Two mayor-elects to take oath today

The newly elected mayors and councillors of Dhaka south and north city corporations will take oath today.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will administer the oath of office to Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) Mayor Barrister Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh and Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) Mayor Atiqul Islam at Shapla Hall at the PMO at 10:30am, Public Relations Officer of LGRD and Cooperative Ministry Mohammad Mahmudul Hasan told the news agency yesterday.

Besides, Local Government, Rural Development and Co-operatives Minister Md Tazul Islam will administer the oath of offices to the councillors from the general wards and reserved women's seats of the two city corporations at the same venue, he said.

The polls to DSCC and DNCC were held on February 1, where AL-backed candidates Taposh and Atiqul emerged victorious -- amid low turnout of voters.

However, the two mayors will have to wait to take over duties, as the tenure of the current city corporations continue till the middle of May. Incumbent DSCC mayor Sayeed Khokon will be at the helm of DSCC till then, while DNCC will be led by panel mayor Jamal Mostafa.

14 sources of graft Xi Jinping at land ports: ACC thanks PM

Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) has found 14 sources of graft at the 10 land ports of the country operated by Bangladesh Land Port Authority.

On the basis of annual and audit reports, victims' statement and interviews of former and current officials, a three-member team of ACC has found out the sources.

ACC Commissioner Dr Md Mozammel Haque Khan vesterday handed over the report to State Minister for and assistance to deal with Shipping Khalid Mahmud Chowdhury at the latter's the deadly coronavirus office, said Director of the anti-graft body Pranab Kumar Bhattacharya.

According to the report, to pocket public money, top officials Bangladesh Land Port Authority divided big development works into small packages and gave work to the same contractor again and again.

"They divide the works into small packages to avert competition in tender process," it said.

As per the report, port authorities often violate the corresponding act to award jobs to unfit contractors. These land ports recruit staffers through outsourcing, and there is no supervision, which gives scope to draw wages illegally,

The report said there are allegations against Compliance Bargaining Agents (CBA) of the land ports of taking bribe from contractors and syndicates who are involved in

There are also allegations against officials and staffer of taking bribe, and "anti-social activities" in the ports.

ACC found that port officers illegally engage outsiders in official work, including at weighbridge, yards and sheds. There is a hearsay that a quarter of port officers have created a strong network, which is involved in stealing

dodge tariffs, the report said. The anti-graft watchdog made a 28-point recommendation to prevent corruption at land ports.

The High Court yesterday banned two books -- "Dia Arefin" and "Nanir Bani" -- both written by Diarsi Arag, for hurting religious sentiments.

The court ordered the director general of Bangla Academy to seize copies of the books from Ekushey book fair immediately.

It also ordered the government to take steps to stop publication and marketing of the books.

The HC bench of Justice M Enayetur Rahim and Justice Md Mostafizur Rahman passed the order on a suo muto (voluntary) move after Advocate Azharullah Bhuiyan, a Supreme Court lawyer, placed the books before the judges for necessary order.

Azharullah told the court that the contents of the books hurt religious sentiments of people. The judges examined the contents of the books before passing the order.

2 books banned '2 people used to guard their vaults' Says Rab official about Enamul-

Rupon's flat where huge sum of money was stashed

Inside the tiny flat on the narrow Lalmohon Saha Street of Old Dhaka, "casino brothers" Enamul Haque Enu and Rupon Bhuiyan had hired two people to guard their five steel vaults, law enforcers have found.

Battalion (Rab) recovered Tk 26.55 crore in cash and fixed deposit receipts worth Tk 5.15 crore from the vaults. They also recovered around one kilogramme of gold, USD 9,300, 174 Malaysian ringgit, 5,350 Indian rupees, 1,195 Chinese yen, 11,560 Thai baht, 100 UAE dirhams

In a special drive on Tuesday, members of Rapid Action

and some gambling chips from the flat. "We have found two small beds in two rooms of the flat; two people used to live there to guard the vaults and money," Sarwoer Alam, executive magistrate of Rab headquarters who led the drive, told The Daily Star

yesterday. He, however, said there might be more people to guard the flat from outside, adding that they need more investigation to get a better idea about the brothers'

operations. Another Rab official involved with the investigation said the elite force has hired ten people to move the vaults and money from the flat. "It's really suspicious that no one saw how and when the casino brothers kept those huge steel

vaults in this tiny flat," he said, requesting anonymity. Meanwhile, Rab yesterday handed over the recovered
