BEACALI KNOWS WHAT'S ROT IN BUCHAREST

Gigi Becali, the flamboyant owner of Bucharest football club FCSB, formerly known as Steaua Bucharest, thinks he knows what to blame for his team's recent poor run in the Romanian league: too much of the wrong kind of exercise. The 1986 European Cup winners, Romania's most successful club with 26 league titles, have failed to win their last three games, and Becali said the players were having too much sex. "My players are making love with their girlfriends too often, that's why they aren't playing football so well lately," he told local media after FCSB's 1-1 home draw against lowly Chindia Targoviste. "Look at Dan Petrescu," said Becali. "CFR players have sex only once a week. They meet with women only once a week."



Day irked with players on the bench

Jamie Day is planning to start the preparation camp of the national football team for the World Cup and Asian Cup qualifying match against Afghanistan on either March 15 or 16. Bangladesh will host Afghanistan

for their fifth match of the campaign at the Sylhet District Stadium on March 26. The ongoing Bangladesh Premier League will be suspended for nearly three weeks following the sixth round on March 15, with Chattogram Abahani playing against

Bashundhara Kings and Abahani taking on Muktijoddha Sangsad on that day. "We will have 10 days' camp before the game [against Afghanistan]. The camp will probably begin on 15th or 16th March, so we want to have four to five days in Dhaka

before four to five days in Sylhet," Day told reporters yesterday.

"Afghanistan are not only ranked higher than us but are also technically better. We played well against them but we were unlucky. We have home advantage now. We know we need to do very well to get a result. We have three home games and we will try to get points from there," said Day.

The British coach was, however, disappointed to see some of the national team players sitting idle or coming off the bench for

their respective clubs in the league.

"I watched the games. I was a little bit disappointed that six or seven players were substitutes or not involved but it gave other players an opportunity. If they don't reach the level to cover for the national team level, I wouldn't make any changes. It's down to players to get a place in the team," said Day, who returned to Dhaka on February 19 and is supposed to leave for England on February 28 to attend the third part of his UEFA Pro-License course before coming back on March 4.

Bangladesh are at the bottom of Group E with one point from four matches while Afghanistan are third with four points from five matches.

Man City target role reversal



Manchester City will be up against both Real Madrid and their reputation on Wednesday as the Champions League's biggest winners play one of its biggest underachievers at the Santiago Bernabeu.

After City's win over Leicester on Saturday, Pep Guardiola said: "We will try to be ourselves. We can

win and we can lose but we must try to be ourselves."

Yet in some ways, City will seek a role reversal too. Madrid's record is the envy of Europe but in particular by teams like City, whose financial might and technical talent has translated only into disappointment outside domestic

In the time City have won three Premier League titles and five domestic cups, they have gone past the Champions League's quarter-finals only once, reaching the last four in 2016, only to be beaten by Madrid.

Zinedine Zidane's side, meanwhile, have surrendered dominance in La Liga to Barcelona but made amends for one Spanish league title in seven years by winning an four Champions Leagues out of the last six.

Madrid believe this tournament is their tournament, a conviction based on historic success that makes them assured under pressure and ruthless in the decisive moments.

"When you have a history of the (Alfredo) Di Stefano period, winning five or six European Cups at that time, it means a new player that comes to Real Madrid and puts on that shirt knows 'we have to defend our history'," said Guardiola. "That gives them a boost because they live that history."

Lyon face up to Ronaldo

Ronaldo, especially in the stands.
