# Solo exhibition 'Red Dwarf' underway at AFD


Red Dwarf, a solo art exhibition by Pervaj Hasan Rigan, has begun at La Galerie, Alliance Française de Dhaka (AFD). Born in Barisal in 1988, Rigan completed his BFA and MFA from the Department of Drawing and Painting, University of Dhaka. The artist likes to work with oil paint, acrylic, videos, sounds and charcoal.

For Rigan, painting is the key for understanding the universe. He believes there is a strong relationship between mankind and the rest of the cosmos, and this strength pushes him to his work every day. Human

portraits and figures play a significant role in Rigan's canvas because he likes their anatomy, gesture, light and shade. When he work with human feelings and thoughts, it is vital for him to pick up those forms for his paintings. He also loves plain air painting. Subsequently, nature is an important part of his artworks. Rigan uses quite a few processes to complete a painting. He starts with a simple thought on his sketchbook. Then, he has discussion and a photo shoot with the model, before getting to the charcoal drawing and finally, the original painting. Sometime he uses Photoshop to make his structures and compositions more precise. He believes every

person has their own unique mind, which he tries to capture and reflect in his works, while also representing his style. Beauty and darkness are prominent themes of his figurative artworks. As an artist Rigan's goal is to capture the mystery and spirituality in particular experiences of the human mind. He is immensely inspired by contemporary painter Roberto Ferri.

# Once More into the Past: Essays, Personal, **Public, and Literary**

Dr Fakrul Alam looks back

Academic, writer, and translator Dr Fakrul Alam's new book, Once More into the Past: Essays, Personal, Public, and Literary, was published at the Ekushey Boi Mela 2020,

Published by The Daily Star Books, the volume is a curated essay collection written by Dr Alam on various occasions for The Daily Star, back from 1999, when he started writing for the newspaper as a contributor. He further went on to serve as a Consulting Editor for the Star Literature page and Daily Star Books from July 2017 to February 2018. "Most of the essays and reviews from The Daily Star I have assembled in this book have thus been triggered by my remembrances of things in the past," he

The personal section includes musings Nana Bari, his

memories Liberation War and at DU through teaching moments of peace and political upheaval, and much more. "Just read my essays, Ah Nana Bari! and Growing Up with Rabindra Sangeet, reprinted in this book, and you will understand not only how E B White inspired me but also the extent of his influence on me, and why I have titled my

book thus," he adds. In the public section, Dr Alam comments on the early days of the British Council in Bangladesh, the history of Dhaka through Partition, the Language Movement and Liberation, Karl Marx's writings on India, and the life and legacy of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman.

The Literary section explores Dr

Alam's personal favourites—Edward Said, Jibanananda Das, Razia Khan Amin, Kaiser Haq, and Syed Manzoorul Islam, along with other literary giants—Tagore, Melville, R K Narayan, Gunter Grass, and many others. "All I hope now is that readers of this book will find them enjoyable and confirm my belief that reprinting them were worth these trips down my memory's lanes," he smiles.

Fakrul Alam is UGC Professor of English at the University of Dhaka renowned for his work on postcolonial literature and Rabindranath Tagore. He has also taught at universities in North America and India.

His noteworthy works include

(1989), Bharati Mukherjee,


Jibanananda Das: Selected Poems (University Press Limited, 1999), South Asian Writers in English (Thomson Gale, 2006), Imperial Entanglements and Literature in English (Writers. ink, 2007), The Essential Tagore (with Radha Chakravarti; Harvard UP and Viswa Bharati, 2011), and Rabindranath Tagore and National Identity Formation in Bangladesh: Essays and Reviews (Bangla Academy, 2013).

He has also translated Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's Unfinished Memoirs (UPL Bangladesh, Penguin Books India, OUP Pakistan, 2012) and Prison Diaries (Bangla Academy, 2016), along with Mir Mosharraf Hossain's 1885 epic Bishad-Sindhu, published as Ocean of Sorrow by the Bangla Academy in 2016. Professor Alam was awarded the SAARC Literary Award in 2012 and the Bangla Academy Literary Award for translation in 2013.

### 'Gouache Painting Workshop and Seminar' at DU

The weeklong (February 22-28) 'Gouache Painting Workshop and Seminar 2020' has been arranged at the Library Building, Faculty of Fine Art (FFA), University of Dhaka (DU). Eminent artist Professor Nikhil Ranjan Pal of the Department of Painting, Faculty of Visual Art, Rabindra Bharati University, Kolkata, is conducting the workshop. Oriental Painting Study Group (OPSG) and FFA, DU, are jointly organising the event.

Professor Nikhil Ranjan Pal inaugurated the workshop yesterday through a live demonstration and elaboration on the art media, which has a considerable history dating back to 600 years. Gouache is a type of water media painting consisting of natural pigment, water, a binding agent and sometimes, additional inert material. It is designed to be used with opaque methods of painting. Four teachers along with several students from the four departments of FFA, DU are participating in the workshop.

Renowned artist Professor Nisar Hossain, Dean, FFA, DU, attended the inaugural



ceremony as the chief guest while noted artist Professor Sheikh Afzal Hossain of the Department of Drawing and Painting, FFA, DU and oriental art connoisseur Mikhail I Islam were present as special guests. Coordinator of the workshop Dr Malay Bala, also an Associate Professor at the Department of Oriental Art, FFA, DU, hosted the programme.

Professor Nikhil Ranjan Pal will give a lecture on Gouache painting, along with visual presentation at 11am on January 24, while Oriental Painting Studio Bangladesh will host a musical programme, along with an artists' get together at their space in Elephant Road in the evening on the same day.



In observance of the International Mother Language Day (21 February), a daylong programme was arranged by Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA), at the Central Shaheed Minar and the BSA premises. A group dance performance, presented by **BAFA on Rabindranath Tagore and Kazi** Nazrul Islam's songs, along with many other performances of Bangladeshi folk dance and music, were also presented at the event. Many artistes from Malaysia, Russia, Afghanistan, Nigeria, Italy, and Sri Lanka also performed at the programme.
