ELECTRICITY gets costlier

5.3pc hike effective from March 1

At a time when people are grappling with high prices of many daily essentials, the government has hiked electricity prices, which is likely to cause a big ripple effect on the economy.

The new rate will take effect from Sunday, and in a few weeks power consumption will increase with farmers irrigating their land and people using fans and ACs as temperatures rise.

Consumer rights activists and economists said the effect will be the hardest on those living paycheque to paycheque.

Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) yesterday announced that each unit of electricity will be Tk 7.13, a 5.3 percent increase from the current rate.

The last time power prices were hiked was in November 2017. It was also a 5.3 percent increase.

"We hiked the price considering the overall economic situation, production cost of electricity and its demand. We have assessed the impact [of the hike] on general public, irrigation, and small and medium entrepreneurs," BERC Chairman Abdul Jalil told reporters at a press conference.

KHALEDA'S BAIL PRAYER Turned down, yet again

The High Court yesterday once again rejected a bail petition of BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia in the Zia Charitable Trust corruption case.

The bail was sought on health and humanitarian grounds.

The court, however, directed the medical board formed by Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) to immediately provide "advance treatment" to Khaleda if she gives consent.

The seven-member medical board can include more expert physicians for the BNP chief's treatment, if necessary, it said.

The HC passed the rejection order as the medical board, in a report, said it was able to provide "advance treatment" to Khaleda at BSMMU.

Citing the report, the HC said Khaleda did not give her consent to get "advance treatment" for her arthritis problem.

DCCs napping as mosquitoes buzz

Experts warn of a record increase in Culex mosquito population next month

As experts warn of a record increase in Culex mosquito population next month, measures taken by the two Dhaka city corporations to check the blood-sucking insects appear inadequate.

At least two recent surveys -- one by the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) and the other by a team of researchers from Jahangirnagar University -- found the mosquito population density in the capital is likely to multiply in the next two weeks.

In the meantime, people in different parts of the city keep complaining about mosquito nuisance. Besides, they said city corporation drives against the insects appear to have become lax after the city corporation elections on February 1.

"It has become totally unbearable as mosquitoes bite both at night and day," said Tapon Chandra Das, a resident of Dogair under Ward-68 of the Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC).

Bangladeshis' Umrah now uncertain

S Arabia imposes ban over coronavirus fears; India takes 23 Bangladeshis from China

Umrah for around 10,000 Bangladeshis, who already got visas, has become uncertain as the Saudi government yesterday placed a temporary ban on Umrah pilgrimage to stop the spread of coronavirus in the Kingdom.

However, Bangladeshis who have obtained work permits and employment visas can fly to the Middle-Eastern country on their scheduled flights, Biman Bangladesh Airlines said in a press release yesterday.

Saudi Arabia announced the ban after more than 330 cases were confirmed around the Middle East, said a UK-based newspaper.

'I know my son is dead; bury him in Dhaka'

Says Eskaton fire victim moments before being put on life support

Just before being put on life support, Shahidul Kirmany Rony, who had sustained 43 percent inhalation burns, told his sister Nasrin Akter, "I know my son has died, bury him in Dhaka. Our condition is also not good; I don't know what will happen. Tell father to decide [about us too]."

Rony, 40, and his wife Jannatul Fardaus, 38, who sustained 95 percent inhalation burns from a devastating fire that completely burned a side of a five-storey building in Eskaton early yesterday morning, were both on life support at the intensive care unit of Sheikh Hasina National Institute of Burn and Plastic surgery. Their only son, four-year-old AKM Rushdi, and two others -- a buying house staffer Abdul Kader Liton, 40, and a Vigarunnisa Noon School & College Student Afrin Jahan Juthi, 17 -- died in the fire that started around 4:00am at building no 45/a on Dilu Road.
