# Third double ‘the easiest’

There was talk about whether Mushfiqur Rahim would even be considered for the Bangladesh Test squad to maintain team continuity after Mushfiqur had opted out of the Pakistan tour due to security fears. There were also huge concerns over the Tigers' recent performances in the longest format, but Mushfiqur Rahim brushed aside all the negative aspects as the right-hander became the only Bangladesh batsman to score three double-hundreds in Tests and took himself to a new height. His unbeaten 203 helped Bangladesh post a huge 560 for six declared in their first innings and the Tigers are eyeing a win in the Test. Despite reaching the new milestone, when asked to compare this double hundred with the previous two, the experienced cricketer perhaps gave a message by saying this was the easiest pitch among the three. His comment perhaps tells Bangladesh batsmen not to have a false sense of security when they face tougher opponents. During a more than 20-minute press conference, Mushfiqur spoke about his emotions, achievements and about his future. The excerpts of the press conference are given below:



**On whether he feels relieved after his third double ton**

There is nothing to be relieved about. If you notice I have scored 74 in my last Test innings. I never felt pressure, not even when I came to play here. I think whenever I am playing my importance should be to contribute behind the victory of the team. There was a plan from our team that someone from the top six should score hundred, 150 or a double-hundred once they get set. Mominul tried well and batted really well. I think everyone tried hard from their end and I was lucky that I was able to score the double-hundred, but the most important thing is our team is in very good situation which, was badly needed for us.

**On comparing this double ton to the previous two**

If you ask about comparisons, it was perhaps the easiest wicket to bat on. And it's not that they [Zimbabwe] had very threatening bowlers who were swinging the ball or turning, or even had a mystery bowler in the line-up. Among the three double-centuries I scored, I think this was the easiest wicket.

**On whether he eyed for a triple hundred**

## A DINOSAUR!

It was a normal celebration and I did not think ahead about what I was going to do. My son is a big fan of dinosaurs and whenever he watches dinosaurs, he celebrates and gets excited about it. My double century was for him. No, no... I didn't do it (celebration after hundred) targeting anybody. In my career I never did anything for revenge. I will be fighting with myself till the end of my career. What I thought was that if I could make the double hundred, I would do it for my son and that inspired me to reach my target in the end.

Yes, obviously I had a plan. To be honest I did not think we would declare the innings at that time as we still had two days in hand. I had it in my mind as Liton was at the other end, so I thought if he could score his hundred then I will also have the opportunity to score a triple hundred. It might not be possible today [Monday] but we could have done that inside the first session tomorrow [today]. I will try to utilise the opportunity if it arises in future. Weather could be a reason but I haven't asked yet. We have a quality bowling attack and I hope that this innings will be enough for us to win the game.

**On whether he is now pressure-free after he left keeping**

How am I pressure-free? I think the pressure has increased as it was two departments previously and I could have gotten help from one if I failed in another. But now there's only one as I can't bowl (smiles). I think we have to accept the reality and I am getting older now. I think it's the time to focus on the other side.

**On whether he feels that this is his peak time and also the time to take his batting average over forty**

This is Bangladesh, here, at this stage of your career is when you get dropped. I never felt this is my peak time but at the same time if you notice in world cricket, this should be the time for a bowler or batsman

## Tigresses fall short

Bangladesh women started their ICC Women's T20 World Cup campaign with an 18-run defeat to their Indian counterparts at the WACA in Perth yesterday.

The Tigresses, going up against an Indian side that got the better of the defending champions Australia by 17 runs in the tournament opener on February 21, went into the game as underdogs. In reply to India's 142 for six, the Tigresses could only manage 124 for eight.

India displayed their prowess in the way they started the game after being asked to bat. Despite losing opener Taniya Bhatia in the second over, the women in blue powered to 54 for two at the end of the six Powerplay overs. Shefali Verma, who contributed the most during that period to

Rachael Haynes and Meg Lanning revived Australia's stuttering women's Twenty20 World Cup title defence with a match-turning 95-run partnership in the home side's tense five-wicket victory over Sri Lanka in Perth on Monday.

more wickets yesterday to finish with figures of seven for 102 in 32.3 overs.

Although East Zone's pace trio of Abu Hider, Hasan Mahmud and Ruyel Miah rattled South's second innings, they were still in an advantageous position as they extended their lead to 338 runs after finishing the day on 125 for eight.

Hider claimed four wickets, including the one of Mahmudullah Riyad, who continued his poor form in longer-version cricket after making only 17 runs in South's second innings. Number eight batsman Mahedi Hasan rescued his side from complete disaster as his unbeaten 41 helped South cross the

hundred mark.

Hasan and Ruyel took two wickets each.

Earlier, ICC Under-19 World Cup winner Tanzid Hasan, was the star performer for East on his first-class debut as the left-hander hit 82 off 87 balls, which contained seven fours and two sixes.
