Coronavirus concerns delay Shyam Benegal's film on Bangabandhu

The coronavirus, which has been rapidly spreading across India, has taken a toll on the shooting schedule of Shyam Benegal's forthcoming film on Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. The film is a joint venture between Bangladesh and India, commemorating Bangabandhu's birth centenary.

According to Esha Yousof, the producer of the project from Bangladesh, the film's shooting was set to start from March 18 in Kolkata, but the outbreak of the virus has resulted in schedule disruptions. "We cannot risk the lives of our cast and crew," she added. As of now, shooting for

the film's first schedule is expected to begin in September, Esha said. Sequences showcasing the early life of Bangabandhu would have begun at Tetia village in Narayanganj, according to her.

Esha further said that the opening slot of the shoot was planned for about a month, including some days in a studio in Dhaka, with a total of close to 300 members of the cast and crew from India and Bangladesh.

On the other hand, Benegal said that the delay will let the cast and crew have some more preparation time for the large-scale production. "Besides, the house in Tungipara needs to be built, keeping the ambience of that period in mind," added the internationally acclaimed director.

'Jolkonya' draws a positive response

The group art exhibition, *Jolkonya*, showcased works by emerging female and male artists concluded recently at Bishwo Sahitta Kendro. The paintings at the show depicted the lives of rural women, mother-daughter relationships, Goddess Durga, women's contributions to the society as well as incidents of violence against women.

The four-day exhibition was arranged by Jolkonya, an organisation of female artists who have been working together for establishing women's rights through art. The exhibition featured 39 paintings by 19 artists, which were created using a range of media, including watercolour and acrylic on canvas and paper. Writer and novelist Hasnat Abdul Hye inaugurated the exhibition on March 8 as the chief guest.

The participating artists at the exhibit included Suporna Alice Gomes, Sabia Nasrin, Alina Chakma, Anamika Sur, Afrin Sultana, Alicen Griffith Gomes, Farhana Ferdausi, Farzana Alam, Hridi Arddra Ahmed, Jaquiline Ria Rozario, Meghamala Aka, Mustari Fahmida Afrin, Nibadita Mondol, S B Nusrat Jahan, Shuchita Saparya, Sneha Caren Gomes and Tania Farabi along with male artists Palash Kumar Das and Mahfuzur Rahman.

Suporna Alice Gomes's acrylic painting, *My Mother 2*, represented the bond between a mother and daughter. Afrin Sultana's acrylic and mixed media painting, *Break the Silence* showed a woman screaming as a perpetrator approaches her. In the background, the artist used newspaper cuttings that showed news headlines of violence against women.

Meghamala Aka's acrylic painting, *Durga Rupi Chhatri*, symbolised the power of women portrayed through Goddess Durga, while Tania Farabi's *Reddish Wounds in Violent Swings*, a realistic rendition, depicted a woman's head grabbed from behind, while she was being gagged by another pair of hands. Alina Chakma's watercolour, *Kaj*, portrayed ethnic women working in a jhumfield.

Tom Hanks announces positive test for coronavirus

Tom Hanks and his wife Rita Wilson have both tested positive for coronavirus, the US actor announced recently. Hanks said he and Wilson came down with a fever while in Australia, where he is reportedly filming the upcoming movie about the life of Elvis Presley.

"To play things right, as is needed in the world right now, we were tested for the coronavirus, and were found to be positive," he wrote in a statement posted to Instagram.

The pair will now be isolated and monitored, wrote Hanks.

"We'll keep the world posted and updated," he added, along with a photo of a surgical glove placed inside a biohazard trash bag.

Hanks is the first major Hollywood star to publicly state that he has the virus that is sweeping around the world.

According to a reports, the Elvis film, directed by Baz Luhrmann, features Hanks as the legendary singer's longtime manager Colonel Tom Parker.
