LEICESTER PLAYERS ISOLATED

A number of Leicester players have shown symptoms of coronavirus and have been "kept away from the squad", manager Brendan Rodgers said on Thursday. As it stands, a full Premier League programme is scheduled for this weekend, with third-placed Leicester due to travel to struggling Watford on Saturday, despite widespread cancellations of matches across Europe. Leicester boss Rodgers, guoted on the club's official Twitter feed, said at his pre-match press conference that disruption would be a "shame" but public health was more important than football. "We're guided by football and federations," he said. "We have to press on with our work and prepare as normal."

Real go into quarantine La Liga suspended

Real Madrid went into quarantine on Thursday as La Liga announced Spain's top two divisions will be suspended for at least two weeks over the coronavirus.

La Liga authorities made the decision after Real Madrid confirmed its senior football team is in guarantine after one of the club's basketball players tested positive for the virus.

A club statement read: "A player from our basketball first team has tested

Neymar inspires PSG turnaround

Paris St Germain put their Champions League last-16 traumas behind them as they beat Borussia Dortmund 2-0 on Wednesday to reach the quarterfinals, although no fans were in the stadium to witness the achievement. Neymar and Juan Bernat scored before halftime to secure a 3-2 aggregate win for PSG after a game played behind closed doors due to the coronavirus, which has infected 2,281 people and killed 48 in France. The result eased painful memories of 2017, when PSG were eliminated 6-5 on aggregate by Barcelona after letting slip a 4-0 advantage, and of last season when they lost to Manchester United on away goals after a 2-0 win at Old Trafford.



"Our only virus is Paris SG," a banner in the empty arena read.

"It was a perfect game," said centre back Marquinhos, who with Presnel Kimpembe marshalled the PSG defence. "We now need to keep the same mindset for the rest of the competition."

PSG were without captain Thiago Silva while Kylian Mbappe started on the bench after suffering from a sore throat.

The French side dominated possession and had the first clear chance when Edinson Cavani's cross shot from Di Maria's through ball was deflected by keeper Roman Buerki. Neymar put the hosts ahead in the 28th minute as he headed home Angel Di Maria's free kick for his 35th goal in 57 matches. Bernat doubled the lead on the stroke of halftime by flicking Sarabia's attempt past Buerki. PSG pressed high after the break while Erling Haaland, who scored a double in the first leg, never looked likely to add to his 10 Champions League goals this season. Thorgan Hazard and Axel Witsel made way for Julian Brandt and Giovanni Reyna as Dortmund coach Lucien Favre looked to freshen up his attacking line and PSG were suddenly on the back foot.

'They could play proper football'

Klopp says after defeat to Atletico

There are no points in the Champions League aesthetically

pleasing or entertaining football but Liverpool manager Juergen Klopp said something didn't feel right

about his team's defeat by defence-minded Atletico Madrid on Wednesday.

Diego Simeone's side were outplayed for large parts of the match and looked destined to be overwhelmed by Liverpool when Roberto Firmino scored early in extratime to give his side a 2-1 lead on aggregate after Georginio Wijnaldum's opener.

But Marcos Llorente, the great nephew of six-times European Cup winner Paco Gento, hauled Atletico back into the tie with two strikes from outside the box before Alvaro Morata added a third to stun Anfield.

Klopp, who guided his team to the final in the past two seasons, couldn't resist some barbed comments about his counterpart Diego Simeone's tactics.

"I don't understand with the quality they have, the football they play. They could play proper football but they stand deep and have counter attacks," Klopp told reporters.

"We accept it of course but it doesn't feel right tonight. I realise I am a really bad loser, especially when the boys put such an effort in against world class players on the other side who defend with two rows of four," he said.

It was hardly a surprise, though, that the Spanish side adopted such an approach -- a tight defence and compact midfield has been the hallmark of Atletico during Argentine Simeone's eight years in charge.

Simeone cannot call on the world-class playmakers and strikers available to La Liga rivals Barcelona and Real Madrid and compensates with organisation, work-rate and an ability to work out the best way to punish opponents.

"We came here to win, I respect his identity and with the quality we have, we try to exploit deficiencies in the opposition, that's what we do," said the Argentine when confronted with Klopp's criticism.

Simeone also claimed that the result was 'unjust' as Atletico had the advantage of extra time to find an away goal.

"What I have to say, and will be saying at the next UEFA coaches' meeting, is what I think is unfair," said Simeone. "Today was unjust because we had 30 minutes of extra time to score three away goals. Liverpool never had that. We had 30 more minutes to score an away goal and Liverpool didn't. That's not fair. The rule favoured us today but it might go against us in the future. Liverpool had 30 minutes fewer to score an away goal. That's wrong.'

Klopp knows, however, that despite this

disappointment, this is a memorable season for Liverpool who lead the Premier League by 25 points will surely be crowned English champions for the first time in 30 years.

So, he was not about to let his frustration turn into criticism of his strikers for the failure to convert chances into more goals.

"I loved the way we played in the 90 minutes, we played exceptionally well. For two and a half years we have had an exceptional ride in the Champions. Tonight, the crowd exceptional and the boys fought hard," he said. "We know in the last two years we had some lucky moments in the Champions League, you have to, to reach two finals, but today it was like everything was against us in the decisive moments."

Hamilton fumes; ATP suspend tour

The ATP announced Thursday it was suspending the men's tennis tour for six weeks "due to escalating health and safety issues" arising from the coronavirus pandemic.

"This is not a decision that was taken lightly," said ATP chairman Andrea Gaudenzi.

Elsewhere, World champion Lewis Hamilton said he was "very surprised" that the Australian Grand Prix was going ahead, as more Formula One staff were isolated and teams limited contact with fans.

"I am really very, very surprised that we're here. I don't think it's great that we have races but it really is shocking that we're all sitting in this room,' Hamilton said at an official press briefing.

Asked why he felt the race was still on, Hamilton replied: "Cash is king."

Sheikh Jamal go top

Sheikh Jamal climbed to the 7000 top of Bangladesh Premier League table with a 2-0 win over Sheikh Russel after leaders Saif SC stumbled to a 1-1 draw against lightweights Arambagh at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. Three-time champions Sheikh Jamal extended their winning streak to four games and now top the 13-team table with 12 points, one more than second-placed Saif SC, who could have gone top with an outright win in their sixth match.

However, Saif squandered a lead but were perhaps happy with the point after losing their home match 0-2 to Sheikh Jamal.

Reigning champions Bashundhara Kings have 10 points, as do Abahani and Chattogram Abahani.

Following a morale-boosting win over Saif SC in Mymensingh, Sheikh Jamal took on struggling Sheikh Russel at home and got a goal each from Gambian duo Solomon King and Omar Jobe.

Sheikh Russel came close to breaking the deadlock in the ninth minute but Nigerian defender Alison Udoka saw his powerful shot ricochet off the post. Jobe then threated by breaking into the box before defender Uttam Kumar Banik blocked his shot. But the Sheikh Russel defenders could

not stop Solomon, who brought Kesto Kumar's long ball under his spell on the edge of the box before stepping up and dispatching a powerful shot past goalkeeper Ashraful Islam Rana in the 24th minute.

In the 55th minute, Jobe changed the direction of Zahid Hossain's shot to ensure Sheikh Jamal's fourth victory as well as Sheikh Russel's third defeat in six matches.

In the second match, Saif SC faced a stiff challenge from Arambagh under floodlights sans their two foreign players Jahongir Ergashev of Tajikistan and Rwandan defender Emery Bayisenge.

Arambagh, who now have five points from as many games, created chances one after another but their forwards failed to capitalise before Saif SC took the lead against the run of play with defender Yeasin Arafat heading home a corner from fit-again Jamal Bhuiyan in the 28th minute.

After resumption, Saif SC had more possession in midfield and Jamal rattled the post in the 51st minute before Arambagh hit back through a header from defender Didarul Haque in the 61st minute.

Both Arambagh and Saif SC came close to taking the lead again. First, Eleta Kingsley broke into the box, but the Nigerian was denied by Saif goalkeeper Pappu Hossain in the 72nd minute. Saif SC then saw young forward Faisal Ahmed Fahim drive wide when facing an open net.
