

Change in mindset brings relief to Bangladesh

There was hardly any celebration from Tamim Iqbal when he reached his 12th ODI hundred,

his first since July 2018, against Zimbabwe in the second ODI yesterday. The lefthanded opener just looked up at the heavens and soaked in the applause from teammates in the dressing room.

The 30-year-old also reached quite a few other milestones, surpassing his own record for the highest individual ODI score for Bangladesh of 154 as he was eventually dismissed after a magnificent 158 off 136 balls, which featured 20 fours and three

Tamim also became the first Bangladesh batsman to score 7,000 runs in the format but aside from all these achievements, it was perhaps relief more than any other emotion that washed over the left-hander as he finally rediscovered his best.

There had been a lot of criticism about Tamim's recent batting approach, with questions raised over his conservative batting and what has been perceived as a tendency to overthink, but the left-hander finally managed to break the shackles in grand style.

Yesterday's inning was in stark contrast

to his knock in the first ODI on Sunday, when he scored 24 off 43 balls.

There was no change in technique or any improvisation from him yesterday. Instead, Tamim just looked relaxed and seemed a batsman with a clear mind.

His change in mindset was evident right from the start and, after a watchful start, the left-hander displayed the aggressive side of one of the more complete batting arsenals in the country when he struck his first boundary with a gorgeous pull off Carl Mumba.

Since then it was a walk in the park for Tamim as he smashed back-to-back boundaries in the next over of Charlton Tshuma, and off good deliveries, indicating that it was about to be a special day.

There were no issues about maintaining a good strike rate or feeling the pressure to look for boundaries, which has been the case for the left-hander in recent times; Tamim was enjoying his batting, and that seemed to be enough.

Tamim raced to his fifty off 42 balls and yes, he did remain watchful, but that has always been part of his game plan to play a big knock.

There was a phase when, alongside Mahmudullah Riyad, there were no boundaries for 59 balls but Tamim

remained calm and snapped the streak by slapping pacer Donald Tiripano towards point to enter the nineties.

Tamim was even more focused in the nineties and eventually reached the milestone off 106 balls when he tapped Sean Williams for a couple towards cover.

The best part of Tamim's innings was his hunger to go even further and he started to cut loose as he smashed three fours and a six to take 24 runs off Tinotenda Mutombodzi in the 40th over as Bangladesh set their stall for a big total.

It took just 26 balls for Tamim to score his next fifty and it was his positive intent, a mixture of calm and aggression, that put a high price tag on his wicket even after reaching his hundred.

The range of strokes from Tamim -whether it was the trademark cover drive, straight drive past the bowlers or the pull from the meat of the bat unleashed after rocking back in inimitable fashion -- the left-hander played all the shots in the book with no hesitation about the pitch or conditions.

Tamim may have struck an ODI hundred after nearly two years but even if he was unable to do that yesterday, he would still have felt a lot better over the change in mentality, which made all the

Bangladesh survived a scare before winning the second match against Zimbabwe by four runs to clinch the threematch ODI series with a game in hand at the

Sylhet International Cricket Stadium yesterday. And captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza was delighted with the two major outcomes from the game, the first being the close win which he felt would bolster the team's confidence and the other being Tamim Iqbal's return to form with a

"I think a win is a win but this was a close win. We held our nerves well. Winning is something we'll take to the next match. After this match, everybody will say 'but what about the bowling', but this was a very good wicket, and there was also some dew. It was difficult for the bowlers. When you win a tight game, it gives you a lot of confidence going forward." Mashrafe said at the post-match presentation.

About Tamim's record-breaking hundred, Mashrafe said: "I think he's always been our special player. The good thing is that he's happy after scoring runs. We know he has the ability to come back with such big knocks and this is nothing new. The others batted well around him, and that was good to see."

Tamim also said that he had belief in himself. "A lot of the credit goes to the team management because they always believed in me. I was batting well in the Test matches and in the nets, and I knew something big was coming. It was a bit up and down, but on the whole it was a really good batting wicket."

"Mushy [Mushfiqur Rahim] was batting beautifully at the other end. The young ones, the way Liton [Das] batted well in the first match. [Nazmul Hossain] Shanto is also looking good. He's going to get a big one pretty soon. We are batting well, and it's good. At one point they had it but we pulled it back," he added.

It was a disappointing end for Zimbabwe after Donald Tiripano and Tinotenda Mutombodzi's big-hitting display almost took the visitors almost to victory, but captain Sean Williams believed that they could take lot of positives from the close

"Coming from the first game, and almost winning this game, we take a lot of positives. The young guys taking us close to winning this game is huge for us. Generally, Raaz [Sikandar Raza] plays a crucial role for us. Wesley Madhevere is an extremely good find for us. I wish Donald could have gotten us over the line. He's very disappointed right now, but he can hold his head high."



Donald Tiripano, the number nine Zimbabwean batsman, smashed a brave hearted unbeaten 28-ball 55 to take his team as close as within four runs of winning the second ODI against Bangladesh in Sylhet yesterday. Tiripano and Tinotenda Mutombodzi strung together an 80-run partnership for the eighth wicket which is also now the highest partnership for that wicket in Bangladesh.

was obviously the top priority for Bangladesh, but the home series against a relatively weaker opposition was also a platform for the Tigers to work towards the future.

And perhaps the reason for resting seam bowling all-rounder Mohammad Saifuddin for the second ODI against Zimbabwe -- despite the cricketer showing his big-hitting ability and also scalping three wickets in the first ODI -- was to have a look at the others for the coming days.

Saifuddin filled that void with a touch of class in the first ODI, scoring 28 runs during a 15-ball cameo. The left-hander smote three sixes off the final over, bowled by Chris Mpofu, as Bangladesh capitalised on the platform set by centurion Liton Das and added 46 runs in the last four overs to post their highest-ever ODI total of 321 for six.

Coronavirus to disrupt Pak tour?

The last phase of Bangladesh's tour of Pakistan might be in jeopardy after schools in the Sindh province were directed to remain closed till March 13 after a second person was confirmed to have been infected with the coronavirus.

The Bangladesh Cricket Board said it would communicate with the Pakistan Cricket Board to get a clearer picture of the situation, adding that they were unwilling to send the team to Pakistan if there was any threat.

"For us, players safety is our first priority and we are not going to compromise with that at any cost. We will talk to PCB in this regard and if we see that there is any threat, then we will certainly not send our team to Pakistan. But at the moment it is too early to make a decision. We still have time on hand," BCB media committee chairman Jalal Younus said yesterday.

The Tigers are expected to travel to Karachi to play an ODI on April 3 and the second of the two-match Test series from April 5.
