### Tomato boon for Faridpur grower

Farmer Bipul Ghosh planted 44,000 seedlings on 6 acres of land and expects 10kg tomato from each plant

Farming of hybrid varieties of tomato has brought good luck as well as handsome profit for farmer Bipul Ghosh in Faridpur Sadar upazila.

The young farmer from Shibrampur area has cultivated different hybrid varieties of tomato like Noble, Mintu Super, Ispahani Dipali, Bipul Plus, Chameli, Bizli, and Sumo on his six acres of land this year.

During a recent visit to Bipul's farm this correspondent saw some labours were tending the tomato plants while others were collecting ripe tomato from the

"I planted 44,000 tomato seedlings on six acres land spending Tk 24, 0000 this year and hope to get at least 10kg tomato from each plant. At present, I am selling per kg of tomato at Tk 15 directly from my

Bappy Ghosh, manager of Bipul Agro Farm, said "We have planted the tomato seedlings in October last year and started harvesting tomato from the fast week of January this year. We get nearly 850kg of tomato daily.

Bipul said alongside tomato, he has been cultivating different varieties of vegetables and crops on his land since 1982.

Faridpur Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) Deputy Director Kartik Chandra Chakraborty said Bipul had not only made a fortune, but also set an example of others.

# Risky boat ride to attend school

Locals including a good number of students have to cross Boalia canal between Ratneshwar and Panpatti villages in Patuakhali's Galachipa upazila amid risk on a small country boat locally known as 'kheya'.

To take the boat across the canal, they have to pull a long plastic rope tied to poles on two sides of the canal.

Over 150 students regularly cross the canal to go to Panpatti to attend classes at Bangabandhu High School, Panpatti High School, Nuria Government Primary School, Tularam Government Primary School and Panpatti Dakhil Madrasa

During a recent visit to the area, this correspondent found several students including Prashanto Sheel, Deen Islam and Eva pulling the rope to cross the Boalia canal by the boat that carried about 30 people, mostly students.

We have to cross the canal daily in this way. A few students fell into the canal while pulling the rope in different times," said Prashanto Sheel, a seventh-grader at Bangabandhu High

"Sometimes the boat tilts sideways, letting water soak us," said Mukta, an eighth-grader at the same school.

"Once several students including me got fever, cold and cough as we were soaked," said Romana Begum, a seventh-grader.

Israt Jahan Asma, an assistant teacher of Bangabandhu High School, also a member of Patuakhali zila parishad, said, "Many students have to cross the canal amid risk by the boat to attend classes in their educational institutions at Panpatti. I, too, cross the canal by that small boat. I informed the higher authorities of the matter on several occasions but to no effect.

Meanwhile, a bridge constructed about two

kilometres north of Ratneshwar Kheya Ghat is virtually of no use to the students.

Sudhir Chandra Karmakar, headmaster of Bangabandhu High School, said, "To cross the canal, we earlier paid Tk 20,000 per year to the boat owner who himself pulled the rope to carry the students across the canal by the boat. But this year, he demanded Tk 30,000, which we failed to meet.

'Now the students have to cross the canal by pulling the rope themselves, which poses risk. We are trying to negotiate with the boat owner," he added.

Contacted, Golachipa Upazila Nirbahi Officer Shah Md Rafiqul Islam said, "I have heard about the matter and will inform the higher authorities for a solution. I am also thinking of making a temporary arrangement for pulling the boat by a paid man to reduce the risk of the students while crossing the canal.

#### 'Drug dealer' killed in **Jashore** 'gunfight'

An alleged drug peddler was killed in a reported gunfight with police in Jashore's Chougachha

upazila early yesterday. The deceased, Johurul Islam, 40, was accused in at least 10 cases, including for drug peddling and extortion, filed with different police stations of the district, Officer in Charge (OC) of Chougachha Police Station Rifat Khan Rajib said.

OC Rajib said a team of police took position near Ballavpur High School around 3:30am, following information that a consignment of contraband drugs was being smuggled to the capital by a group of drug peddlers.

Meanwhile, sensing the presence of police, the drug peddlers opened fire on the law enforcers, prompting them to fire back in selfdefence, he said, adding that, at one stage, Johurul came in the line of fire and died on the spot, while his other cohorts managed to flee the scene.

The law enforcers also recovered a pistol and 100 bottles of Phensidyl from the spot.

#### Youth held with arms

## Safety of thousands compromised for decades

Residents of ten villages in two unions of Dighinala upazila await a permanent bridge on a hilly river

Thousands of residents in ten villages under two unions of Dighinala upazila have been risking their lives to cross the Maini river for ages, without a permanent bridge on the hilly river.

The residents of Boalkhali and Dighinala unions have been making a makeshift bamboo bridge, about 300 feet long, on the river during the dry season every year. They cross the river in boats during the monsoon when the river swells up, damaging the makeshift bridge.

A significant number of the people who cross the river on a daily basis are school children of all ages. Farmers and others whose livelihoods depend on reaching their produce and goods to nearby markets across the river also face

immense sufferings every day. Villagers said nearly 13 years ago, in 2007, four people died after they fell into the river while crossing the bamboo bridge. But after all these years, the authorities are yet to take any step to ensure a safe passage over the river for thousands of citizens.

During a recent visit to the area, this correspondent saw how people from all walks of life, especially students and farmers, cross the risky bridge to go about their everyday business.

Chakma, Sudarsan Katarung Chhara in Bowalkhali union, said the bridge is the only means of communications for all the surrounding villages and they suffered severely during the last rainy season when the bridge got damaged due to strong current.

"The bridge has to be repaired immediately... before things get worse again this monsoon."

Kamal Chakma, another resident of the same village, said school going children suffer the most during the rainy season.

"Without a bridge, the farmers also can't transport their produce and goods to the weekly market during the monsoon. We would be relieved of the sufferings if a permanent bridge was made on the river urgently," he added.

Echoing the sentiment, Tito Chakma, of Udal Bagan village in Dighinala union, said they have

endured years of sufferings and the authorities should take steps before the upcoming monsoon to ensure safe communications for the villagers.

On way to his school, Rupesh Chakma, a tenth grader at Udal Bagan High School, said they risk their lives while crossing the river to and from their school every day and a permanent bridge over the river would make their lives safer.

Buddha Sadhon Chakma and Pinki Chakma, SSC examinees from the school, said many of their classmates sustained injuries while crossing the bridge.

Newton Chakma, an assistant teacher at the school, said most of the 525 students enrolled at the school live across the river and they put their lives

in danger on a daily basis to cross it. Contacted, Bowalkhali Union Parishad Chairman Chayan Bikash Chakma said, "A concrete bridge would benefit thousands of residents in the two unions... I already wrote a letter to the authorities, urging to build a bridge [on the Maini river]. I hope the authorities will take steps [in this regard] soon."
