still live in the slum. BRP is also unsuitable for economic activities through which dwellers survive. Saiful Islam used to sell vegetables but now such activities have been disallowed in the BRP compound. Having lost his source of earning, Islam is unable to pay for utilities and service charges for the flat. His gas bill has been doubled even though his household does not receive gas regularly. Ain O Salish Kendra reported that many slum dwellers who received the flats ultimately rented them

management, and an equitable process. Apartments left entirely to the management of dwellers do not usually work in the long run.

Third, Dhaka persists in its growth as a megacity. The United Nations projections suggest that Dhaka's population will be over 27 million in 2030. At present, the private market provides housing for the middle to upper income residents, while over a million urban dwellers (in conservative estimates) are compelled to live in informal settlements that they build and maintain without any direct support from the government and under constant threat of tenure insecurity. Let's just return to the case of Bhasantek. Over the years, the informal settlement dwellers of Bhasantek have grown. According to the 2014 Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics survey of slum population, Bhasantek settlement's households increased to 5,482 (compared to 3,260 households in 2003). How many apartment complexes will the government build to house Dhaka's growing informal settlement dwellers?

Dealing with the predicament of informal settlement dwellers is nothing new around the globe. UN-Habitat has put forward ample evidence to support in-situ slum upgrading as the most viable and equitable solution for the world's urban poor. After all, it is informal settlements that are affordable, walkable, and flexible neighbourhoods for the urban poor. It is in these informal settlements that the city authorities and the poor residents can incrementally build drainage, sanitation, roads, houses, schools, clinics, gardens, shops, etc., at a pace that's technically and financially feasible for them. In such cases, the city is not burdened with having to provide urban services everywhere all at once, and hardworking people get to decide what's to be upgraded based on their local needs.

It is crucial that Dhaka's urban policymakers and housing advocates recognise the informal housing sector as the single largest supplier of inclusionary housing in the city and

absence of community participation, independent monitoring, and a deeper understanding of urban informality. As slum dwellers continue to be evicted without resettlement throughout Dhaka whether by unannounced demolitions or unexplained fires, the failure of BRP provides valuable lessons for seriously considering equitable and inclusive pathways for resolving the city's housing predicaments. Through the 1990s Dhaka's market

housing supply lagged behind the housing needs of Dhaka's growing population, particularly poor urban migrants. To continue living in the shadows of governmental and market neglect, the urban poor built their own housing in informal settlements more commonly stigmatised as "slums" or "bostis". Although slum and informal settlements are conflated in everyday parlance, they are actually different. Slum refers to poor housing condition and often illegal status, whereas informal settlements are seen as a mode of urbanisation based on poor people's skills, resources, and knowledge. From the latter perspective, Dhaka's poor have participated in creating the capital city through their dwelling and livelihood practices. Not recognising the collective capacity of poor urban dwellers, the government has put effort into solving poor people's housing problem through resettlement in the past decades. For instance, the government had successfully undertaken the Baunia Badh Bosti resettlement between 1990-1996 for 2,600 families. In comparison the BRP was unprecedented in its sheer scale. BRP promised to provide housing to nearly 100,000 urban poor in its over 15,000 apartment units. BRP was designed for informal settlement ("slum") dwellers and low-income people from across the city, where low-income referred to third and fourth category low-earning government

project had been transformed into a large-scale informal operation of profit-making on public land received at no cost. A 2010 parliamentary investigation found that NSDPL sold the apartments at prices higher than agreed in contracts and without consulting with the Ministry of Land. Among other irregularities, NSDPL charged extra for utilities and sold the application forms and accepted applicants' down payment in their own office as opposed to in the bank. Perhaps most importantly, NSDPI had completed only 20 percent of the entire project by the end of 2009. Two separate research studies also found that NSDPL sold the apartments at much higher prices and with a shorter instalment time to quickly make profit. Researchers claimed that the majority of these buyers were government employees and politically influential individuals related to the Ministry of Land, employees of utilities services, police officials and staff of BRP, who in turn rented out the apartments to

National Housing Authority. A national organisation, the Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST), filed a writ on behalf of three of the residents here for resettlement of these households, which is now up for hearing. In the absence of any enforceable housing rights framework for the urban poor, this public interest litigation (PIL) is critical as the judgement could set precedent for similar scenarios in the

When the 864 type-A flats went up for allocation in 2012, the government claimed that they allotted those flats to 849 informal settlement dwellers. However, Ain O Salish Kendro's 2019-20 investigation revealed that only 218 informal settlement dwellers received apartments in 2012. Aside from excluding deserving households nearest to the project, the 2012 allocation was beset with problems of unaffordability, procedural exclusion, and spatial inadequacy.

Initially, the Ministry of Land set the type-A apartment prices at Tk 1.90 lakhs and later increased the price to Tk 5 lakhs. The majority of informal settlement dwellers could not afford these nominal prices from the start. Many of those that could afford to pay the monthly instalments (Tk 1,125) for 10 years could not make the down payment of Tk 65,000 without any external financial support. For instance, resident Makbul Hossain, who's been living in Bhasantek settlement since 1974 when Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman assisted poor dwellers from different areas of Dhaka to settle in the area, said, "How can I even dare to apply for these apartments? Where's the money? People who have party affiliations, power, they are the ones getting the apartments. The slum is what works for poor people like us.

Residents who are less than 35 years old are not eligible to apply for the

out or sold the apartments and returned

What can housing policymakers, advocates, and planners learn from Bhasantek? First, the long-running BRP design and implementation lacked community participation and independent monitoring, which translated into exclusion of deserving households from the project's start to present. Second, apartmentstyle resettlement plans do not by themselves work for slum dwellers. Housing is about a bundle of services (employment, healthcare, education etc.), and not merely the physical shelter itself. Within informal settlements, dwellers can add rooms to their houses as family size increases or add more space for business. Apartments do not always provide the spatial flexibility that is necessary for the urban poor's survival in an iniquitous city. In cases like Singapore, the success of apartment-based resettlement is due to tremendous state subsidies, exceptional

support informal settlements through policies, laws, infrastructure, finances, and resources. Policymakers and advocates should recognise existing informal settlement dweller groups and associations as social units that can acquire, own, and manage urban land for housing.

As "slums" are demolished or wait for demolition, from Duaripara to Korail, as "slums" burn from Kalshi to Chalantika, as the failed Bhasantek stands with good intentions, as mayors and councillors take office with promises to turn Dhaka into an "intelligent city", "a top-class metropolis", and "a tourist hub", we need an honest answer to a collective question: Are we creating a humane Dhaka? Are we creating a Dhaka that recognises the ingenuity and rights of those neglected others on whose backs the city stands?

Scientists see through human organs for the first time


Transparent human organs allow 3D maps at the cellular level

For the first time, researchers managed to make intact human organs transparent. Using microscopic imaging they could reveal underlying complex structures of the see-through organs at the cellular level. Resulting organ maps can serve as templates for 3D-bioprinting technologies. In the future, this could lead to the creation of on demand artificial organs for many patients in need. The findings published in Cell joined forces from Helmholtz Zentrum München, Ludwig Maximilians University Munich (LMU), and Technical University of Munich (TUM).

In biomedical research, seeing is believing. Deciphering the structural complexity of human organs has always been a major challenge due to the lack of technologies to image them at the cellular level. Recent developments in tissue clearing allowed researchers to obtain first cellular views of intact transparent mouse organs in 3D. These methods, however, were not applicable to human organs.

Human organs are particularly stiff due to accumulation of insoluble molecules including collagen in tissues that have grown for years or even decades. Thus, traditional detergents that are used for making mouse organs transparent do not work on human organs, particularly adult ones. "We had to change our approach completely and start from scratch to find



new chemicals which can make human organs transparent," says Shan Zhao, PhD student at Helmholtz Zentrum München and first author of the study After exhausting trials, the team discovered that a detergent called CHAPS could make small holes throughout the entire stiff human organs. CHAPS allows additional solutions to travel deep into centimetresthick human organs and convert them into a transparent structure.

After making the human organs transparent, which were obtained post mortem from Prof Ingo Bechmann's lab at the University of Leipzig, the team had to tackle additional challenges for both organ imaging and the analysis of the large amount of resulting data. First, they developed a new laser-scanning microscope with a large sample holding capacity called "Ultramicroscope Blaze" in collaboration with Miltenyi Biotec.

This microscope enabled imaging of human organs as large as the kidney. Next, together with Prof. Bjoern Menze from TUM, the team developed deep learning algorithms to be able to analyse hundreds of millions of cells in 3D.

The researchers named this new technology SHANEL (Small-micellemediated Human orgAN Efficient clearing and Labelling). "SHANEL can develop into a key technology for mapping intact human organs in the near future. This would dramatically accelerate our understanding of organs such as the brain, their development and function in health and disease," explains Dr. Ali Ertürk, Director of the Institute for Tissue Engineering and Regenerative Medicine at Helmholtz Zentrum München.

Now, the final goal is 3D-bioprinting of artificial organs. Cellular maps of human organs could be used to engineer large scale human tissues and organs with emerging 3D-bioprinting technologies. Towards this goal, Ertürk and his team are currently working on mapping major human organs, starting with the pancreas, heart and kidney.

"There is a huge shortage of organ donors for hundreds of thousands of people," says Ertürk. "The waiting time for patients and the transplantation costs are a real burden. Detailed knowledge about the cellular structure of human organs brings us an important step closer to creating functional organs artificially on demand.

Clinical characteristics of COVID-19

The clinical spectrum of 2019 novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) infection is still being defined. Now, investigators describe the characteristics of 99 people with confirmed 2019-nCoV pneumonia who were admitted to one infectious diseases specialty hospital between January 1 and 20, 2020, in Wuhan, China.

The patients' average age was 55; two thirds were men; 47 had long-term exposure (e.g., salesmen, market managers) and 2 had short-term exposure (shoppers) to the Huanan seafood market. About 50% had chronic conditions, most commonly cardiovascular and cerebrovascular diseases (40%). At hospital admission, symptoms and signs included fever (83%), cough (82%), and shortness of breath (31%); few patients had sore throat, rhinorrhoea, or gastrointestinal symptoms (≤5% each). Laboratory findings included liver function abnormalities (43%) and lymphopaenia (35%).

On chest x-ray or computed tomography, 75% had evidence of bilateral pneumonia; 1 person had a pneumothorax. Complications at time of presentation included acute respiratory distress syndrome (17%), acute kidney injury (3%), and septic shock (4%). By January 25, 11 patients (11%) had died. Seven of the deaths were in people

This case series suggests that severe disease due to 2019-nCoV infection is most likely to occur in older people with comorbid conditions, as is the case with influenza and many other infectious diseases.

Just one dose of **HPV** vaccine may help prevent cervical disease

A single dose of human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine is associated with a significant reduction in cervical disease, according to a retrospective study in Cancer. The CDC generally recommends two doses for those vaccinated between ages 9 and 14, and three doses for those vaccinated later.

Using a U.S. insurance claims database, researchers matched nearly 67,000 females aged 9 to 26 who received at least one dose of the quadrivalent HPV vaccine with 67,000 unvaccinated controls.

The estimated rate of preinvasive cervical disease at 5 years was 2.65% in the unvaccinated group, versus 1.62%, 1.99%, and 1.86% among those who received one, two, and three vaccine doses, respectively, between ages 15 and 19. After multivariable adjustment, one vaccine dose was associated with a 36% risk reduction; two doses, a 28% reduction; and three doses, a 34% reduction.

Editorialists say the findings "add to the growing evidence suggesting that there may truly be no major difference in protection against cervical preinvasive lesions ... conferred by 1, 2, or 3 doses of HPV vaccination.'

Most people recover from these symptoms within a week. But children and those who have other diseases may suffer severe symptoms

BP drugs, statins might be replacing healthy lifestyle changes

Adults who start blood pressure- or lipid-lowering therapy may use these medications as substitutes for healthy lifestyle changes, according to a study in the Journal of the American Heart Association.

Researchers studied over 41,000 Finnish adults aged 40 and older (84% women) who were free of cardiovascular disease at baseline. Participants completed multiple lifestyle questionnaires from 2000 through 2013, and pharmacy records were examined to identify the start of antihypertensive or statin therapy.

After multivariable adjustment, participants who began either treatment during the study were significantly more likely than those who did not to become obese. They were also more likely to become inactive. One unhealthy behaviour did decline among those who started these medications — cigarette

The researchers call for more effective strategies to encourage lifestyle changes in patients beginning preventive medications. They cite U.S. guidelines, which recommend cognitive-behavioural methods, multidisciplinary approaches, and consideration of the individual's social determinants of health.



Pope Francis sides with traditionalists on priest celibacy

In quashing the idea of married priests in the Amazon, Pope Francis has appeased traditionalists while disappointing progressives who had hoped for a historic turning point in the Catholic church.

In his "apostolic exhortation" on the Amazon basin published Wednesday, Francis slammed the door on a progressive proposal offered by the region's bishops during a synod on the region in October.

The synod had suggested that the way to solve a shortage of priests in the remote and inaccessible area was to allow married indigenous men to become priests.

Without even mentioning that proposal, Francis instead argued for more missionary priests in the Amazon and for women and lay people to take on larger roles, falling short of another synod idea to ordain women as deacons in the region.

The Argentine pontiff's thoughts, coming after months of speculation and hand-wringing within the Vatican, were welcomed by some, including a vocal opponent of Francis, German Cardinal Gerhard Mueller.

The California tech giant has remained steadfast about not paying for news article links displayed in search results and is not changing that position, people familiar with the matter told AFP.

It has argued that it drives traffic to news websites and thereby helps those publishers get ad revenues.

Google's News Initiative works with publishers to encourage readership and paid subscriptions to their offerings.

Facebook, which has been hit with similar criticism, last year launched a dedicated "news tab" with professionally-produced content -- a move by the social network to promote journalism and shed its reputation as a platform for misinformation.

Facebook was expected to pay some of the news organizations, reportedly millions of dollars in some cases.

The move by Google comes amid pressure to comply with a European copyright directive on content in search results.

Google said last year it would not pay European media outlets for using their articles, pictures and videos in its searches in France, the first country to ratify the copyright directive, raising the prospect of legal action against the internet titan.

The tech giant said it would only display content in its search engine results and on Google News from media groups who had given their permission for it to be used for free.

He has also been charged under section 31, which criminalises Nur, the owner of the Guardian publishing or broadcasting any content that "destroys communal harmony" or "deteriorates or threatens to deteriorate the law and order" which carries up to 10 years in

These terms are so vague and broad that the authorities can essentially arrest critics at will, effectively chilling free speech, HRW observed.

The DSA was also used against the Shariat, for accusing Islamic clerics of misinterpreting the Quran to forbid music and for reportedly saying "Our great Prophet Muhammad was an ardent fan of music and went to sleep at night after listening to music."

If convicted, Sarker could face 10

years in prison. The Bangladesh government has ignored repeated calls from the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, the United States, the European Union, journalists within Bangladesh and many others to bring the law in line with Bangladesh's commitments under international law, said the HRW.

Chinese, Vatican foreign ministers hold first meeting

The foreign ministers of China and the Vatican have met in the first high-level encounter between the sides -- a new sign of improving relations between two states with no diplomatic ties.

US Border Patrol to send Tactical Unit officers to 'sanctuary cities'

Trump administration is deploying highly trained officers to boost arrests of unauthorized immigrants in a number of cities, including Los Angeles, Chicago and New York, the latest move in a battle against localities that adopt "sanctuary" policies to protect them from deportation.

Members of the U.S. Customs and Border Protection's (CBP) Border Patrol Tactical Unit will be among the officers deployed to cities to assist Immigration and Customs Enforcement, or ICE. They will also be sent to San Francisco, Atlanta, Houston, Boston, New Orleans, Detroit and Newark, New Jersey, CBP spokesman Lawrence Payne said in a

statement on Friday.
The Tactical Unit's members undergo a "grueling" training program designed to "mirror aspects" of U.S. Special Operation Forces courses, according to details about the program published on the CBP website. The unit was launched in 1984 in response to rioting at immigration detention

Illegal nets pose threat to fish in coastal area

A section of fishermen have continued catching fish with illegally set large trap nets in the rivers of the coastal area and the shore of the Bay of Bengal, posing threat to different species of marine as well as sweet water fish.

The callous act seems unstoppable despite frequent drives by the Coast Guard and the Department of Fisheries.

During this winter, fishing with the large trap nets, locally called chargara, behundi and ghopjals, is a common scene at the mouth of the Baleshwar, Payra and Bishkhali rivers adjoining the Bay, Laldiya, Haringhata, Padma, Rohita, Chhoto Tengara and Charduwani in Barguna's Pathorghata upazila, and Asharchar in Taltali upazila.

The banned nets are also used in Gangamati, Fatrar Char, and the char areas near the rivers of Mahipur area in Patuakhali's Kalapara upazila.

In a recent visit to Gangamati, this correspondent saw with chargara nets spread in a large part of the beach area.

The trap net, each 300 to 400 metres long, and 1.5 to two metres high, is set on the slopes of the river and beach. Fish coming with high tide often get trapped there during the low tide. Ghopjal, a similar kind of net, is tied to poles set in the coastal areas of the Bay and mouth of rivers.

Located 12 km south of Pathorghata, Laldiyar Char is a coastal island in the Bay of Bengal. During the winter, different species of fish including the young ones are caught there with the banned nets. Hiran, known as the owner of the largest ghopjal and chargara nets in Padma, Ruhita, Haringhata and Tengra areas of Pathorghata upazila, said, "I got permission to catch fish with the nets from Khulna last year. I have sold my nets. Now I'm not involved with it."

Nurul Islam, Kalam Mia and Abul Hossain, residents of Haringhata area of Pathorghata, said the administration should take a strong stand to stop use of chargara, ghopjals, and current nets to save fish stock in the coastal areas.

Zakir Hossain Miraj, proprietor of Sonatla Fisheries Hatchery in Pathorghata upazila, said, "The fish resources in our rivers will be threatened if those are caught with sparrow and snake nets [other names of the trap nets] in different rivers of

Barguna.

Rabindranath, acting district fisheries officer in Barguna, said they conduct regular drives against fishing with illegal nets in the rivers of the coastal areas of the district.

Biswajit Barua, Coast Guard's commander at Pathorghata, said, "Despite shortage of manpower, we often conduct joint operations to stop use of the banned nets. But a section of the fishermen are too reckless and cunning."

Barguna Deputy Commissioner Mostine Billah said, "We are sincerely trying to stop these unscrupulous fishermen. Alongside conducting drives, we also called them at various meetings to make them aware about the harmful effects of the fishing with these nets."

Dinajpur JCD leader stabbed dead

Unidentified criminals stabbed a Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) leader to death at Shukbebpur village in Bochaganj upazila on Friday night.

The deceased, Majnur Rahman, 32, son Obaidur Rahman of Dhontola village, was general secretary of Bochaganj upazila unit JCD.

Quoting locals, Officer in Charge of Bochaganj Police Station Ayub Ali said, a group of seven to eight unidentified criminals waylaid Majnur while he was crossing Shukdebpur village around 11:00am.

They stabbed him indiscriminately with sharp weapons and fled the scene, leaving him critically injured, he said.

Hearing cry for help, villagers rescued injured Majnur and admitted him to Bochaganj Upazila Health Complex, from where he was referred to M Abdur Rahim Medical College Hospital in Dinajpur.

He succumbed to his injuries on way to the hospital the same night, police said.

Meanwhile, victim's cousin Al Maruf Reza alleged that it was a planned murder.

The JCD leader might have been killed over personal feud, the OC said, adding that, being informed, they recovered the body and sent it to the hospital for autopsy.

Stone crushing worker dies of silicosis

A silicosis-affected former stone-crushing labourer in Lalmonirhat's Patgram upazila died on the way to Rangpur Medical College Hospital yesterday afternoon.

The deceased, Momin Ali, 40, son of Sahidar Rahman of Ufarmara village in Pagram upazila, was the president of silicosis affected stone crushing labourers' compensation movement in Burimari land port area of Patgram.

He also was the plaintiff in one of the 62 compensation cases filed with Rajshahi Labour Court.

In a critical condition, he was admitted to Patgram Upazila Health Complex yesterday morning from where he was referred to Rangpur Medical College Hospital.

But he died shortly after he started in an ambulance.

"Momin had been bedridden for a month but we could not arrange his treatment for lack of money. I went to public representatives, administrative officials, and stone traders for help, but none gave even a taka," said Sahidar Rahman.

Momin left the job at a stone crushing factory at Burimari land port after he got silicosis seven years ago. Treatment in Rangpur and Dhaka failed to cure him.

"Momin Bhai was our leader. He moved to different places in a bid to realise compensation for us. He used to look after labour court cases. Finally he expired, leaving us helpless," said Abul Kalam Azad, a stone-crushing labourer in the same village, also suffering from silicosis.

"The former employers abandoned us. Now the compensation seems far away," said Mahir Uddin of Khalpara village, also seriously ill with the same disease.

According to Burimari union parishad Chairman Abu

Sayeed Newaz Nishat, 66 stone crushing workers died from silicosis in the last six to seven years.

"Hundreds others are affected, of them 70 critically

ill. The workers got the deadly disease as the stone dust entered the lungs through the nose and mouth while crushing stones without using safety masks," he said. Lalmonirhat Civil Surgeon Dr Kashem Ali told The

Daily Star, "Silicosis infects the lungs and eventually leads to death. Treatment for this disease is given only at the Chest Diseases Hospital in Dhaka."

Magura pigeon farmer now idol for unemployed youths

With almost empty hand, Shariful Islam returned home from Dubai in 2011 and became very upset. At one stage, he tried his luck in pigeon farming following suggestion of a local pigeon lover and since then he did not need to look back.

Many residents of his locality, especially youths, are now following his footsteps.

Son of late Sabdal Mollah, a marginal farmer from Chandpur village in Magura Sadar upazila, Shariful is the second among eight siblings.

After completing BA (Pass) from a college in Dhaka, Shariful went to Kuwait to seek fortune in 2002, where he worked as an electrician for about eight years. In 2011, he returned home after losing his job. The same year, he went to

Dubai but returned home after 36 days. He could not continue his job there for low

wages and returned home with almost empty hand, said Shariful, adding that after some days, he started farming pigeon with an investment of Tk 50,000 on the roof of their house following suggestion of pigeon lover Saiful Islam.

Apart from this, he made pigeons' cages and feed and sold them to traders of different areas in the country.

At present, he earned a profit of Tk 80,000 from the farming every month, said Shariful, now father of two children.

Shariful further said he has 35 local and international verities of pigeons. Of them, each pair of Bold Head is sold at Tk 1.80 lakh and Gerafer at Tk 1 lakh while Feel Back, English

Trumpeter and Black Laurie are sold at Tk 40 to Tk 50 thousand a pair.

He sells the younger ones at Tk 20 to Tk 25 thousand each pair. He gathered primary knowledge about pigeon farming from one of

his close friends who works at Acme Veterinary. He has also set up a sale centre at Binodpur Bazar in the upazila, said Shariful, adding that he opened a Facebook page and sold

pigeons through it.
Seeing Shariful's success, around 15 unemployed youths started pigeon farming and they are now earning good profit, said locals.

A local youth, Rakibul Hossain of Dharla village, said he is very happy running the business. He sells pigeons at Tk 30,000 per month.

China cleans, locks away banknotes

China is disinfecting and isolating used banknotes as part of efforts to stop the spread of the new coronavirus that has killed more than 1,500 people, officials said

Banks use ultraviolet light or high temperatures to disinfect yuan bills, then seal and store the cash for seven to 14 days -- depending on the severity of the outbreak in a particular region -- before recirculating them, China's central bank said at a press conference.

The virus, which has infected more than 66,000 people in China and spread to more than two dozen other countries, has sparked a rush to disinfect public places and minimise contact between people.

Pharmacies across the country sold out of disinfectants and surgical masks in just days after a lockdown was announced in late January on Wuhan city, where the COVID-19 illness is believed to have emerged. Fan Yifei, deputy governor of China's central bank,

vesterday said that banks have been urged to provide new banknotes to customers whenever possible. The central bank made an "emergency issuance" of four

billion yuan in new notes to Hubei province, the epicentre of the outbreak, prior to the recent Lunar New Year holiday,

According to the World Health Organization, COVID-19 can be spread through contaminated objects in addition to droplets and direct contact with infected patients.

Incredible fall from grace

The celebrity lawyer who represented Stormy Daniels, the porn actress who sued US President Donald Trump, was found guilty of extortion Friday in a Manhattan federal court. The conviction marks an incredible fall from grace for California lawyer Michael Avenatti, who at one point presented himself as a major adversary to Trump. Avenatti was found guilty by a jury of charges related to his attempt to extort millions of dollars from the sports apparel giant Nike. He also faces a slew of cases including for embezzlement, tax and banking fraud and identity theft. If found guilty of all the charges, Avenatti could theoretically be sentenced to several hundred years behind bars.

Stone seeks new trial

Republican political consultant Roger Stone requested a new trial Friday just days after President Donald Trump's criticism of his proposed jail sentence sparked an uproar over political influence in the justice system. The motion was sealed so his arguments for a new trial were not clear. Stone, part of Trump's successful 2016 presidential campaign, was arrested in January 2019 on charges brought by then-special counsel Robert Mueller as part of the Russia investigation. He was accused of lying in testimony to Congress about acting as an intermediary between the Trump campaign and WikiLeaks, which released hacked documents that embarrassed rival Hillary Clinton during the White House race. Stone was convicted on all seven counts in November, and was scheduled to be sentenced on February 20.

Epidemic under control

Says China State Councillor Wang Yi, admits crisis a 'deep challenge', slams 'overreaction'

A top Chinese official acknowledged that the new coronavirus is a deep challenge to the country, but defended Beijing's management of the epidemic while lashing out at the "overreaction" of other countries.

In a wide-ranging interview with Reuters in the German capital, State Councillor Wang Yi, who also serves as China's foreign minister, urged the United States not to take unnecessary virusresponse measures that could hamper trade, travel and tourism. "The epidemic overall is under control,"

he said. "This epidemic is truly sudden. It has brought a challenge to China and the

"We've taken such complete prevention and control efforts, efforts that are so comprehensive, that I can't see any other country that can do this," Wang said, adding that any leader in another country would find the challenge very difficult.

"But China has been able to do this." Beijing has criticised the United States particular for taking drastic measures on visitors from China. The United States was the first to announce it was evacuating citizens from Wuhan, the city at the epicentre of the virus outbreak.

"Some countries have stepped up measures, including quarantine measures, which are reasonable and understandable, but for some countries they have overreacted, which has triggered unnecessary panic," he said.

"I'm sure that those countries are reflecting on this as the situation evolves and the epidemic is gradually brought under further control," he said. "They will gradually release such restrictions. Because at the end of the day, these countries need to interact with China."

"We're not just defending the life, safety and health of Chinese citizens, but also making our contribution for global public health, and that should be recognised," he said.

Beijing has urged countries to ease travel restrictions and resume flights after numerous airlines stopped flying to China.

"Only under the leadership of President Xi can we control this sudden epidemic, which has spread so quickly. This is not only to defend the health of the Chinese people, but also will prevent the rapid coronavirus, which have included travel curbs on spread of this epidemic in the world," he said.

15 killed in Haiti orphanage fire

Fifteen children were killed when a fire swept through an unlicensed orphanage outside Haiti's capital Port-au-Prince, a judge told AFP on Friday. Two children died in the blaze and 13 others died at a hospital as a result of smoke inhalation. The building housed about 66 children, she said. According to one of the children, the fire was ignited around 9:00pm by candles that the young occupants had lit in their rooms because the electricity was out. An investigation is underway to determine the exact cause of the fire and identify the people responsible for the orphanage.

Saudi fighter jet crashes in Yemen

A Saudi fighter jet crashed in conflict-torn Yemen, the Riyadh-led military coalition said yesterday, as the Huthi rebels said they downed the plane. The Tornado aircraft came down on Friday in northern Al-Jawf province during an operation to support Yemeni government forces, the coalition said in a statement carried by the official Saudi Press Agency. The coalition did not specify the fate of the crew or the cause of the crash.

Protester shot dead in Iraqi capital

A demonstrator was shot dead near the Iraqi capital's main protest camp by unidentified attackers using a gun silencer, medics said yesterday, as police reported a spate of activist abductions. Around 550 people have been killed since the anti-government movement erupted in October and around 30,000 more have been wounded.

'The West is winning'

Pompeo tells China, Russia as Europe, US spar over direction of Western policy

REUTERS, Munich

US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo yesterday defended his nation's global role despite misgivings in Europe, vowing that Western values would prevail over Russian and Chinese desires for "empire".

Seeking to reassure Europeans troubled by US President Donald Trump's "America first" rhetoric, his ambivalence over the Nato military alliance and tariffs on European goods, Pompeo said there was no crisis in Western leadership.

"I'm happy to report that the death of the transatlantic alliance is grossly exaggerated. The West is winning, and we're winning together," he said in a speech at the Munich Security Conference, listing US steps to protect liberal democracies.

Pompeo was, in part, responding to German President Frank-Walter Steinmeier, who on Friday accused the United States, Russia and China of making the world more dangerous.

French President Emmanuel Macron told the conference of international leaders, lawmakers and diplomats he was not surprised by Steinmeier's speech and had liked it.

Trump's decision to pull out of the 2015 Iran nuclear deal, as well as the Paris climate accord, have undermined European priorities, while moves such as recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital have weakened European diplomacy, envoys say.

Pompeo defended the US strategy, saying Europe, Japan and other American allies were united on China, Iran and Russia, despite "tactical differences."

Citing Russia's 2014 annexation of Crimea, cyber threats in Iran and economic coercion by China, Pompeo said those countries were still "desiring empires" and destabilising the rules-based international

Noting that Russian intervention in Western democracies is on the rise, Macron said the West's policy of defiance towards Moscow in recent years had failed and, as nobody wanted to confront it directly, the only option was to have a closer dialogue to resolve differences.

US Secretary of Defense Mark Esper, speaking immediately after Pompeo, focused his remarks solely on China, accusing Beijing of a "nefarious strategy" through telecommunications firm Huawei.

"It is essential that we as an international community wake up to the challenges presented by Chinese manipulation of the long-standing international rules-based order," Esper said.

He said it was not too late for Britain, which last month said it would allow Huawei a limited role in building its 5G networks, to take "two steps back," but added he still needed to asses London's

Europe acts Says Iran FM

2015 nuclear deal if Europe provides "meaningful" benefits, the economic country's foreign minister said Friday,

The European parties to the Iran nuclear deal --Britain, France and Germany - have been battling to save it since US President Donald Trump withdrew from it and reimposed tough sanctions on Tehran.

Iran has responded to the US pullout with a series of steps back from its own commitments under the deal, including by increasing uranium enrichment.

But Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said the Islamic republic could be willing to move back towards compliance -under certain circumstances.

"We have said that we are prepared to slow down



or reverse these measures commensurate with what Europe does," Zarif told reporters at the Munich Security Conference.

"We will decide whether what Europe does is sufficient to slow down or to reverse some steps -- we have not even ruled out reversing some of the steps that we have taken."

Europe has set up a special trading mechanism called Instex to try to enable humanitarian legitimate trade with Iran to offset some of the effects of US sanctions.

But it has yet to complete any transactions and the Iranian side does not think it is sufficient.

"We're not talking about charity. We're talking about Iranian rights and the rights of the Iranian people to receive the economic benefits," Zarif said.

AIR STRIKE IN AFGHANISTAN

8 civilians killed

An air strike in Afghanistan has killed at least eight civilians, officials said yesterday, as the war-torn country prepares for a "reduction in violence" under a deal between Taliban militants and the United States. The incident took place in the eastern province of

Nangarhar on Friday when a vehicle carrying civilians was struck, according to Ataullah Khogyani, a spokesman for the provincial governor. "The target of the attack was Taliban militants who

wanted to establish checkpoints on the road, but unfortunately civilians were hit," he told AFP, putting the death toll at eight. Talib Khan, a relative of the dead, told AFP the victims

had been driving home from a picnic when their truck was hit, killing everyone inside. Another relative, Shah Mir, 70, said: "No other breadwinner is left in my house, all my three sons were killed. I have a

dozen grandchildren, I don't know how to bring them up." It was not immediately clear who bombed the vehicle, but the US and Afghan militaries are the only forces in

Afghanistan conducting air strikes. A US military spokesman said they were "looking into the incident" and an Afghan defence ministry spokesman said they had launched an investigation.

The strike comes after US Defense Secretary Mark Esper said Thursday an agreement with the Taliban was in place for a "conditions-based" seven-day reduction in violence.

The move is part of a long quest to forge a deal that could eventually lead to a comprehensive ceasefire.

Indian judge warns against labelling dissent as anti-nat'l

Calling dissent the "safety valve" of democracy, Indian Supreme Court judge Justice DY Chandrachud vesterday said "blanket labelling" of defiance as antinational or anti-democratic strikes at the heart of the country's commitment to protect constitutional values.

Justice Chandrachud added that use of state machinery to curb dissent instills fear, which violates the rule of law.

"The blanket labelling of dissent as anti-national or antidemocratic strikes at the heart of our commitment to protect constitutional values and the promotion of deliberative democracy," Justice Chandrachud said during a lecture

in Ahmedabad. "Protecting dissent is but a reminder that while a democratically elected government suppression of the conscience or the

and social coordination, they can never claim a monopoly over the values and identities that define our plural society," Justice Chandrachud added.

Weinstein believed he was "the master of his universe, and the witnesses here were really ants who he could step on without consequences," said assistant district attorney Joan Illuzzi-Orbon in the final day of closing arguments.

"He had a surefire insurance policy: the witnesses were standing in line to get into his universe," she added.

Weinstein, the first man accused of abuse in the #MeToo movement to

face a criminal trial, has been accused of sexual misconduct by more than 80 women. He denies the allegations

Six women took the stand to say the ex-Miramax Films boss had sexually assaulted them, but the jury is considering charges related to just

Mann says Weinstein raped her in March 2013, while Haleyi alleges he forcibly performed oral sex on her in

On Thursday, defense attorney Donna Rotunno argued the women

The trial has raised complicated issues surrounding consent and abuse of power for the jury of seven men and

Under cross-examination, both Mann and Haleyi acknowledged at least one consensual sexual encounter with Weinstein after the alleged assaults.

The defense has also presented emails that appear to show Mann on friendly terms with Weinstein.

Jurors will begin deliberating Weinstein's fate on Tuesday and must reach unanimous verdicts on each count. If they are unable, the judge may be forced to declare a mistrial. A split verdict is possible, where Weinstein is convicted of some charges and cleared of others.

TOUGH LAW AGAINST MISINFORMATION IN SINGAPORE

Anti-govt website ordered to warn readers of falsehoods

Singapore yesterday ordered the Facebook page of an anti-government website to warn readers it regularly posts falsehoods, the first time authorities have taken such action under a tough law against misinformation.

The law gives ministers in the tightlyregulated city powers to order internet platforms to put warnings next to posts they deem false, but activists and tech giants like Facebook fear it could be used to curb free speech.

Authorities have used it several times to force corrections on individual online posts, but this is the first time since the law came into effect in October that an entity is being directed to warn its readers that it is a regular promoter of falsehoods.

A government statement said the information minister had invoked the law to name the Facebook page of The States Times Review (STR) as a "declared online location" with effect from Sunday.

This means it is required to carry a notice warning readers that it "has a history of communicating falsehoods", the statement said.

The notice aims to prompt readers to do additional fact-checking when accessing

According to the statement, STR "has repeatedly conveyed numerous falsehoods" since November last year, three of which had been ordered corrected under the law. And in the past weeks, its Facebook

Facebook to do so. Facebook has complied. The increased use of the law comes as speculation mounts that elections could be called within months, although a weak opposition is seen as no match for the long-ruling People's Action Party.

She is just 19 years old but has been playing international cricket for more than four years, having made her debut in September 2015. In 38

matches she's collected 49 wickets at 12.1, with the handy economy rate of 4.77. Don't be surprised if: Bangladesh prove a stumbling block for one of the higherranked teams. Sri Lanka seem the obvious opponent given their poor run of form and Bangladesh will be desperate to prove themselves at this level given their improvement across the past few years. They have not registered a win at their past two tournaments, so this is a chance to break their drought.

Pep Guardiola faces a huge test of his loyalty to Manchester City after kopa his club were hit with a stunning two-year

suspension from UEFA competitions on Friday. City have been banned from the Champions League and Europa League for the next two seasons and fined 30 million euros (£24.9 million) after UEFA found them guilty of committing "serious breaches" of financial regulations.

The Premier League champions overstated sponsorship revenue in accounts submitted between 2012 and 2016, according to European football's governing body.

UEFA also said City failed to cooperate with an investigation into the matter launched by its Club Financial Control Body.

The shock punishment will cost City an estimated £170 million in lost Champions League revenue and the club reacted furiously, immediately vowing to appeal to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS).
"Manchester City is disappointed but not

surprised by today's announcement by the UEFA Adjudicatory Chamber," a statement read.

"The club has always anticipated the ultimate need to seek out an independent body and process to impartially consider the comprehensive body of irrefutable evidence in support of its position."

But, while City urgently plan their appeal, the football world waits to see how Guardiola reacts to a punishment that could convince the Spaniard to quit the Etihad Stadium at the end

Guardiola reportedly has a break clause in his contract which means he can depart at the conclusion of this campaign should certain stipulations be met that satisfy the City hierarchy.

City officials were said to be confident that, despite an underwhelming season which has seen them fall 22 points behind runaway Premier League leaders Liverpool, Guardiola would honour a contract that currently ties him to the club until 2021.



But staying with City now European football could be off limits is likely to be a rather more unappetising prospect for Guardiola.

Whether the former Barcelona and Bayern Munich boss wants to stick it out at City will show how much he has grown to love the club since arriving in 2016.

Guardiola is close to City directors Txiki Begiristain and Ferran Soriano, who worked with him at Barca, but his ties to City's Abu Dhabibased owner Sheikh Mansour might be frayed if there is no escape from the embarrassing ban.

Leading City to a pair of Premier League titles in record-breaking fashion and winning a domestic treble last term underlined Guardiola's

However, he has failed to get past the quarterfinals of the Champions League with City and another daunting test lies in wait in the last 16 when they face Real Madrid later in February.

The most recent of Guardiola's two Champions League titles as a manager came way back in 2011 with Barca and his failure to add to that tally is the one blemish on his otherwise glittering CV.

The critics who crow that he can only win Europe's elite club prize with a genius like Barca's Lionel Messi in his team have nagged at Guardiola for years.

So the prospect of wasting two seasons waiting to return to the pursuit of his holy grail could be too much for Guardiola to bear, especially as rampant Liverpool look capable of keeping the Premier League crown out of City's grasp for years to come.

Asked about the potential for a European ban in December 2018, Guardiola had been optimistic, but that trust proved misplaced.

"We will not be banned. I trust in them (the owners)," he said at the time. "If it happens, because UEFA decide that, we will accept it and move forward.

Everything has changed now and reports immediately after news of the ban broke claimed the 49-year-old would consider his future unless

Football Leaks hacker Rui Pinto -- the man who exposed Manchester City's breaking of Financial Fair Play rules -- remains in prison awaiting a court case.

Pinto hacked his way into club emails from his Portugal home in 2015 and then passed them on to the media and sparked the investigation into City's finances.

Despite being widely praised by the football world, Pinto was arrested and sent to prison, and will face a trial for 90 different counts of hacking,

Pinto was denied an appeal on Thursday and has been in jail since last March, while awaiting a verdict by the Lisbon Court of Appeal.

"In the beginning, I wrote notes related to the case in my notebook, but then it was taken from me. My lawyer was present when they searched my cell and said it was illegal to take my notes from me. It wasn't the prison guards who did it, but the Portuguese prosecutors. They do anything they want. It was a month before they returned the notebook to me."

Zidane fears **Man City** motivation



Polls system coming apart

Experts warn at a discussion, urge campign for fair polls, electoral reforms

The country's democratic system will collapse and there is a need to wage a movement with fresh demands for fair polls, good governance campaigners, politicians and former bureaucrats said yesterday.

Fair polls are the outcome of a well-managed electoral system and also the steppingstone of a country's democratic system, they said at a discussion marking the "Seventh National Council-2020" of Shushashoner Jonno Nagorik

There is no alternative to fair polls when it comes to ensuring good governance, they added.

Shujan, which campaigns for good governance, arranged the daylong programme at the auditorium of Institute of Diploma Engineers Bangladesh in the city.

Addressing the discussion as chief guest, former chief election commissioner Mohammad Abu Hena said reforms have been made over the years to improve the country's electoral system and better functioning of the Election Commission to strengthen the democratic system.

He said one major reform in the system was to make public affidavits of polls candidates while another was the registration of political parties.

However, despite these initiatives, the results or achievement were not as expected, he added.

Abu Hena said such reforms will not bear fruit if their implementation is not effective, adding that any institution becomes effective if competent people work for it. The official voter turnout in the 11th parliamentary

polls was more than 80 percent but it might have been 30 percent in reality, said noted economist and former caretaker government adviser Akbar Ali Khan. An additional 50 percent voter turnout was shown

"farcically", he said. Akbar said voter turnout remained below 30 percent in

the municipality polls.

Usually, the average voter turnout in national polls remain lower because political party candidates are not as organised at the grassroots as the local candidates of union parishad or municipality polls are, he said.



Google mulls deals to pay news outlets

Google is in discussions on deals to pay media organizations for content, a move aimed at blunting criticism that it unfairly profits from copyrighted news, according to people familiar with the talks.

Negotiations between the internet giant and news outlets were said to be in the early stages, with most of the publishers located in France and other parts of Europe. Paying for news would diverge from the Alphabet-
