In (and out of) the stones of our minds

Mustafa Zaman elaborates on modern curation

The traditional role of an art curator is to assemble, catalogue and manage artistic and cultural collections. However, when put in practice, curation may take various forms. Artist, Critic and Curator Mustafa Zaman has a heart-to-heart conversation with The Daily Star, revealing his current concepts of curation. His current work, In (and out of) the stones of our minds, is currently on display at Dwip Gallery.

Mustafa Zaman's first exhibition in the 90's was supposed to be a conventional painting exhibition. However, he changed his mind and put forth

ground-breaking image installation, using digital materials instead. Use of digital medium was a breakthrough then, now it is a well-accepted medium in the main stream. The curatorial note poses three queries, which had overwhelmed the young minds during that time. Nineteen years into the new millennium, they are still the most contentious issues. "Dilemma is the primary catalyst of my practice now. The surrealist concept of automatism works in me more," says Mustafa Zaman.

Having worked with some African artists recently, Zaman came across the practice of 'unthinking', which in simple terms, refers to going into creative endeavours without any contexts or preconceived notions. "African artists practice 'unthinking' because they do not want to remain in the frame work of western-centric ideas. The discourses behind their works are fascinating. If people knew these discourses, at least those that are

relevant to this region, they could have a better understanding. Every creative piece needs to be contextualised," he says.

The spontaneous positioning of body, image, material, and desire are evident in the gallery space of Dwip Gallery. "It is a celebration of what we want to do in this space. In the exhibition, we have artists from the 80s. We are also featuring young photographers, whose works show their vision of social concepts now. They sometimes converge and contradict, but that is the beauty of dialogues," Zaman emphasizes.

The naming of the exhibition was coined from John Lennon's song Mind Games. "The song is striking, it introduced terms like mind guerilla, which essentially is our state. We belong in our minds, more than in the society. I felt this could be a point of departure," he says.

Reading critical images, however, is

not an easy job. Is it at all necessary to try to understand each art piece? If yes, then is the artist or the curator to take the lead in it? Zaman answers that interpretation, retelling and conversation on the concept is required, and adds that it is primarily the curator's job. "Communication breakdown is also a part of modern curation. Basic courses on development of art should have been made mandatory in Bangladesh," he asserts.

Visiting exhibitions often churns ideas, concepts and ignites social inquiries. Using memory techniques, you draw upon visual imagination and can help to make mental connections between space and material objects. In (and out of) the stones of our minds will be open at Dwip Gallery till February 29, 2020.

Tirtho's daughter, Audri, is now nineteen months old. "When she grows up, these doodles will help her understand the journey we went through and they will bring back her childhood memories," he shares. Tirtho further commented on the scope for emerging

artists and illustrators in Bangladesh.

artists should not focus on fame and popularity. Rather, they should aim for consistency in the quality of their work," he says. After graduating from Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology in Architecture, Tirtho opened Studio Terracotta. Khurshid Alam Alok's 'Banglar Apon Soudho' underway at BSA

Khurshid Alam Alok's solo photography exhibition, Banglar Apon Soudho, is underway at the National Art Plaza of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA). It showcases 126 photos of different constructions of the Shaheed Minar, built by children across the country. Noted artist Mustafa Monwar inaugurated the exhibition on February 20. Professor Mohammad Rafiqul Islam and artist Nasim Ahmed Nadvi were present at the

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ceremony as guests. BSA Director General Liaquat Áli Lucky presided over the event.

25 years ago, while visiting his village, the photographer came across a group of children building a Shaheed Minar. Since then, the artist set out to find more such constructions of the Shaheed Minar. To that end, he visited several districts, including Barguna, Rajshahi, Manikganj and many others.

The children built and decorated versions of the Shaheed Minar in their own way, not confined to black and white elements.

"The Language Movement and the Shaheed Minar are the base of a new and bright life for the children. Subsequently, they have envisioned colourful versions of the monument, in the hope of wonderful days ahead," says Khurshid, who plans to continue his search for such constructions. He hopes that the true history of the Language Movement reaches children across Bangladesh.

The exhibition is open to all every day from 11 am to 8 pm, until February 29.

Keeping that in mind, Oriental Painting Studio Bangladesh (OPSB) arranged an event for artists at their premises in Elephant Road, recently.
